

ANNUAL DIOCESAN APPEAL

Sight is easy to take for granted. For the Pharisees in today's Gospel, the possibility that they might be missing something, despite having sight, authority, and education bothers them: "Surely we are not also blind, are we?" (John 9:40)

When we walk through a house, we automatically look for the light switch if it's dark. It's difficult to do anything in the dark. "We have to do the works of the one who sent me while it is day," Jesus said in John 9:4. "Night is coming when no one can work."

The works of God cry out to be accomplished, including the ministries supported by our Annual Diocesan Appeal. We must not delay. Christ is here. He is the daylight only by which we can work. We need him, and we need you. We ask him to guide our efforts throughout the Appeal. Please support our Appeal. We ask him to enlighten your discernment of how to do so. He will not let you walk in darkness when doing the works of God. He will be your light. God bless you abundantly for your gifts and prayers for our Appeal!

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Rejoice, O Jerusalem; and gather round, all you who love her; rejoice in gladness, after having been in sorrow; exult and be replenished with the consolation flowing from her motherly bosom.

Offertory: Praise the Lord, for he is loving; sing in honor of his name, for he is gracious. He has accomplished whatever he resolved to do in heaven and on earth.

Communion: The Lord made some clay with his spittle, and he spread it over my eyes; and I went forth, I washed myself, I began to see, and I put my faith in God.

This Sunday is called "Laetare Sunday" because the first word of the Entrance Antiphon (in Latin) is "Laetare" or "rejoice". On this day, Priest and deacon don rose colored vestments, flowers return to the altar, and organ sings jubilantly, all manifesting the radiant joy of this day. We pause Lenten sobriety to consider the upcoming Paschal mysteries and how our Lord Jesus Christ won for us salvation. We were neither capable of pulling ourselves out of the abyss of sin nor worthy of any action on the part of God. Like the blind man, we just sat as God passed us by. But as Jesus showed in the Gospel, God, of His own volition, stooped down to us in our lowliness and freed us from our blindness. Because He is "loving" and "gracious", He gave us His Son and accomplished what "he resolved to do", which was, through the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus, to free us from the slavery of sin and give us access to the life of grace to become a new creation. This is indeed great cause for rejoicing! Whenever we are discouraged, let us recall the unfathomable Mercy of God that triumphed over our weakness. Let us "be replenished with the consolation" flowing from the bosom of the New Jerusalem, the Catholic Church, which is the preaching of this Good and wonderful News and its re-presentation in the Holy Mass.

FROM THE PASTOR





WELCOMING LENT 2023:

Part IV

Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

"And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength...You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Mark 12:30-31

Before we can really offer the fullness of our love to God, it is essential that we grasp, at least at some level, the reality of His incredible love for us. After all, John, Jesus' beloved disciple, tells us, "We love Him because He first loved us" (1 Jn. 4:19). We are empowered to love God and to love others only by first understanding and walking in the love God has for us. So, it seems to me that this is the best place to begin.

The book of Malachi begins with this wholehearted word from the Lord to His halfhearted worshipers: "I have loved you" (Mal.1:2). Though Israel had long been the object of God's love, they no longer returned His love. God listed the ways His people had offended His love through their disobedience; Israel's response was to question God. When He implored them, "Return to Me, and I will return to you", they questioned Him in their blindness: "In what way shall we return?" (Mal. 3:7). With divine "tough love", the Lord exposed their many blind spots. He did this so that they might repent and accept His love and return it with wholehearted obedience.

We too are often halfhearted in our faith, appearing to love and serve God but really loving and serving ourselves. According to the message of the prophet Malachi, which is applicable to our time, God looks for people who reverence Him by maintaining two spiritual practices: speaking to each other about Him and meditating on His wonderful attributes of Mercy and Love. Not only are we to receive and share God's love, but we are also to return it through glad obedience to his second commandment to love your neighbor as you love yourself. Yet, we cannot have that love until we first come to know Him. It is through fellowship with Him that we come to know Him and receive love. In using that love, we come to be like God and show love and mercy to others. God calls us and grants us forgiveness as an act of love. He forgives us because He loves us, and for our part we must repent. That is an act of responding to God's love. He then gives us His Spirit, by which we can have fellowship with Him and forgive as we are forgive. By His Spirit, we begin to manifest elements of His love, compassion, and forgiveness.

Often, we come to a place in life where forgiveness of one another or even oneself can be difficult. The question frequently asked is, "Why should I give in, forgive; I did nothing wrong?" The answer is simple: "But if you do not forgive others their sins, your father will not forgive your sins" (Mt. 6:14-15). Forgiveness deals directly with the heart of man. It requires a willingness to change our perspective on an offense, show mercy, and pardon the individual from blame. Is this not what our Lord did when he took our sins upon himself? "Therefore, my friends, I want you to know that through Jesus the forgiveness of sins is proclaimed to you. Through him everyone who believes is set free from every sin, a justification you were not able to obtain under the law of Moses" (Act. 13: 38-39).

Does it always seem fair? Does another have the right to cause harm? In no way am I condoning mistreatment of any kind.

Address what has grieved you with one or more witnesses while openly declaring you do not give permission to be ill-treated in any way. Just remember always to allow room for the love of God to have its way in every situation. "Most important of all, continue to show deep love for each other, for love covers a multitude of sins" (1 Pt. 4:8). Once past mistakes have been sincerely forgiven, do not rehash the matter any longer in your heart, mind, or words. For the Lord says: "I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more" (Jer. 31:34). What happens when the offense continues to persist? Continue to pray for them as you walk in love when doing so. Don't let pride have its way in your heart when it comes to forgiveness.
