NEXT WEEK'S READINGS TWENTY FOURTH **SUNDAY** IN ORDINARY TIME

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: You are righteous, O Lord, and right is your judgment; deal with this servant of yours according to your mercy.

Offertory: I prayed to my God, I, Daniel, and I said: "Hearken, O Lord, unto the prayers of your servant, and cause your face to shine upon your sanctuary; look with forgiveness upon this nation over whom your name has been invoked, O God."

Communion: Make vows unto the Lord your God, and accomplish them, all you who gather around him to present offerings; to the awesome God who takes away the life of princes; he is greatly feared by all the kings of the earth.

There is a wonderful interplay between the readings and the Propers this Sunday. God's righteousness is vigorously affirmed in the Entrance and Communion Antiphons and is also acknowledged in the Offertory. They are worshipful and humble in approaching God, recognizing that His perfect justice is also the source of His perfect mercy. We see that mercy promised in Isaiah and manifested in the Gospel. All these qualities of God exist in perfect harmony with one another but are a source of tension for us who cannot encompass God in His entirety. He is a wonderful mystery, never to be exhausted in all eternity. His goodness is perfect, His justice supremely rigorous, His mercy infinitely lenient, His beauty the source of all beauty, His simplicity the foundation of all truth. Let us meditate during Mass today and in prayers this week how all perfection can be found in God and how wonderful it is that He has sent His Son to recover us from the snares of hell if we but consent to cooperate with His plan for our lives. IN CONVERSATION WITH GOD: Part IV

I would like to conclude this little series with some reflections on a few comments I made back in Part II about preparing oneself for prayer. The goal of prayer is communion with God. Just as we experience communion with close friends or family members by conversing and often just being in their presence, so too can we experience the delight of being with God. The Catechism (2715) describes this kind prayer as such: "Contemplation is a gaze of faith, fixed on Jesus. "I look at him and he looks at me": this is what a certain peasant of Ars in the time of his holy curé used to say while praying before the tabernacle. This focus on Jesus is a renunciation of self. His gaze purifies our heart; the light of the countenance of Jesus illumines the eyes of our heart and teaches us to see everything in the light of his truth and his compassion for all men. Contemplation also turns its gaze on the mysteries of the life of Christ. Thus it learns the "interior knowledge of our Lord," the more to love him and follow him."

This idea of "gazing" is important because it implies an openness to what is in front of the "eye of the soul," so to speak. Contemplation is freely bestowing on us some illumination of grace that leads to fuller communion with God and provides insight into the life of the Trinity. We are all called to this kind of prayer, but we must cultivate an attitude of receptivity. Interestingly, the kind of attentiveness and wonderment that dispose us to contemplation begins with the experience and pursuit of truth, beauty, and goodness in the process of education.


"Educate" ultimately comes from the Latin educere, which is to "lead out of." Properly understood, education is the process of leading us out of ourselves to experience the world around us. At the heart of true education is the acknowledgment that truth exists and is the object of our intellect. We are wired to seek after truth, and this begins with the experi- Should you have any questions about our Catholic Faith, please ence of reality as it is presented to us. Our sense of wonder

and awe at the beauty of a flower, the grandeur of a symphony, the pristine clarity of a geometric proof, etc., constitute the starting point of education, which stir into flame the effortless curiosity that leads us to knowledge of God through created things. Interestingly, school - where education happens - comes from the Latin scola, which comes from the Greek skole, which translates to "leisure!"

Leisure is an attitude of mind and a condition of the soul that fosters a capacity to receive the reality of the world. Education strives to cultivate this attitude by drawing out of students the innate drive to seek after truth. This process possesses many similarities to the life of prayer insofar as we encounter the revealed truths of the Faith, gaze on them in wonderment, and are led to pursue a better understanding of them or live them out. This flies in the face of modern education, which is suffused with relativism and skepticism. Reality cannot be trusted; everything must be proven, and whatever reality or value system is constructed is as good as the next.

Strive, then, in addition to ensuring that you find a consistent time to pray every day, that you learn to embrace the givenness of things to instill within your soul a deep love for creation and its artful manifestations as captured in mathematics, art, music, architecture, literature, philosophy, etc. Relishing a literary hero's triumph, savoring a well-crafted piece of music, appreciating the wash of colors in a painting, all cultivate within us the kind of attention and desire that is the fertile ground for God to plant marvelous riches in the soul through the gift of prayer. It is in becoming more fully human that we can become more fully divinized in the life of grace, for grace builds on nature. God desires that heaven begin in the soul now; let God reveal Himself to you in the wonderful and varied language of creation, written with the pen of truth!
