

2024 ANNUAL DIOCESAN APPEAL:

First Reading

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance (Ash Wednesday): Your mercy extends to all things, O Lord, and you despise none of the things you have made. You overlook the sins of men for the sake of repentance. You grant them your pardon, because you are the Lord our God.

Offertory: The Lord will overshadow you with his pinions, and you will find efuge under his wings. His faithfulness will encompass you with a shield. Communion: He will overshadow you with his pinions, and you will find refuge under his wings. His faithfulness will encompass you with a shield. Every so often we will encounter a particular Psalm repeated throughout the Liturgy because of its importance and relevance to the season. The First Sunday of Lent is one of those; all three Antiphons this Sunday come from *Psalm 91.* It consists of a prayer of confident trust in God's Providence; He will protect the one who takes refuge in Him and let no harm come to him. This Psalm like all the Psalms is perfectly fulfilled in Christ, Who, providing an example for us, chose to rely solely on His Father in following His Will. The Devil attempted to twist this Psalm, cherry-picking passages to try to force Our Lord to "test" the Father's faithfulness, undermining the entire intent of the Psalm (i.e., trust). As we embark on our Lenten penances, let us strive to trust God more and more in the daily circumstances of our lives. And let us do so joyfully! The Entrance Antiphon from Ash Wednesday is included to remind us that God desires our repentance and renewal not out of spite for our misdeeds but because He created us, and we are therefore precious in His sight. He does not want to lose us to lesser gods that will leave us unsatisfied and empty, even - God forbid - into eternity. The Lenten Season has begun, but what exactly does "Fasting and Abstinence" actually mean? Below is the USCCB Definition...

Fasting and Abstinence (USCCB): Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for <u>Catholics</u>. Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18-59. A person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards.

Walking with Moms in Need is in the process of surveying needs and resources in our community for pregnant women in need. We believe LifeSpring provides the most comprehensive/meaningful support to moms and pregnant women in need. Pope Francis has called on all Catholic parishes to be islands of mercy in a sea of indifference to the struggles of pregnant women in need. Our parish's ministry encourages you to support LifeSpring's wonderful program by picking up a baby bottle in the commons and filling it with change or contributions and returning it after Lent. HAITI: Over the past 6 to 9 months, our financial situation has significantly improved and though it is not a completely secure safety net, we have saved up approximately half a year's worth of operational expenses . We need **138 additional sponsors** by July 1st. Even if we count the pledged sponsors, we are currently at 132. Our clinic operations rely on donations not included with the school. Please pray for Haiti and much needed additional support.

FROM THE PASTOR



CLOSE YOUR EYES AND OPEN YOUR EARS

TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Part VII

"When the angel entered Mary's home, he greeted her and said, "You are favored by the Lord! The Lord is with you." Luke 1:28

The author of the book of Ecclesiastes says there is a right time for everything, including a time to keep silent, to speak, to mourn and to dance. During Lent, Catholics and in general all Christians use the 40 days to listen for God's voice as they strive to better their relationship with God and with one another. To help keep us on track, the Church offers us three pillars to focus our efforts on, during the 40 days of Lent: PRAYER, FASTING and ALMSGIVING. While the practice of fasting during Lent is widely known and observed, many are not aware of how to properly answer the Church's prompt to incorporate PRAYER during this season. God calls us to begin or strengthen our daily prayer schedule so that we may come to know him on a personal level. If we are truly going to grow in a relationship with Jesus Christ, increasing our time in prayer is exactly where we need to start.

We typically think of prayer as our speaking to God. This is true. However, prayer is an intimate conversation with God. A conversation is a two-way street. Prayer helps us become attuned to God's voice, seek forgiveness, and grow closer to him. It's a time for self-reflection and renewal, inviting us to align our lives with God's will. Through prayer, we find comfort, hope and strength in knowing that God is with us during our 40-day journey through Lent and beyond. Many saints also offered their personal reflections on what prayer is and how it unites us to God:

St. Augustine: "Whether we realize it or not, prayer is the encounter of God's thirst with ours. God thirsts that we may thirst for him."

St. Theresa of Avilla: "Before prayer, endeavor to realize Whose Presence you are approaching and to Whom you are about to speak, keeping in mind Whom you are addressing".

St. John Vianney: "My brethren, the good God looks neither at long nor at beautiful prayers, but at those that come from the bottom of the heart... There is nothing easier than to pray to the good God and nothing is more comforting."

Try to energize your prayer life this Lent by listening to God in prayer. Say what needs to be said to God, then listen for God to respond. We will not likely hear a voice like Saul did on the road to Damascus. We listen to God through prayer when we recognize God's answers or God speaking to us even in times, places, or ways where we do not expect to hear the voice of the Lord! Be open to listening to God through your prayers. Open Your Ears To The Holy Spirit.

People often ask me, "How do I come to know God's voice in my life?" My response is, "Start reading and then praying with the Scripture." Scripture is often referred to as the Living Word. This explanation implies that it is indeed alive and not dead. One of the ways we experience God's presence in our lives is coming to know God's voice and the way God acts in our lives through reading the stories and words of Scripture. Learn to pray with the Scriptures.
