LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Shout joyfully to God, all the earth, alleluia; sing a psalm to his name, alleluia; praise him with magnificence, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. **Offertory:** Praise the Lord, O my soul; I will praise the Lord throughout my life; I will sing to my God for as long as I live, alleluia.

Communion: The Lord has risen and has appeared to Peter, alleluia. St. Peter, our first Pope, is the unique thread unifying all the readings today. He speaks to the Jews in the first reading, to us in the second reading, and then, as highlighted by the Communion Antiphon, is mentioned in the Gospel, though only briefly, as a proof that the Lord has risen, i.e., He appeared to Peter, whose testimony can be trusted. As we rejoice in the resurrection, our attention is already being drawn to the teaching office of Peter and the unity of the early Church in his person. I wish to draw your attention to a particularly profound passage in his letter from the second reading: "conduct yourselves with reverence during the time of your sojourning, realizing that you were ransomed from your futile conduct[...] with the precious blood of Christ". We are a treasure in the sight of God, having been ransomed at a great cost. Just as we treat sacred things in the sanctuary with reverence because they are consecrated to the service of God, even more so are we to treat ourselves and others with reverence. The chalice at Mass is consecrated that it might carry the Precious Blood; so we too must let ourselves be filled with the Holy Spirit. The Entrance and Offertory Antiphons take on a deeper meaning, then, because the praise offered in them comes from a soul responding to the realization of its own preciousness in the sight of God. Rejoice in your Savior who treasures you more than anything. He is risen!

The Easter procession and Mass at St. Michel was beautiful. The lower school had a day outing to the new Circe la Souce recreation area, a very nice pool, play, and snack bar at the spring that also provides our water (not the same water!). The clinic is fully operational again, and we have over \$1,000 to show for the quarter. The water system going under the river has been repaired and the work moving the water line away from the road is starting. Father Asmith purchased the cisterns for the school and rectory shower facilities. Please keep the kidnapped midwife and Haiti, in your prayers.

THE JOY OF THE RESURRECTION

Part III

"Your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy away from you" John 16:22

The fact that Jesus died and was resurrected is our hope and joy because Christ's resurrection guarantees our own! To rejoice in the hope of resurrection is an act of faith. From God's perspective, it has already been accomplished. Christ is **"the firstborn from among the dead" (Col. 1:18)**. We believe and profess that that there will be many resurrections to follow, including ourselves.

St. Paul asked, **"What if there is no resurrection?" (1 Cor. 15:13– 18)**. In that case, Christ has not been raised, our faith is useless, and the gospel is false. If this were true, then we are not saved, and the dead will stay dead. Without the truth and doctrine of the resurrection, we cannot have hope or faith in Christ (**v. 19**). If this life is all there is, and death is the end, then death and sin have won. On the other hand, if Christ did rise from the dead, then our hope is firm. In this case, our faith is powerful, the gospel is true, we are saved from sin, and proclaiming the good news of Christ is our greatest privilege and responsibility. proclamation that Jesus is alive and present with us. In the Resurrection appearances, the disciples experienced Jesus in their midst. The same Jesus who had walked with them now again touched their lives and spoke and ate with them, but He was radically changed. Clearly, Jesus had not simply come back to life like Lazarus did; He now lived the glorious life beyond death. Yet, he was still with them, and the Resurrection proclaims that Jesus is with us as well. Luke's story of the Ascension is not a declaration of Jesus' absence. He is announcing that Jesus is now present in every space and time. We encounter Jesus in the Scripture, in the "breaking of bread", in the sacraments, and in our brothers and sisters. As we recall the stories of the Resurrection appearances, Christ is once again with us, forgiving, feeding, and consoling.

Secondly, death has been conquered. Death now opens the way to eternal life. Jesus gives witness to God's faithfulness even in death. We need not be afraid of death since it is not the end but the beginning of eternal life. Jesus' Resurrection gives meaning to suffering and death as the way to salvation.

Thirdly, Jesus' Resurrection affirms the value of the human person and the world in which we live. Jesus was raised as a whole person—body and soul. He did not take on human flesh and then discard it; Jesus retained His whole humanity. Along with the doctrines of the Incarnation and the Eucharist, the Resurrection assures us that God has identified with matter. God has embraced the human condition. A profound unity forever exists between God and the world, between spirit and matter. As Christians, we do not believe simply in the immortality of the soul; we believe in the immortality of the human person. Jesus' Resurrection and ours speak of continuity between this life and the next. Jesus' Resurrection also acknowledges the value of creation:

"For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God, for creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies" (Rm 8:19-23).

The whole of creation therefore is joyful because of the resurrection of Jesus. Thanks be to God. He has truly won the victory, all praise and glory to Him! Alleluia!
