Samuel was sleeping in the temple of the LORD

where the ark of God was.

The LORD called to Samuel, who answered, "Here I am."

Samuel ran to Eli and said, "Here I am. You called me."

"I did not call you," Eli said. "Go back to sleep."

So he went back to sleep.

Again the LORD called Samuel, who rose and went to Eli.

"Here I am," he said. "You called me."

But Eli answered, "I did not call you, my son. Go back to sleep."

At that time Samuel was not familiar with the LORD,

because the LORD had not revealed anything to him as yet.

The LORD called Samuel again, for the

third time.

Getting up and going to Eli, he said, "Here I am. You called me."

Then Eli understood that the LORD was calling the youth.

So he said to Samuel, "Go to sleep, and if you are called, reply,

calling out as before, "Samuel, Samuel!"

Samuel answered, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

They said to him, "Rabbi" — which translated means Teacher —, "where are you staying?"

He said to them, "Come, and you will see."

So they went and saw where Jesus was staying,

and they stayed with him that day. It was about four in the afternoon. Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, was one of the two who heard John and followed Jesus. He first found his own brother Simon and told him,

“We have found the Messiah” — which is translated Christ —. Then he brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, “You are Simon the son of John; you will be called Cephas” — which is translated Peter.

He ascended into Heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and His kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, Catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

## *From the Desk of Father Nick*



This week's scripture readings provide a perfect opportunity to reflect upon the idea of vocation, especially as it relates to faith and our life with God. Vocation is the call of God in our lives to be with him as beloved children and to fulfill his will for our lives. A vocation is as real in our lives as it has been for all those who have encountered God throughout the course of salvation history. In the first reading, the Lord calls out to Samuel while he was sleeping in the temple. Samuel, who is unfamiliar with the Lord, goes running to Eli, the high priest, thinking it is Eli who is calling him. Once Eli realizes that it is God who is calling Samuel, Samuel enthusiastically responds to the call of God. In the Gospel, Jesus encounters some disciples of John the Baptist and invites them to follow him. They had heard from John the Baptist that one who is greater would be coming and they trust that Jesus is the one. These followers become his first disciples and some of his closest collaborators.

Vocation is important for us as Christians for a number of reasons. First, vocation is the way by which we ensure our service of others. God is love, and his will for us is to love him above all and our neighbor as our self. Yet our vocation is the particular way in which God desires us to live out this golden rule. However, that is – single, married, religious, priest – it always seeks the good for God, for the other, for the Church and for all. Of course, this requires that we encounter the Lord frequently in the sacraments and in prayer so that we recognize his voice. It also requires, like Samuel and those first disciples, that we respond to the Lord's invitation with enthusiasm. More than anything this requires the trust that what God wants for us is good, no matter how challenging or uncharacteristic the request might seem. It can be hard to put our will and desires aside, but God's will for us is the way to salvation.

Vocation is also the way by which the service of our needs is ensured. If we are listening both for God's desires of us and for the needs of others, we trust that others are doing the same. In fact, we see this in the world around us every day. If we are hungry, someone is there to feed us. If we are sick, someone is there to care for us and heal us. If we are in sorrow, someone is there to comfort us. If we feel far from God, someone is there to reconcile us and shepherd us. Vocation truly is a two-way street. On the one hand, God speaks to us and we respond to fulfill his will. On the other hand, we seek to live out the purpose that God has given to our lives for his good and the good others, and others are doing the same so that our needs can be met.


And while our vocations are important for a truly vibrant world, some vocations are extremely important for the Church, and we should pray that they are strong and increase. Marriage unites husbands and wives in love and sets families forth into the world to teach us how to love each other in good and bad times alike. Religious men and women promise to live after the example of Jesus in poverty, chastity, and obedience, and spend their lives in prayer and good works to sanctify others and the world. Priests allow us to encounter Jesus in the sacraments and are our spiritual fathers who encourage us as they lead us ever closer to God. Please pray for happy and holy vocations in the Church so that the good work of God in the world and in our midst will never cease.

## Scripture Reflection: **Vocations**

“Here Am I Lord, I come to do Your will!” Psalm 40 not only spells out the readiness and willingness of the one who is called by God, but also the dynamic understanding and commitment about vocation.

Vocation means a call, initiated by God and prompting the listeners to respond. Without listening attentively, hearers can easily be misled and confused; especially in the midst of noisy distractions and overwhelmingly busyness, to identify the real call from God can be quite challenging.

The young man, Samuel, gets intrigued when he hears his name called three times during the night. Each time, he wakes up and asks his mentor, Eli, if he has called him. Eli listens to and assures him that he had not. That being said, Samuel calms down, goes to bed and recognizes the voice of God in the third time. One wonders if Samuel can recognize God’s voice without Eli.

The same happens to John the Baptist who, while standing with his two students and seeing Jesus walking by, introduces them to Jesus. They hear him and follow Jesus. Later, it is Andrew who tells Peter, his brother, that Jesus is the Christ that Peter comes to know Jesus and follows Him.

Though God launches the call, its recipients need prayers, help, feedback and encouragement from many good people to facilitate and authenticate God’s call. Many of us can be good enablers and mentors in these discerning procedures. Parents, teachers, friends, family members and colleagues, all are valuable and important for our vocation discernment.

As Samuel is in need of Eli and as the two disciples are in need of John, so we are in need of each other to discern our call and make good decisions about vocation. In this process, we need to be honest with God and ourselves. Whether we are living single lives or inclined to religious consecrated lives, ordained clergy as a deacon or priest, or married lives as husband or wife our vocation becomes authentic and genuine when we take time to pray over, to study and to consult with good people. Once the vocation is carefully discerned and honestly determined, God’s grace and courage are needed to follow it. Peace and joy in our hearts will be the fruits for those who listen to and respond to God’s call.

As a priest, I thank God for His call. Yet, I cannot imagine being a parish priest without parishioners. I do not know if I mean anything to you or not, but you mean a lot to me.



### Saint Sebastian DIED C. 288 FEAST DAY: JANUARY 20

According to the many legends surrounding Sebastian, he was born in Gaul and raised in Milan. Though a Christian, he joined the imperial army at Rome about 283. He made converts of officials and jailers, effected cures and urged Christian prisoners to stay strong in their faith. He was named captain of the praetorian guards, but the emperor, upon finding out that he was a Christian, ordered his execution. Shot with arrows and left for dead, Sebastian survived and was nursed back to life. Later, he denounced the emperor for his cruelty to Christians, and the emperor had him beaten to death. A favorite subject of Renaissance artists, Sebastian is the patron saint of archers, soldiers and athletes.

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
