

## **ANNUAL DIOCESAN APPEAL**

The world can get inside us, often affecting how we feel. Living in the 21<sup>st</sup> century involves wading through a spiritual slog. The world is filled with as many opportunities for vice as virtue. We swim in a sea of ads, agendas, and social pressures. It subtly wears on us.

Jesus says that we, His followers, are the world's way out. "You are the light of the world" is a weighty metaphor to describe us (Matthew 5:14). Jesus' description of His followers might energize us, sober us, or make us want to run away like Jonah the prophet.

Jesus believes that when we work through Him we are the world's best hope. Our parish takes Him seriously. We trust that His words in today's Gospel carry *power*. We're going to draw from it. We know from experience that we can shine the light of Christ through good deeds. We need your help to be able to continue doing that for our local community. Our Annual Diocesan Appeal is a significant opportunity for you to help us advance our mission to bring the light of hope to our little corner of the world. Maybe, with your help, our Annual Appeal will be a link that will get at least one soul to the light of Christ. We hope for more than one. Give without counting the cost, and watch how God outdoes you. May He bless us!

## LITURGICAL NOTES

Processional Chant (Presentation of the Lord): Sion, adorn your bridal chamber and welcome Christ the King; take Mary in your arms, who is the gate of heaven, for she herself is carrying the King of glory and new light. A Virgin she remains, though bringing in her hands the Son before the morning star begotten, whom Simeon, taking in his arms announced to the peoples as Lord of life and death and Savior of the world.

Offertory (5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in OT): Render secure my footsteps in your paths so that my feet do not slip; incline your ear and hear my words; display your wonderful mercies, O Lord, Savior of those who place their hope in you. Communion (5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in OT): I will go in to the altar of God, to the God who gives joy to my youth.

There are some noteworthy connections between the antiphons for the Presentation of the Lord ("Candlemas") and this Sunday's antiphons. In the processional antiphon for Candlemas, we see a striking emphasis on carrying and being carried. Sion, the City of God, is exhorted to "take Mary in your arms" and to welcome her since she herself "is carrying the King of glory and new light", Who will then be carried by Simeon and presented to the peoples and to God. That same Mass has an ancient alleluia verse that says, "the old man carried the Child, but the Child governed the old man", further highlighting this theme. What are we to make of this? God the Son, Jesus Christ in the flesh, has demonstrated that we must be humble in following Him. We must let ourselves be carried by Him because grace sustains the soul as food sustains the body. The effects of Original Sin on the soul (in general, finding it easier to do bad than good) make it especially important for us to rely on God in all things. Hence, the Offertory Antiphon for this Sunday begs God to "render secure [our] footsteps" in His paths. With joy in our hearts, let us "go in to the altar of God" and place our trust in His never-ending care for us and all our needs.



## **CHRISTIAN LIFE AND THE SEVEN SACRAMENTS**

Part III

Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

"Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you" Matthew 28:19-20

At the baptism of Jesus, God reveals what it means to be the Son of God in the special public mission given to Jesus. What is the mission that Jesus receives from his Father? It is that of the servant described by Isaiah. It is a mission of justice and peace as Mathew records it: "He shall bring forth justice to the nations, not crying out, not shouting...A bruised reed he shall not break, and a smoldering wick he shall not quench" (Mt. 12: 18-20). This mission of Jesus is also about teaching, healing, and liberation. Isaiah says that he is to be "a light to the nations, to open the eyes of the blind, to bring out prisoners from confinement, and from the dungeon those who live in darkness" (Is. 42:6-7).

The baptism of Jesus also tells us about our own baptism. If Jesus was commissioned at his baptism, so, too, are we. Baptism does not just wash away sin; baptism is not just for our personal salvation. Baptism commissions us with the Spirit to the same mission that Jesus had. We are to be

servants of the Lord working for peace and justice; we are to be prophets preaching the good news of God's love and compassion; and we are to be a healing presence.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that baptism calls people to participate in the apostolic and missionary activity of the People of God and to the witness of holy lives and practical charity: "Having become a member of the Church, the person baptized belongs no longer to himself, but to Him who died and rose for us. From now on, he is called to be subject to others, to serve them in the communion of the Church, and to 'obey and submit' to the Church's leaders, holding them in respect and affection. Just as baptism is the source of responsibilities and duties, the baptized person also enjoys rights within the Church: to receive the sacraments, to be nourished with the Word of God and to be sustained by the other spiritual helps of the Church" (Catechism, 1269).

The question for Christians is: how do we continue the mission of Jesus? Any time we are a healing and peaceful presence in our families, our neighborhood, our workplace, and in politics, we are fulfilling the mission of Jesus. Any time we oppose racism, sexism, abortion, and any social vice that degrades human dignity, we are fulfilling the mission of our baptisms. We continue the mission of Jesus when we work to stop global warming and promote peace in war-torn areas, create good jobs for the poor and provide healthcare to the sick, teach children and free those unjustly imprisoned, speak out for justice and protect human rights, witness and profess God's love to the world.

We are not simply baptized for our personal salvation; we are baptized into the Christian community for service to the world. To be a Christian is not simply to be saved by Jesus; to be a Christian is also to be Christ active in the world today. We do not do this mission alone. We do it with Jesus, and we do it in community by the power of the Spirit. If we continue the mission of Jesus, then the Father can say of us, "These are my beloved sons and daughters, with whom I am well pleased."
