

ANNUAL DIOCESAN APPEAL

God doesn't un-say anything. Today, Christ asserts that for those hoping for a 'free pass,' "Not... the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law" (Matthew 5:18). The law is God's unchangeable word, and all will be judged according to His law.

Yet, inasmuch as God will not recant his law, neither will he recant his mercy. Technically speaking, our hope should abound because, according to Saint Thomas Aquinas, "It is more proper for God to spare and to show mercy than to punish. For the former belongs to him by reason of his nature, the latter only by reason of our sins" (Summa Theologica II, II, 21, 2).

Yet some people don't know his law. While God's mercy may account for this, they will still suffer judgment under the law. Jesus gave our parish the task of sharing the good news that he came to save us from the law. Our Catholic parish is the most direct local route for our community to reach Him and our Annual Diocesan Appeal seeks to help more people get access to Him. Please support our Appeal today. We need your generosity, prayers, and advocacy. Let's bring souls from our community to his merciful feet!

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Be unto me a protecting God and a house of refuge, to save me; for you are my support and my refuge; and for the sake of your name you will lead me and nourish me.

Offertory: Blessed are you, O Lord, teach me your commandments. O Lord, you are blessed, teach me your commandments. With my lips have I declared all the judgments spoken by your mouth.

Communion: They are and were fully satisfied; the Lord gave them all that they desired; they were not deprived of their wants.

The Wisdom of God surpasses our understanding, but it leads to the fulfillment of our deepest desire to love and be loved. Finding our way to God requires, humility, though – a recognition that we are in need of God's saving mercy. Hence, Mass today starts with a petitionary Antiphon (as is the case with a majority of the Entrance Antiphons anyway) begging for God's protection and support. The readings of the day provide us with an answer to this prayer by living our lives in conformity with God's Wisdom as revealed in the teachings of Jesus Christ. Having been nourished with the Word, the Offertory begins with a blessing of gratitude and then asks God to instill His commandments into our hearts. Following the unsearchable Wisdom of God in living a good life will leave us "fully satisfied" because of the relationship we will be sharing with God. We find our greatest happiness when we are at peace with God, a peace which sustains us even in the midst of tribulations. A final note of encouragement is offered: "the Lord gave them all that they desired", which is to say that living a good life produces holy desires, and God is delighted to satisfy those desires, even the smallest and least significant. Commit yourself anew to living with Christian charity, and let Him dote on you today!



CHRISTIAN LIFE AND THE SEVEN SACRAMENTS

Part IV

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Acts 1:8

Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation form the Sacraments of Initiation and are all intimately connected. In the Sacrament of Confirmation, the baptized person is "sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit" and is strengthened for service to the Body of Christ. The prophets of the Old Testament foretold that God's Spirit would rest upon the Messiah to sustain his mission (Is.11:2). Their prophecy was fulfilled when Jesus the Messiah was conceived by the Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. The Holy Spirit descended on Jesus on the occasion of his baptism by John. Jesus' entire mission occurred in communion with the Spirit. Before he died, Jesus promised that the Spirit would be given to the Apostles and to the entire Church. After his death, he was raised by the Father in the power of the Spirit.

The New Testament reports many manifestations of the Holy Spirit, two of which we note here. St. John's Gospel describes an outpouring of the Spirit on Easter night when Jesus breathed on the Apostles and said, "Receive the holy Spirit" (Jn. 20:22). St. Luke's Acts of the Apostles gives another account of the sending

of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, fifty days after the Resurrection of Christ (Acts 2). Filled with the Holy Spirit, the Apostles proclaimed God's mighty deeds. Peter preached that this coming of the Spirit fulfilled the prophecy of Joel: "In the last days...I will pour out a portion of my spirit / upon all flesh" (Acts 2:17 and Jl. 3:1).

Those who believed in the Apostles' preaching were baptized and then received the Holy Spirit through the laying on of hands. The Apostles baptized believers in water and the Spirit. Then they imparted the special gift of the Spirit through the laying of hands. "The imposition of hands is rightly recognized by the Catholic tradition as the origin of the sacrament of Confirmation, which in a certain way perpetuates the grace of Pentecost in the Church" (CCC, no. 1288). By the second century, Confirmation was also conferred by anointing with holy oil, which came to be called sacred Chrism. "This anointing highlights the name 'Christian,' which means 'anointed' (Greek) and derives from that of Christ himself whom God 'anointed with the Holy Spirit'" (CCC, no. 1289).

Confirmation deepens our baptismal life that calls us to be missionary witnesses of Jesus Christ in our families, neighborhoods, society, and the world. Through Confirmation, our personal relationship with Christ is strengthened. We receive the message of faith in a deeper and more intensive manner with greater emphasis given to the person of Jesus Christ, who asked the Father to give the Holy Spirit to the Church for building up the community in loving service.

The Holy Spirit bestows seven gifts—wisdom, understanding, knowledge, fortitude, counsel, piety, and fear of the Lord—to assist us in our mission and witness. When confirmed, we walk with the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit. The impact of these gifts accompanies us in the various stages of our spiritual development. Wisdom enables us to see the world from God's viewpoint, which can help us come to grasp the purpose and plan of God. It grants us the long-range view of history, examining the present in the light of the past and the mystery of the future. It saves us from the illusion that the spirit of the times is our only guide. The Spirit's gift of knowledge directs us to a contemplation, or thoughtful reflection, of the mystery of God-Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—as well as of the mysteries of the Catholic faith. We are drawn to meditative prayer, where we allow God to lead us while we rest patiently in the divine presence.
