

ANNUAL DIOCESAN APPEAL

In today's Gospel story, the woman at the well meets Jesus. Jesus moves her so much that she goes into the village, no longer abashed by her bad reputation, and tells everyone that she found the Messiah. Dramatic, to be sure.

Others in the town immediately began to believe in Jesus because of her. The Samaritan woman's stark transformation gave her words credibility. Soon after, the townspeople deepened their faith in Jesus by directly encountering him.

Jesus used the Samaritan woman's words to introduce a whole village to him. Our parish can spread faith in the same way through the Annual Diocesan Appeal. This Lent, we ask you to prayerfully consider how you can help meet the mission of our Church and be a light for others through your heartfelt support. Together, we can demonstrate to our local neighborhood how wonderful He truly is. Through our actions, they will believe our word that He is alive. Jesus, lead us!

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: My eyes are forever turned towards the Lord; for he shall release my feet from the snare; look upon me and have mercy on me, for I am abandoned and destitute.

Offertory: The ordinances of the Lord are right, bringing joy to all hearts, sweeter than honey or the honeycomb. Therefore your servant will observe them. **Communion:** The sparrow has found herself a home, and the turtle dove a nest in which to lay her young: at your altars, O Lord of hosts, my King and my God! Blessed are they who dwell in your house, they shall praise you for ever and ever.

We often satisfy our thirst for love with paltry substitutes and distractions from the pain of that emptiness. The order of things becomes reversed: created things or relationships become an end in themselves and God secondary. Since all created things decay eventually and feelings are ephemeral, we find ourselves wanting more and try to fix this by clinging more vigorously to these things (or people), allowing for opportunities to sin and become enslaved. God alone will satisfy our deepest longings; the readings and Propers this weekend all point us to that truth with rich images of thirst, living water, the sweetness of God's commands, and birds finding a place to rest. This is why the Church strips down her liturgies during Lent – we are venturing into a spiritual desert to free ourselves firstly from attachments to evil things, but also from attachments to good things that could get in the way of deepening our relationship with God. Flowers are not to be found in the sanctuary, the music is more subdued (and the Gloria and Alleluia omitted), the organ is generally silenced, and the vestments are penitential. Let us renew our commitment during this graced period to let God love us and to love God above everything. FROM THE PASTOR





WELCOMING LENT 2023:

Part III

Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

"What shall I do with you, O Ephraim? What shall I do with you, O Judah? For your loyalty is like a morning cloud, and like the dew which goes away early" Hosea 6:4

The steadfast and faithful love of God remains and endures, even when we do not. This is seen time and time again in the Bible where God's people fell into sin and turned their backs on God, yet God continued to stand by His people. We all fail and sin against ourselves, each other, and ultimately against God. As the psalmist David wrote after he had committed adultery with Bathsheba, "Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight; so you are right in your verdict and justified when you judge" (Ps. 51:4).

In the first letter of John, it says "we love because He first loved us" (1 Jn. 4:19). We can love others, but we are still imperfect sinners who get things wrong and hurt people at times. However, God's love does not change for He is the same yesterday, today and forever (Heb. 13:18). The greatest

demonstration of God's love for the world is found in the person of Jesus and His work on the cross. It was only God Himself who could deal with unfaithful and sinful people and the power of sin and death in our broken world. Jesus loves us with an unfailing love because He is love.

It is up to each of us whether or not we turn away from our sins and believe and trust in Jesus, who out of love for us in our broken, helpless, sin-filled state died for every one of us. His blood paid the penalty that our sins deserved so that we would not have to experience the full and just wrath of God who hates sin. "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Rm. 5:8). We are free when we receive what Jesus did for us on the cross through repenting of our sins and following Him with our life. Jesus is the greatest hope for our broken world.

So, what does the broken body of Jesus mean for our brokenness? It means healing, as the prophet says: "But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all" (Is. 53:5-6). Jesus defeated the power of sin and death on the cross. God will execute justice in His final judgement and evil will end. When we trust in Jesus, we have the hope of eternal life where we will be with Him forever. His broken body has paved the way for us to share in the glorious resurrection, and the temporary pain we endure in this world will be no more.

We often shoulder the burdens of our own sin and the anxieties and frustrations of others. Yet Jesus takes that from us. We were not meant to carry the weight of the world on our shoulders. Any shame or guilt we feel can be confessed before God because Jesus has reconciled us to Himself. The requirement for us is to repent and experience the joy of God's mercy.
