#### LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I have called out to you all the day; for you, O Lord, are good and forgiving and plenteous in mercy to all who call upon you.

Offertory: O Lord, look down in order to help me; let them be covered with confusion and shame, who seek after my soul to take it away.

Communion: If a man wishes to come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me.

The readings and antiphons this Sunday take a sober turn, focusing on our Lord's Passion and calling us to make an offering of our sufferings. It is fitting that the Liturgy should turn its gaze toward Calvary on this first Sunday of September. Traditionally the month is dedicated to the Holy Cross, which is celebrated on September 14. We also celebrate our Lady of Sorrows on September 15, commemorating our Blessed Mother's sufferings as she endured the agony of seeing her Son so cruparish rose significantly during the past fiscal year and elly treated and executed. All this goes to show us that our Lord came not to grant us "the good life" but a life free of slavery to sin, which often entails "redemptive expectations by approximately 3%. Since July 1<sup>st</sup> it has suffering", i.e., sufferings that are transformed into medicine for the soul. In this way, nothing has power over us anymore, and those "who seek after my soul to take it away" (the powers of Hell) are "covered with confusion and shame" because one of their most powerful tools in getting us to sin (avoiding suffering whatever the cost) is rendered ineffective, as Jesus trod the path of suffering that we might never be alone. Suffering is inevitable in this life because of our fallen world and nature, so our Lord mercifully ensured that we would have company on that narrow road that leads to salvation. ## THIS YEAR'S "EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL," EXTERNAL AND INTERNAL

PART II

Last week's reflection ended with a question. If a belief is something on which a person is prepared to act, then people who believe Catholic teaching on the Eucharist—and maybe even people who are *trying* to believe it, since a belief is often something that we have to move toward over time—should be prepared to act differently as a result. But how exactly?

One answer is pretty obvious. Such a person is going to want to be close to the Eucharist. If these small pieces of ordinary matter, wine and bread, really do become, in some miraculous way, the blood and body of a person who walked on the earth 2,000 years ago; and if that human person was not just a human person, but was also somehow the unimaginable divinity-beyondall-worlds, about whom we hardly know how to speak, making himself present with us as a pure unmerited gift—then what kind of lunatic would I have to be to ignore all this? If I'm indifferent toward a gift like that, the only gift that can satisfy and more than satisfy every longing, then something is askew. Possibly I am damaged in some way, intellectually or emotionally, so that this greatest of all gifts does not bring me to the reaction one would expect, namely acceptance and overwhelming gratitude. Possibly I am secretly frightened of what might happen to me if I did receive the gift in full knowledge of what I am receiving. (Those skewed responses, of course, are all too real and frequent, and familiar to nearly all of us in some degree; they are presumably consequences of our current still-sinful way of being.) Or possibly my relative indifference signals that at some level, deep down, I don't really believe these teachings, or not altogether, not all the time. I am possibly at least a part-time member of that 37% of practicing Catholics whom the Pew Center survey, mentioned last week, found willing to say that no actual transformation into body and blood takes place at Mass.

So if we are working to keep ourselves, as much as possible, from being part of that statistic, we had better think about what we are being offered here, and try to react accordingly. We will probably be able to guide our external reactions more successfully than our internal ones. That is, I might *not* be flooded with spontaneous gratitude when I come away from the altar. But that is not, at least in any short-term way, my fault; it is not under my control. What is under my control is my presence: I can, usually, get myself to Mass. I can also reflect on whether it would be good to come more often than the once-per-week minimum. Such things depend on many circumstances, and for some the answer will be legitimately 'yes,' for others legitimately 'no'; but I suppose we should all see some attraction to more frequent communion—if the Eucharist is really what we say it is.

But what else? Surely the effects of this belief should not be confined to the formal liturgy. If the Eucharist is, as the Catholic catechism puts it, the "source and summit of the Christian life," then belief in it, when it becomes a deep belief, should permeate and reorganize everything we do. "If you love me," says Jesus,

"keep my commandments." If we really believe that we have been given a gift of this sort—a gift that includes forgiveness, and love, and all the things that we broken and struggling human animals really need, despite the advertisements that try to sell us other needs—how damaged would we have to be not to love the giver? And how much more if the giver is also in some strange sense the gift, and in the process of giving he has shown the solidity of his love by accepting and transforming rejection, and torture, and murder? If we are trying to enact some (vastly smaller) kind of love in return, we will want to attend to those commandments: the first of which was about loving God, and the second about loving other humans.

It makes sense even on a purely psychological level: if we are conscious of having been given love and forgiveness and all that we need, how are we going to withhold those things from another broken human animal who clearly needs them? Won't we be generous in handing out the forgiveness? Won't it eventually start to be the case (we can hope!) that such generosity will no longer be done out of a sense of burdensome duty, but as a natural reaction to having been loved ourselves, to thinking that the world really could run this way (though it currently does not) and so being eager to participate in its transformation? As a friend told me recently: "I think the most sensible reaction to a really beautiful liturgy would be to go out and feed somebody." Or to give that somebody whatever else he might need: clothing or shelter or love or forgiveness or hope. Or to work towards a world where all these things are not in such short supply.

Those are two plausible effects of a belief in the Eucharist. But I want to think about a third—one that could be said to include the other two and a lot of other things also. It's easy to overlook or forget, but it's there, front and center, in what scholars think is the oldest written account of the Eucharist that we have. This is not one of the last-supper narratives in the Gospels, but the reference in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, written about 54 A.D.

Paul's description of the Last Supper is in chapter 11, but there are a few relevant sentences in the previous chapter, where the main question is about eating meat sacrificed to idols. The sentences contain, twice, a key word, one that is difficult to translate because there are too many possibilities: the Greek koinōnía, which means 'sharing' or 'fellowship' or 'participation'— or our most common word for the Eucharist: 'communion.' In a literal translation, Paul writes: "This cup of blessing that we bless— is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? This bread that we break—is it not the communion of the body of Christ?" (10:16)

It would be nice to know what he meant. It is not an exaggeration to say that no one is quite sure. Even the experts in Greek language and culture have only succeeded in narrowing it down to three possibilities. But if we look into what those three possibilities are—next week, because here there is no more space!—we will come away with one last key to what belief in this teaching of the church has to mean. Whatever else the Eucharist is, it involves koinōnía.



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
