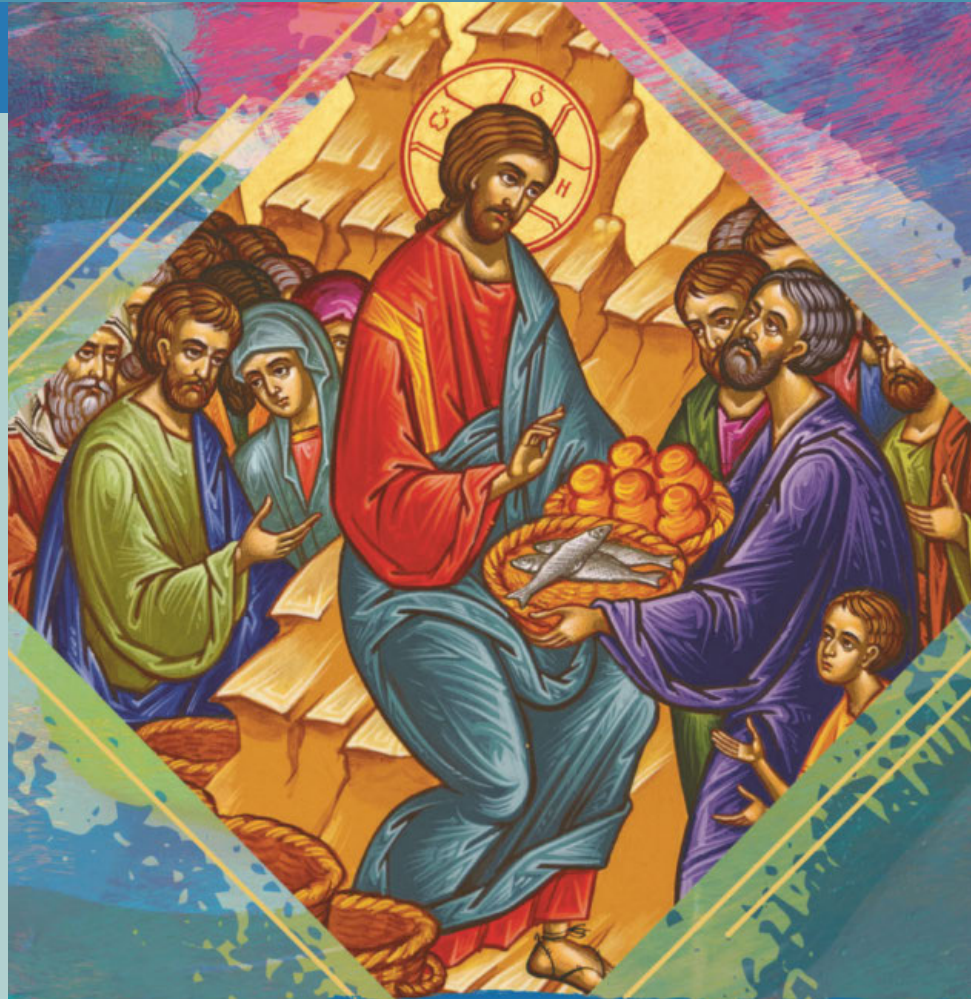

FROM THE PASTOR

"I am the bread of life...the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever...unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you do not have life within you." (John 6:48,51,53) That's what the feast of "The Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ" (*Corpus Christi*) is all about---a gift given out of love and by sacrifice...a gift that is to be received worthily and often...a gift **too necessary** to ignore or forget about.

This coming week Fr. Alek (June 24) and I (June 26) will celebrate our anniversaries of ordination to the Sacred Priesthood. The Lord has opened many doors to us and has directed us through the good and bad that every priest encounters in ordained ministry. Your prayers are so very important to the success of our efforts to preach the Gospel and image Jesus in our community. Please, in prayer, remember us as we thank God for the past years of blessings (5 and 29 respectively), and look forward with joy to the graces ahead!

O Jesus, our great High Priest, hear my humble prayers on behalf of your priests. Give them a deep faith, a bright and firm hope and a burning love which will ever increase in the course of their priestly life. In their loneliness, comfort them. In their sorrows, strengthen them. In their frustrations, point out to them that it is through suffering that the soul is purified, and show them that they are needed by the Church; they are needed by souls; they are needed for the work of redemption.

Today, on the Feast of Corpus Christi, the United States Council of Catholic Bishops begins a three-year focus on the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist that is intended to be a National Eucharistic Revival! There will be many resources made available to help Catholics learn more about the Holy Eucharist and grow in devotion to this incredible gift of Christ. 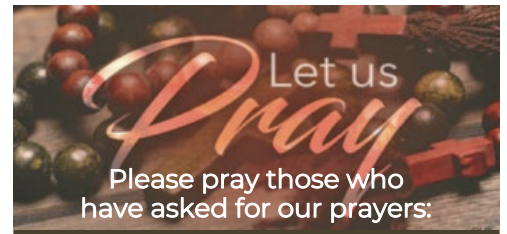


ANNIVERSARY BLESSINGS NEXT WEEKEND

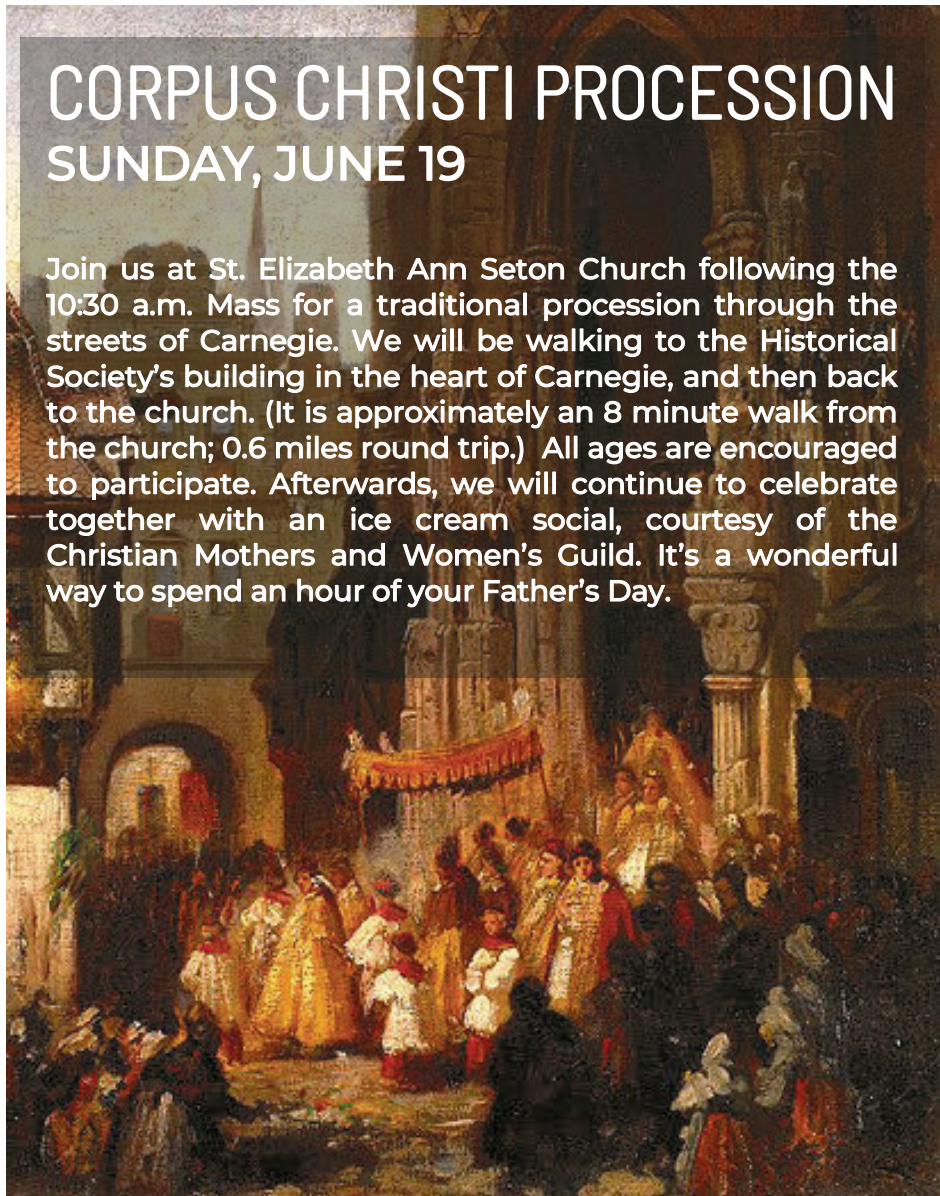

 SUNDAY, JUNE 19**

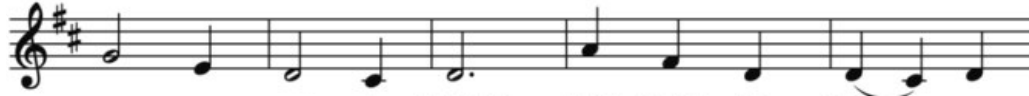

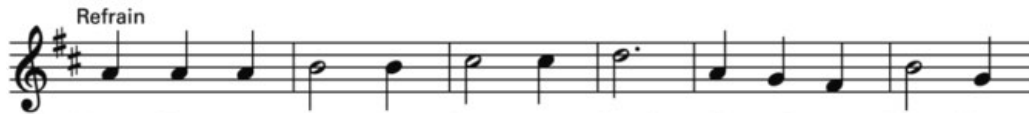

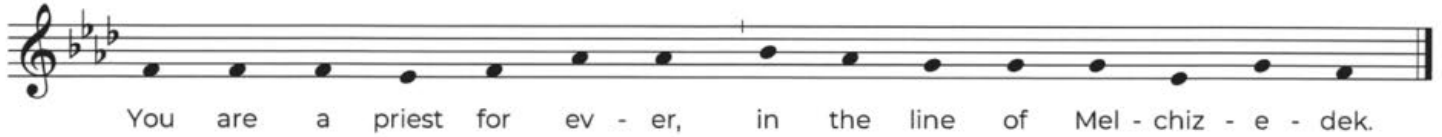

When I was going off to college, my wonderful next door neighbor who belonged to a non-denominational church advised me, "Honey, get in with the Christians, because they will help you to stay a good girl." I responded, "I am a Christian - a Catholic Christian," to which she retorted, "But do you really have a personal relationship with Jesus?" I said, "Of course! We hear his Word and receive his Body and Blood every time we go to Mass. And I pray to him every day." My neighbor seemed surprised, but was pleased to hear my reply.

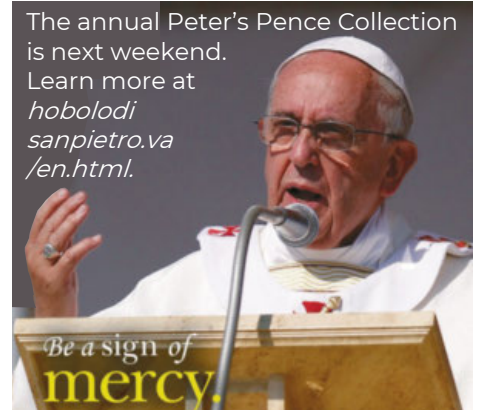
Last weekend, I went on a silent retreat. After a brief introductory session on Friday evening, the only time we used our voices was at Mass and Benediction. I did not know anyone there, but I looked around when gathered at meals or liturgy and prayed for all of them. We were seated only two at a table for meals. Another woman and me, who met very briefly and shared a few basic facts about ourselves on Friday, sat together for meals. We maintained the required silence, but I found myself praying for my tablemate in a special way all weekend. After lunch on Sunday, I whispered to her that I would be leaving before dinner, and she and I simultaneously said, "I'll pray for you!" We both got tears in our eyes as if parting from a long-time friend. Although we did not converse enough to really know or understand each other, we had been present to each other sharing meals and prayers all weekend. This experience illustrated in a simple and powerful way to me what a gift real presence is. No text message, email, avatar, or video call can convey the fullness of a personal encounter "in the flesh."

Real Presence and an intimate personal encounter are what Jesus gives us in the Eucharist, and what we celebrate today, on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. Real Presence matters. Those who could not receive Holy Communion in skilled nursing facilities due to COVID can testify how empty they felt without it. Those who risk their lives to attend Mass in Nigeria and other countries where persecution and terrorism against Christians are commonplace consider the Real Presence to be worth the risk.

Real Presence is the beautiful gift my Gram-pap wanted me to appreciate, cherish, and receive at least every Sunday as long as I live. Due to poor health, he could not attend my First Communion Mass or party, but he knew that receiving the Real Presence was more than a rite of passage and occasion for a pretty dress, family gathering, and cake. The Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Christ is the most important gift we will ever receive. It is so awesome, that it is hard for us to comprehend. Let's approach the Real Presence with childlike faith, so that when we say "Amen," we believe, appreciate, love, and try to love others like our Lord and our God.

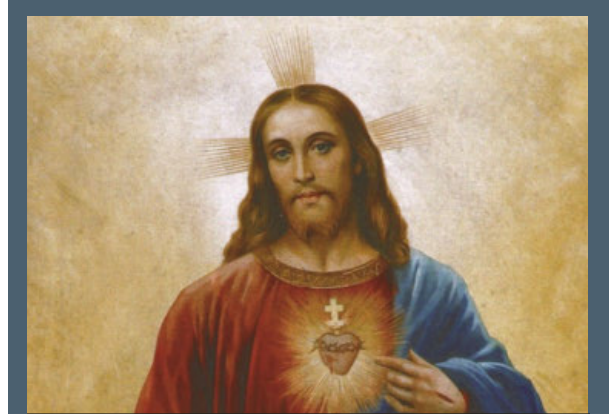


What does the Catechism of the Catholic Church tell us about the Eucharist?

1113 The whole liturgical life of the Church revolves around the Eucharistic sacrifice and the sacraments. There are seven sacraments in the Church: Baptism, Confirmation or Chrismation, Eucharist, Penance, Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders, and Matrimony.

1116 Sacraments are "powers that comes forth" from the Body of Christ, which is ever-living and life-giving. They are actions of the Holy Spirit at work in his Body, the Church. They are "the masterworks of God" in the new and everlasting covenant.

1118 The sacraments are "of the Church" in the double sense that they are "by her" and "for her." They are "by the Church," for she is the sacrament of Christ's action at work in her through the mission of the Holy Spirit. They are "for the Church" in the sense that "the sacraments make the Church," since they manifest and communicate to men, above all in the Eucharist, the mystery of communion with the God who is love, One in three persons.

DID YOU KNOW?

Today we celebrate the feast of Corpus Christi, the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This feast came about in the Middle Ages, in large part because of the devoted insistence of a holy woman named Juliana of Liège (1192–1258). Juliana had a great veneration for the Blessed Sacrament from an early age, and always believed that there should be a special feast to commemorate it. (Of course, we do celebrate the institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday, but a special emphasis on the Body and Blood of Christ is easily lost among all the many events and liturgies of the Triduum.) Juliana was confirmed in her desire by a vision. In a dream she saw a full moon, which she understood to signify the Church. But on the moon was a single, dark spot. This spot, she concluded, symbolized the absence of a solemnity to celebrate the Eucharist. So she started her lobbying. First she told her bishop, Robert de Thorete; then Hugh of Saint-Cher, a noted scholar who later became a cardinal; and finally a local Church official named Jacques Pantaléon. When Juliana spoke with him, he was the archdeacon of her local diocese of Liège. But he was soon promoted: first, to Bishop of Verdun; then Patriarch of Jerusalem; and finally, he was elected Pope Urban IV in 1261. In other words, she chose the right people to talk to! Her own bishop started the feast locally in 1247. When Pantaléon became pope, he remembered the feast day, and thought: why not extend the feast day to the whole Church? And so he issued a bull on September 8, 1264, officially instituting the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. The liturgical texts were composed by a Dominican friar named Thomas of Aquino — that is, Saint Thomas Aquinas. The texts that Saint Thomas wrote for the feast day are still well known to us. They include the sequence Lauda Sion; the hymns Verbum supernum prodiens and Pange lingua, which contain the verses we sing at Adoration (O salutaris Hostia and Pange lingua); and the beautiful hymn Adoro te devote (“Humbly We Adore Thee”). So what happened to Juliana of Liège? Sadly, she did not live to see her feast day extended to the whole Church. She died in 1258, after a life marked by tumult and difficulties. She had been elected prioress of her monastery and attempted to bring it back to a more rigorous and devout way of life. That put her at odds with some powerful people, and she was forced to flee and live her life in seclusion elsewhere. But she was canonized as a saint in 1869, and her feast day lives on to honor the Blessed Sacrament, to which she was so devoted.

3. **True.** The Bible and the Church Fathers testify to a universal belief in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. St. Justin Martyr wrote a description of Mass around A.D.153 that is almost identical to the Mass today.
4. **False.** Christ is sacramentally fully present under each of the species. All the graces of the Eucharist are received even if only the bread is received (see the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1390).
5. **A.** Through the grace of their ordination, only priests can celebrate Mass and offer absolution in the Sacrament of Penance (see the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1411).
6. **A.** Jesus was the divine son of God, "God from God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten not made," as we say in the Nicene Creed (see the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 469).
7. **False.** If a person doubts Christ's presence in the Eucharist, his/her lack of belief does not impact what happens during Mass at the altar. Christ is the one changing the bread/ wine into his body/ blood. And it is the universal belief of the Church that what Christ spoke about the Eucharist actually happens at every Mass. (See the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1375.)
8. **A.** "Under the consecrated species of bread and wine Christ himself, living and glorious, is present in a true, real, and substantial manner" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1413).
