

# LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Behold, the Sovereign Lord is coming; kingship, government and power are in his hands.

Entrance: Let all the earth worship you and praise you, O God; may it sing in praise of your name, O Most High.

Offertory: Shout joyfully to God, all the earth; shout with joy to God, all the earth; sing a psalm in honor of his name; come and hear, all you who fear God, and I will tell you what great things the Lord has done for my soul, alleluia.

Communion: Andrew said to his brother Simon: "We have found the Messiah" which means Christ; and he led him to Jesus.

The season of Epiphanytide, culminating with the Presentation of the Lord on February 2, is filled with little epiphanies or "manifestations" of Jesus' saving mission for the whole world. Almost every Gospel this month touches on the healing of illnesses and exorcisms of demons, which are signs of the Messiah's arrival and of God's desire to "renew the face of the earth", restoring creation to its original glory. Hence, we see the Entrance and Offertory Antiphons exhorting "all the earth" to offer praise and worship to God. The Chosen People of Israel were God's vessel through which salvation would come to the world; in these latter times, those who are baptized now constitute the new spiritual Israel, the Catholic Church. Like St. Andrew, may our encounter with Jesus lead us to become beacons for others, leading them to the One Who gave everything to save us from eternal damnation. This intimate encounter with Christ is cultivated by a life of regular prayer and frequenting of the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, Jesus Christ Himself. May the remainder of this Epiphany season be an opportunity for us to rediscover the abiding Presence of the Son of God under the forms of bread and wine. O come, let us adore Him! # FROM THE PASTOR





CLOSE YOUR EYES- OPEN YOUR EARS TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Part II

"When the angel entered Mary's home, he greeted her and said, "You are favored by the Lord! The Lord is with you." Luke 1:28

Does bowing your head and closing your eyes make your prayer time more effective? Can you connect with God better that way? I remember as a kid that bowing our heads and closing our eyes was common position when it came to prayer. Folding my hands was also an essential part of prayer. But do these actions help us hear God better? "The tax collector would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (Lk. 18:10-14). Does such a text give any clue to how I should position myself to hear the voice of God?

Well, how did Jesus pray? John 17:1, Mark 6:41, and Mark 7:34 seem to indicate He did just the opposite of bowing His head and closing His eyes – He looked up and kept His eyes open. Once Jesus prayed with his face to the ground (Matthew 26:39). So is that how we should pray? Then why do we often hear instructions like; "close your eyes and

bow your heads and let us pray". Watch the next time someone says, "Let's pray." Everyone knows to bow their heads and close their eyes regardless of how spiritual they are. I do think bowing the head necessarily shows reverence towards God and closing the eyes helps you focus on Him by blocking out things around you if the mind and heart are not unison with such outward actions. But are they necessary for effective prayer.

Jesus never instructs anyone to bow their head or close their eyes. He was more interested in their hearts than their posture. In Luke 18:9-14 we see the Pharisee and the tax collector praying. We see that humility can be displayed in one's actions. The Pharisee boasted in his "prayer" that he was better than others, even the tax collector standing nearby. He even boasted about his giving and fasting. The tax collector was so humbled and grieved by his sin that he couldn't even look toward heaven and called himself a sinner. Jesus called the tax collector humble and justified before God. Perhaps that's why some bow their head and close their eyes?

However, sit, kneel, bow, lay down, raise your hands, dance, jump, be still, bow your head, close your eyes, keep them open – I'm not sure those are the most important matters of prayer. It Is the heart. Perhaps we would be better off sometimes being still and knowing He is God (Psalm 46:10). Other times we are so full of joy we must be like David and dance before him (2 Samuel 6:14). Regardless of the position you use in prayer, when you do pray, what are you saying to the Lord while in those positions? The Lord said to Samuel, "For the Lord sees not as man sees: man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7). You will find Him when you seek him with your whole heart (Jeremiah 29:13). BUT WHY CLOSE YOUR CLOSE YOUR EYES? OPEN YOUR EARS TO THE HOLY SPIRIT.
