

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance (Suscepimus): We have received your mercy, O God, in the midst of your temple; even as your name, so al-so does your praise extend to the ends of the earth; your right hand is filled with righteousness.

Offertory (Diffusa est gratia): Grace has been poured out on your lips; therefore, God has blessed you for ever, world without end.

Communion (*Responsum*): Simeon had received a revelation from the Holy Spirit, that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is a kingly festivity. Forty days after His birth, the Blessed Virgin Mary, still a virgin after the miraculous birth of Jesus, is ritually "purified" (this feast was formerly called the "Purification of the BVM") and brings her Son to the temple to dedicated Him to God, as was the custom of the firstborn sons. The texts for this feast are very rich in describing God's selfrevelation in this ritual presentation. The Offertory beautifully captures both the traditional Marian character of this feast and its Christocentric theme. Psalm 44 (45) is often used in reference to Our Lady (Immaculate Conception, Assumption, etc.), but here we can see it also referring to Simeon, filled with the Holy Spirit, praising Christ. In fact, the first verse of the Psalm is: "My heart overflows with noble words. To the king I address the song I have made". One can sense the ecstasy he is experiencing. The Alleluia chant (often different from the translated "acclamation") in a marvelous turn of phrase declares, "The old man carried the Child, but the Child governed the old man." And then of course there is Simeon's canticle "Lord, now you let your servant go in peace..." with the Church homing in on his proclamation of Christ as a "light of revelation". Hence candles are blessed, and the church is adorned with more light. Truly, this feast is the crown of the Epiphany season! WE ARE PILGRIMS OF HOPE Part V

"And we boast in the hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope." Romans 5: 2-4

If suffering has a purpose, then there is reason to believe that good things will come out of what doesn't seem good. Through the cross we move in hope to victory! I've never met anyone who wanted to go through hardship and difficulty. I've never heard anyone say, "I can't wait till suffering comes my way" or "I'm loving this painful season. I wish I had more of this in my life." We're inclined to run away from pain and suffering rather than move toward it. Look in your house! How many painkillers do you have with you? But in Romans 5, Paul suggests a different and radical reaction to hardship and difficulty: hope and joy. He even has the courage to say that we "glory in our suffering"; some translations say, "we rejoice in our suffering." That statement alone raises the questions, "Why?" and "How?"

We live in a broken world. At some point, pain and suffering will crash into our lives. It's not a matter of if, but when. And when it does, we can be caught in the trap of believing, "There's no way out. This is it. This will be my reality forever." But in Romans 5, Paul tells us that hope in suffering is possible. It's a hope that is anchored in the cross. Paul reminds us in v. 8 that, "While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Christ's death

is a reminder of His overwhelming love for us. If Jesus was willing to die for us while we were in rebellion to Him, how much more will He care for us, His children, when tragedy strikes.

The cross reveals that Jesus can identify with our pain. In hard-ship, He knows what we are feeling because He has experienced it Himself. He knows what it's like to be betrayed by a close friend. He has experienced the shame of being accused of something He didn't do. He has endured physical pain that feels like it will never end. Just because Jesus can empathize with our suffering, however, doesn't mean all our pain will magically go away, nor will it lessen the grief and sorrow we're bound to experience; but it does help us see there's a bigger picture at work.

The cross is also intimately linked to the resurrection. The reason we can have hope in suffering is because, with Jesus, death leads to new life. Therefore, we can be assured that our pain isn't wasted. Jesus is with us in the midst of it, and it very well could be leading to something new – but to receive it, something old first may have to die. The shift from death to life not only fuels our hope, but it's also the seedbed of joy.

Joy in the midst of suffering isn't fabricated happiness that's disconnected from the reality of one's circumstances. Rather, it's a deep-seated conviction that everything is going to be okay. It comes from the assurance that Jesus is Lord of all. It's grounded in the hope of the larger story of God making all things new (Rev. 21:5).

While suffering can often knock us down and cause defeat, the cross and resurrection empower us to get back up and face another day. While pain and hardship, over time, can cause us to grow angry and bitter, focusing on Jesus and the victory He has secured can help us remain hopeful and full of joy. Nobody wants to suffer, but if we stay connected to Christ, He'll redeem our suffering in unexpected ways. I recommend that you take a moment and invite Jesus into your pain. Ask Him to help you see your circumstances through the lens of the cross and resurrection so that hope might be restored. For we are PILGRIMS OF HOPE.
