VOTIVE CANDLES

Please do not take votive candles from the churches.

The candles at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church are designed for use in the special chimneys in the candle racks. These containers are heat resistant and sturdy glass. **The candle inserts are not intended to stand alone.** The containers can melt or crack if the candle is burned improperly outside of the recommended holder, possibly resulting in a fire. The candle chimneys may not be removed from the candle racks.

The glass container candles at St. Margaret of Scotland Church and at Ss. Simon and Jude Church are returned to the vendor after the candle has burned. When you light a candle, your donation pays for the wax refill, not the container. Please do not take them.

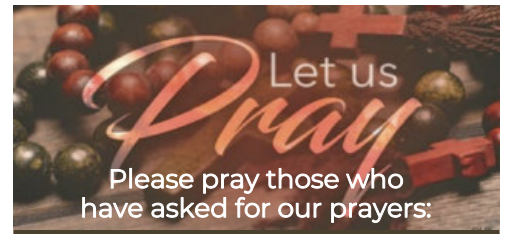
At all three churches

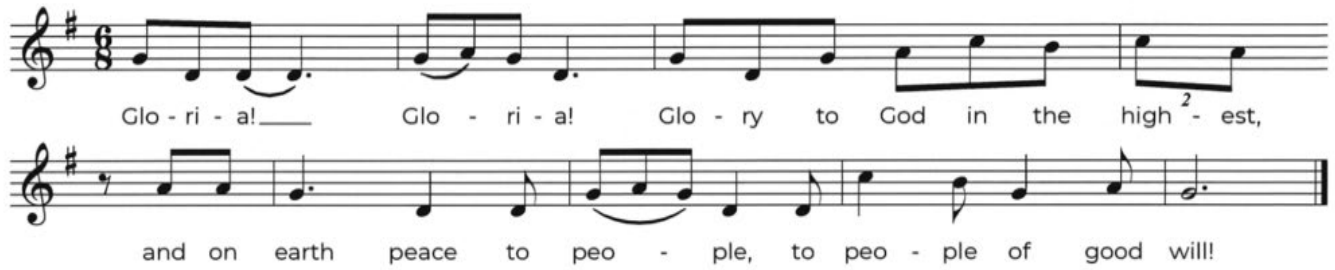

dates back to around 1048. Merchants from Amalfi obtained permission to build a hospital in Jerusalem to care for pilgrims of all faiths. The Order of Saint John of Jerusalem became independent under the guidance of its founder, the religious brother Gerard. Their symbol became the eight-pointed cross, which signifies the beatitudes. When the last Christian stronghold in the Holy Land fell after the Siege of Acre in 1291, the order settled first on the island of Cyprus, then Rhodes, and eventually Malta.

During that time, the Knights were recognized as a sovereign entity in international law, minting its own coins and maintaining diplomatic relations with other states. Even after the Knights lost the island of Malta to Napoleon, they maintained that sovereignty, making them like a nation without territory. Still today they maintain diplomatic relations with 112 countries and have an observer seat in the United Nations. In several countries, including France, Germany, and Ireland, the Order acts like the Red Cross, running hospital and ambulance services. It also operates a worldwide relief corps, Malteser International, aiding victims of natural disasters, epidemics, and war.

Here in Pittsburgh, the Order of Malta carries on the ancient mission of the Knights Hospitaller: *tuitio fidei et obsequium pauperum* (defense of the faith and care of the poor and sick). The Knights and Dames of Malta help with Eucharistic ministry at Mercy Hospital; we volunteer time and resources to support initiatives like St. Joseph's House of Hospitality in Uptown, Red Door downtown, and the Little Sisters of the Poor in Brighton Heights; and we meet regularly to pray — three times a

week over Zoom for Morning Prayer and several times monthly for Mass and other moments of spiritual enrichment. As chaplain, I've been blessed to help grow and participate directly in those activities.

My own involvement with the Order of Malta goes back to my time in seminary in Rome, where I helped with an intentional youth retreat at their headquarters. I've served as associate chaplain of the Order in Pittsburgh for three years, and on June 24 I became a full member of the Order myself, receiving the eight-pointed cross from George Cardinal Pell, prefect emeritus of the Vatican's Secretariat for the Economy, and Fra' Thomas Mulligan, who is the President of our Federal Association in the United States.

Being involved with the Order doesn't grant me any additional titles or honors. (I am not a "Monsignor," even if I do get a special outfit to wear at events with the Order!) The Order of Malta is a lay order, meaning that it is composed of and administered by non-ordained members of the faithful. Deacons, priests, and bishops associated with the Order merely support its activities. Finally, I do this in addition to ministry in our parish. Becoming a chaplain doesn't mean I'll be receiving a new assignment elsewhere.

I share this all with you to answer some questions I've received and because the Order of Malta is expressive, to me, of the very best that the Church has to offer — an ancient tradition, living and breathing in the modern world; proclaiming the Gospel in new and creative ways, while never hesitating to roll up our sleeves to serve the people who the Order has always lovingly called "our lords, the poor and the sick."

On June 23, I was invested as a Magistral Chaplain of the Order of Malta. In addition to explaining what that means, I thought I would also share what the Order of Malta is and what it's all about.

The Order of Malta — officially, the Sovereign Military Hospitaller Order of Saint John of Jerusalem, of Rhodes and of Malta — is a Catholic lay religious order, traditionally of a military, chivalric, and noble nature. The birth of the Knights Hospitaller

Are you a TEEN looking to fulfill service hours or just love to be with children and want to share your love of Jesus?

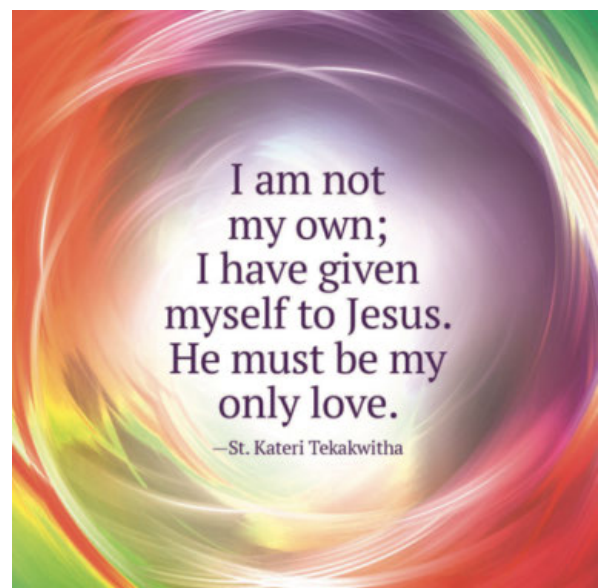

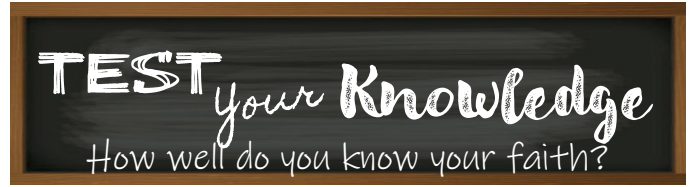


What does the Catechism of the Catholic Church tell us about the Eucharist?

1322 The holy Eucharist completes Christian initiation. Those who have been raised to the dignity of the royal priesthood by Baptism and configured more deeply to Christ by Confirmation participate with the whole community in the Lord's own sacrifice by means of the Eucharist.

1323 "At the Last Supper, on the night he was betrayed, our Savior instituted the Eucharistic sacrifice of his Body and Blood. WHAT JESUS DOESN'T SAY

"If Jesus wanted us to (fill in the blank), he would have said so."

We hear this argument applied to every controversial topic under the sun — and even some not-so-controversial topics, too.

Whenever someone is trying to make a case for a decision they have already made, they call in Jesus' scriptural silence on the matter as their expert, unimpeachable witness.

And sure, there's much Jesus doesn't talk about in the Gospels. But by this logic, we would have to assume that Jesus doesn't care, for instance, if we drive well over the speed limit (he doesn't discuss cars and highways in the Bible) or what we do online (he never mentions the Internet or websites at all!), when we know that certainly is just not the case.

Like the scholar of the Jewish law who challenges Jesus to define who exactly his "neighbor" is, we can argue semantics all we want. But if we rest in prayer and look deep into our hearts, we know what path we need to take, and it's usually not the easy one.

I find that I do this plenty in ways that are far more subtle. I lament that the situation facing me is not sufficiently "black and white." I become frustrated by the shades of moral grey and toss up my hands, claiming I don't know what the right answer is, insisting that I can't be blamed for the ramifications of whatever decision I make.

What I need to be doing in these situations is asking God for His guidance, even if it makes me nervous. I need to be like the scholar. He was brave enough to ask, even though I think he knew he wouldn't particularly like the answer. Let's strive for that same courage.
