

NEXT WEEK'S READINGS BAPTISM OF THE LORD First Reading Isaiah 40:1-5,9-11 Isaiah tells the people to prepare a way for the Lord. Responsorial Psalm 104:1b-4,24-25,27-30 A prayer praising God's greatness

LITURGICAL NOTES

Offertory: The kings of Tarshish and the islands shall offer presents; the kings of the Arabians and of Sheba shall bring gifts; all the kings of the earth shall adore him, all nations shall serve him.

The Epiphany (Greek for "manifestation") commemorates Christ's selfrevelation to the Gentiles or non-Jews in the persons of the Magi, signifying that His saving mission was ultimately for the benefit of the whole world. Early in the Church's history, this holyday also traditionally included Christ's manifestations at the wedding at Cana and the baptism in the Jordan, forming a triptych of Jesus' revelations of His Divinity. Today, the Magi offering their gifts to the newborn Lord are a sign of the submission of the entire world to the dominion of Jesus Christ. He came not only to save Israel from their bondage to sin but the whole world. Christ's mission of overcoming the power of sin began with the fulfillment of the Old Law with all its precepts and was then widened in scope with the New Law to include renewal of the heart. This is why the Antiphons for this Sunday speak of both the historical adoration of the Magi and the coming age when "all the kings of the earth shall adore him". Jesus won back creation by the shedding of His precious Blood, and it is left to us to cooperate with Him in reclaiming the souls of our neighbors for the Kingdom. At the end, everything and everyone will be subject to Him; let may this hope inspire us to persevere in evangelizing those within our reach and console us in affliction. Merry Christmas! FROM THE PASTOR



WE ARE PILGRIMS OF HOPE

Part I

"And I will establish my covenant between me and you and your offspring after you throughout their generations for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you" Genesis 17:7

God has promised to be God to His people, and through Jesus Christ, God has also become the Messianic Mediator of the covenant. By the indwelling Spirit of God, we the believers have become the beneficiaries of all these promises (2 Cor 6:16, 18), and when Christ returns, they will be fully realized: "And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God... The one who conquers will have this heritage, and I will be his God and he will be my son'" (Rev 21:3, 7). With this in mind, as human we tend to fall short of the expectation of God's covenant demands. So from time to time there have been an opportunity to renew our commitment to God, and that is where the idea of the "Jubilee year" falls in place.

A jubilee year, also known as a "holy year," is a special year in the life of the Church ordinarily celebrated every 25 years.

An important time for Catholics to seek forgiveness, deepen their faith, and reconnect with the Church and its history. Beyond personal transformation, Jubilee inspires a sense of community and outpouring of charity. This religious event resonates with believers worldwide who come together in Rome for a great cause.

Jubilee years have been held at regular intervals in the Catholic Church since 1300, but they trace their roots to the Jewish tradition of marking a jubilee year every 50 years.

These years in Jewish history were "intended to be marked as a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation, and involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields."

Officially, the 2025 Jubilee starts on December 24, 2024 with the well-known rite of the opening of the Holy Doors. On this day the four major basilicas of Rome – St. Peter's, St. John Lateran, St. Paul Outside the Walls, and St. Mary Major – will open their doors for the Jubilee year. Across 2025 most of the Jubilee activities will be at St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican and St. Peter's Square. The theme for 2025 is "Pilgrims of Hope", which was chosen to reflect the world's current challenges, such as war, the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the climate crisis. It's a call for renewed hope and faith in the face of adversity. This is an ordinary Jubilee, and the last ordinary Jubilee was held was in 2000. Pope Francis did, however, declare an Extraordinary Jubilee in 2015 for the 50th anniversary of the end of the Second Vatican Council. Pope Francis called for "signs of hope" in the Jubilee Year, including the desire for peace in the world, openness to life and responsible parenthood, and closeness to prisoners, the poor, the sick, the young, the elderly, migrants and people "in difficult situations. "The Diocese of Richmond will celebrate an opening Mass for the Jubilee Year on December 28. at the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart. I encourage you to use this opportunity of Grace to renew your commitment to Christ and His Church. Be on the look our for the guidance we shall be receiving from the Diocese to benefit from this HOLY YEAR.
