LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance (Factus est Dominus): The Lord has become my protector; he has brought me forth into free and open spaces; he delivered me because he was well pleased with me.

Offertory (Domine convertere): Turn to me, O Lord, and deliver my soul; save me for the sake of your love.

Communion (Cantabo Domino): I will sing unto the Lord who has dealt bountifully with me; I will praise the name of the Lord, the Most High.

Jesus teaches us today that the pursuit of personal holiness is the font from which our ability to help others flows. It is by imitating His life that we can grow in perfection. "No disciple is superior to the teacher; but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher." This can be pretty overwhelming, though, which is why the Church's response is so beautiful. She teaches us in the Offertory antiphon to be humble and acknowledge that we need the help of God to imitate our beloved Savior. What is so striking about the chant is that the melody is very stable, always returning to the tonic (the beginning of the scale) and creating a sense of contented confidence. Seeking God in prayer, then, is not merely about acknowledging our lowliness but recognizing His infinitely burning desire to help us, His undying love for His creatures even when they turn away from Him. He is ready to answer our heartfelt prayers of true repentance and petition. The Communion Antiphon is the perfect response to this prayer of confidence; as the saying goes – one who is forgiven much will love much. The joyful nature of this particular chant is encapsulated in the final phrase, "nomini Domini Altissimi" ([I will praise] the name of the Lord, the Most High). Communion chants are usually simple because they are processional chants, accompanying the faithful to the altar, but we see the aforementioned text quite suddenly drawn out and in the upper range of the melody, expressing the tuneful joy of the Psalmist – and all of us by extension – at the kindness with which we have been lavished by God. Let us respond to that kindness this Lent by readying our hearts with acts of fasting (not just food!), which clear away obstacles to loving God more and pave the way for that personal holiness to which Our Lord is calling us.

HAITI: "Over the next few weeks, I will introduce our twinning efforts with St. Michel Parish. Our Haiti Ministry has grown significantly in fifteen years. I witnessed Saltadere's unpredictable water access during regular visits. We've improved infrastructure and joined the DINEPA village water committee, securing government support for significant projects. A 2012 project moved over two miles of line to prevent breakage. Our first agricultural water project, funded by a Diocesan grant, secured water for a school garden and third-season crop, powered by a solar array and jet water pump. This program declined due to lack of interest and damage. The solar initiative powered a computer lab, and we collaborated with UVA Engineering to survey new water line paths. Sunday's readings encourage faith reflection, understanding and community. We still need members and sponsorships. Thank you & God bless, Bob bobfro@aol.com"

FROM THE PASTOR





LENT – THE WAY TO VICTORY WITH CHRIST
Part I

"If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" Matthew 16:24

In just a few days we will embark on our 40-day journey to the foot of the Cross, culminating in the celebration of Christ's salvific work through His suffering, death, and resurrection. Lent is at its core an extended act of prayer and penance, inviting us into a deeper relationship with Christ. It is a journey of spiritual discipline, leading us to conversion and renewal. The Church, in her wisdom, offers us the three pillars of Lent: **prayer**, **fasting**, **and almsgiving**, three essential practices that help us grow in holiness.

During Lent, we are invited to surrender attachments that distract us from God, whether they be material comforts, unhealthy habits, or even attitudes that keep us from living out fully the faith. What do we turn to for comfort instead of Christ? What consumes our time and energy more than prayer? As we lay down these "idols," we make room for God's grace to work in us. Jesus does not say "if you fast" but "when you fast" (Matt. 6:16), emphasizing that fasting is an integral part of the Christian life. Fasting is a tangible way of crucifying the desires of the flesh so that we may live more fully in the Spirit: "Now those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified their flesh with its passions and desires. If we live in the Spirit, let us also follow the Spirit" (Gal. 5:24-25). By embracing fasting, we experience in a small way the suffering of Christ and

prepare ourselves to share in the victory of His resurrection: "We know that our old self was crucified with Him, so that the sinful body might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin" (Rom. 6:6).

The holy season of Lent is also an important time in the Church's calendar when we prepare to welcome those who have begun the journey to be received into the Church at the Easter Vigil. They enter the journey born again with a new flame of faith, hope, and love. This year's theme of the Jubilee, "Pilgrims of Hope," reminds each of us of the importance of embracing our own journey with the new converts and with the Lord in the renewal of our commitment to Christian living. You and I are challenged to profess our faith not just with our lips, but even more by the way we live out our faith — a way that leads others, be they neighbor, visitor, or inquirer, to know Christ.

I would like to encourage you to follow the Lenten disciplines the Church sets before us for our benefit with new vigor since we walk with Christ our life and our hope. I encourage you to enhance your prayer life this Lent by attending daily Mass, Stations of the Cross, Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, and by praying the Rosary. Reading of Sacred Scripture and spiritual reading can be our compass and roadmap for the journey. Lent is also an excellent time for family prayer; take time to say grace before meals or choose one night a week to pray the Rosary together or to read a Bible story. Most important are our own efforts to turn away from sin through the Sacrament of Penance (Confession). This Sacrament of Healing and Renewal will be available all week except on Tuesdays and Saturdays.

Let us take this journey together, praying for one another and supporting one another in every way possible. It is important to remember that at the end of Lent stands a tomb. From the moment he was born, Jesus was marching to his death. He had to be willing to suffer and die for redemption to be accomplished and applied. Death was on his job description. But death was not his defeat because death was not the end of the story of the Messiah Jesus. We must die, die to self for the glory of God and for the reward of eternal life.
