

NEXT WEEK'S READINGS FOURTH SUNDAY IN **ORDINARY TIME**

First Reading

Deuteronomy 18:15-20 Moses tells the people that God will raise up for them a new prophet. **Responsorial Psalm** Psalm 95:1-2,6-7,7-9 A song of praise to the Lord. .

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: The Lord, walking by the sea of Galilee, saw two brothers, Peter and Andrew, and he called out to them: Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.

Offertory: The Lord's right hand has shown strength, the Lord's right hand has exalted me. I shall not die, but live; and I shall declare the works of the Lord.

Communion: Follow me; I will make you fishers of men. Whereupon they, leaving their nets and their boat, followed the Lord.

With the radiant message of Epiphany about God's desire to save the whole world comes a solemn warming: mercy is here, therefore repent and believe in the Gospel. The Antiphons today reflect the call to turn our lives around in the persons of Sts. Peter and Andrew, who left everything to follow Jesus. A question we must ask ourselves is what are we willing to give up in order to free ourselves to live holy lives in preparation for the joys of heaven? What are we NOT willing to give up and why? We were created for God but were lost to Him because of the fall of Adam and Eve. Now Jesus has come in the lowly manger to the Magi, the Baptism at the Jordan, and the wedding at Cana to reveal to us that the time has come to reverse the damage of the Garden. This season of Epiphanytide is about Jesus gradually revealing Himself and the coming of the Kingdom, which will demand of us a radical change. Are we ready?



FROM THE PASTOR



CLOSE YOUR EYES- OPEN YOUR EARS TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Part III

"When the angel entered Mary's home, he greeted her and said, "You are favored by the Lord! The Lord is with you." Luke 1:28

Psalm 46:10 says: **"Be still and know that I am God"**. It is a call to be attentive to God in prayer. Praying is nothing but talking and listening to God. Closing your eyes in prayer is where you can devote your complete attention by aligning the body, soul, and mind. It includes praise, worship, and an outpouring of the heart. Otherwise, one can talk to God anytime and anywhere, where God's response through the Spirit or mind depends on one's personal connection, faith, and dependence on God.

My sense of hearing gets strong when my eyes are closed, and my imagination is more active when my eyes are closed. The same could be said when I close my ears to sounds of distraction — the radio, podcasts while driving, or music — and instead embrace the silence. In silence I am more able to see what God wants me to see and hear what he wants me to hear. Maybe you may have a different experience of attending to God's voice. St. Teresa of Avilla, the Catholic Doctor of Prayer, said, *"those in prayer nearly always have their eyes closed; and it is an excellent custom for many reasons, because it is doing oneself violence in order to turn one's eyes away from the things of the earth."* "Doing oneself violence" refers to the practice of mortification when a Christian suffers, often acting it out upon his or her own body — foregoing a certain food, waking up earlier, sleeping without a pillow, etc. — for penitential purposes. (Note: We are not talking about mortification to the point of physical harm — simply restricting or restraining ourselves from certain pleasures or commodities.)

In a way, the physical nature of praying with our eyes closely mirrors this approach of physical mortification. Naturally during prayer, we are inclined to close our eyes, narrowing our gaze until we shut out everything else. By shutting down the faculty of sight, we enter on the way that leads into the mystery of God. One could almost describe a religious contemplative or mystic like St. Teresa as having gone through life with her eyes closed when we consider how practiced she was at mortifying herself.

Can the average Christian out in the world literally afford to restrict his sight to such a degree when he is often on the move, trying to maintain his productivity? It is a blessing, therefore, that our senses are not only designed for experiencing the external world; we also have internal ones. Those include the *imagination, memory, and reason*. To free the internal senses for Godly contemplation, then, one grace for which we might pray during this year is to focus on the present moment. There is not anything wrong, per se, with maintaining a busy life; many saints were very busy — like St. Teresa of Calcutta or the papal saints — but they were highly practiced at keeping their focus on the present moment where the truth is always to be found, the truth that God is here with us right now, the very reason why one closes the eyes.
