

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: The Lord, walking by the sea of Galilee, saw two brothers, Peter and Andrew, and he called out to them: Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.

Offertory: The Lord's right hand has shown strength, the Lord's right hand has exalted me. I shall not die, but live; and I shall declare the works of the Lord.

Communion: Follow me; I will make you fishers of men. Whereupon they, leaving their nets and their boat, followed the Lord.

Christ as the Light of the nations permeates today's readings, extending the season of Epiphany a little further into Ordinary Time. Traditionally, Epiphany was so important that it was an octave (the same liturgical day for eight days!) since its message of salvation was universal in scope. Christ revealed Himself to the Gentiles in addition to the Jews, and now we see in Isaiah and the Gospel today that a "great light" has dawned in the lands where Gentiles predominate, foreshadowing both the restoration of the remnant people of Israel and the grafting of the Gentiles into this higher, spiritual Israel. "The Lord's right hand has shown strength" in this marvelous work of redemption, and we are gladdened by these "tidings of great joy" that are directed "to all people". Now, like Peter and Andrew, He calls us to participate in the joy of this message, let it permeate our lives, and bring this Good News to whomever will receive our Lord as their Savior.

HAITI: Thirteen years ago this month, was the most destructive Haitian earthquake. That was a natural disaster and what is currently occurring is devastating but manmade. The UNICEF food supply, in the warehouses that were looted, exceeded six million dollars with no resupply at this time. Doctors without Borders provided a statistic that half the hospital beds on Port au Prince were filled with civilian wounded, or worse, from the gang warfare. This is before they had to close their hospitals. The last of the elected officials terms of office also ended this past week. Haiti is now a country without a government. Prior to that the "acting government" did ask for formal military assistance.

Please keep Haiti in your Prayers.



FROM THE PASTOR





CHRISTIAN LIFE AND THE SEVEN SACRAMENTS

Part 1

"The thief does not come except to steal, and to kill, and to destroy. I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly."

John 10:10

Christians are people who acknowledge that they belong neither to themselves nor to the age, but to God in Jesus Christ through the Holy Spirit. We cannot speak of the Christian life without Christ. We are out of step with a society that prizes individuality and autonomy, at odds with a culture in which power over persons and property gauges success and earns respect. Unlike our "secular friends", we Christians do not aim to be self-created or self-directed. Instead, our life is interwoven with Christ so that the life we live is that of Christ. As St. Paul says: "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the *life* which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" (Gal. 2:20).

It is therefore important to have a look at how our Christian life begins, ends, and is lived. So, I am going to walk with you in this article through the LIFE LIVED IN THE SACRAMENTS given by Christ to the Roman Catholic Church. The catechism of the Catholic Church holds that; "Sacraments are efficacious signs of grace instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Catholic Church

by which divine grace is dispensed to us" (CCC No. 1131).

There are seven Sacraments: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Reconciliation, Matrimony, Holy Orders and Anointing of the Sick. We traditionally classify them as Sacraments of Christian Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist), Sacraments of Healing (Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick), and Sacraments of Commitment (Matrimony, Holy Orders). The Eucharist occupies a unique place as the Sacrament of Sacraments, and all the other Sacraments are ordered to it as to their end. The seven sacraments touch all the stages of Christian life: they give birth and increase, healing, and mission to the Christian's life of faith. There is thus a certain resemblance between the stages of natural life and the stages of the spiritual life.

According to the Second Vatican Council, "The purpose of the sacraments is to sanctify men, to build up the body of Christ, and finally, to give worship to God. Because they are signs, they also instruct. They not only presuppose faith, but by words and objects they also nourish, strengthen, and express it; that is why they are called 'sacraments of faith.' They do indeed impart grace, but, in addition, the very act of celebrating them disposes the faithful most effectively to receive this grace in a fruitful manner, to worship God duly, and to practice charity" (Sacred Constitution on the Liturgy, 59).

The seven sacraments are God's gift to each of us. They allow us to grow closer to him and to deepen our faith and commitment to the Church. They are concrete actions by which Christians may be marked, fed and touched by the Holy Spirit so that the reality of God and the work of Christ become embedded in the body and psyche. Sacraments recall God's promises and presence to the worshiping community, binding it together ever more tightly and to clearer purpose. The Holy Spirit is the specific agent of Christianization in the sacraments, binding us into the trinitarian life in baptism, and feeding us on the dramatic reenactment of redemption played out through the death and resurrection of Christ in the Eucharist. As St. Basil the Great put it; "the Holy Spirit reaches down from the divine majesty to graft believers into the Holy Trinity by dwelling in them".
