It's hard to believe that Lent is just around the corner as we prepare for Ash Wednesday on February 17th. For some, it seems like Lent of 2020 never ended because the world was shut down by the pandemic less than three weeks after last Ash Wednesday. There has certainly been a great deal of suffering and penance to endure since last Lent, and I know that not being able to celebrate last Easter in our churches is still a source of spiritual pain for many.

Thankfully, this year, it appears that Lent, Holy Week, and Easter will go on, albeit with the restrictions that we remain under. In the next few weeks, information about Lenten devotions, liturgies, and special events will be published in the bulletin and mailed to your homes. While the pandemic will prevent us from doing everything we would like, there will still be opportunities for spiritual growth, such as bible studies, stations of the cross, extra Confessions, and more. All of this, I hope, will allow us to celebrate Easter with great joy, so please consider participating in as much as you can.

DIFFERENT METHOD FOR DISTRIBUTING ASHES THIS YEAR

In anticipation of Ash Wednesday, I wanted to inform you about how the Vatican is directing us to distribute ashes to the faithful. Unlike our normal practice of placing ashes in the form of the cross on your forehead, this year will be different because the pandemic prevents us from physically touching each person. Instead, the distribution of ashes will proceed in the following way:

After the homily, the priest will bless the ashes and sprinkle them with holy water;

Then, the priest will say to all those assembled either, "*Repent, and believe in the Gospel,*" or "*Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.*"

Then, each person will approach the priest, who will sprinkle ashes on the top of the head of each person without saying anything.

While sprinkling ashes on the top of the head is not the common practice in the United States, it is in many other countries. In baptism, we are washed clean from our original sin and anointed with Sacred Chrism as priest, prophet, and king on the crown of the head. It is fitting, then, that ashes, a reminder of our sin and baptism into death, be sprinkled on the crown of our heads because at Easter we celebrate the resurrection of Christ, the conquering of sin and death, and baptism into life.

When you attend the liturgy on Ash Wednesday, we will remind everyone of this revised practice for this year and will ask everyone to put their head down once they approach the priest so that the ashes can easily be sprinkled on the head.

In the meantime, let us keep one another in prayer as we prepare to make our Lenten journey together.

*If today you hear his voice,
harden not your hearts.*

The psalmist implores us: Do not freeze your hearts or numb your feelings!

We “hurt” ourselves when we fail to hear God’s voice who consistently and constantly invites us, His children, to mend our lives and return to Him. God is not interested in condemning or punishing His people. He yearns for our growth with tenderness.

Why and how do our hearts become frozen and hardened? Have we not heard Him enough? What makes our hearts numb or dumb? Aloofness, burn-out, extremism, excessive legalism, ignorance, or apathy? Whatever the cause, we are called to reconsider the way we relate to God by checking our “heart’s” status or condition: Are they healthy? Or so sick, so cold, and so hot that they are no longer able to feel? There is room for improvement! No matter how bad or ignorant our past was, new life begins “TODAY when we hear His voice”. We cannot undo our past, but we can learn from it and build up our future.

“Hearts” are much more than the physical organs that control and direct blood nutrients to feed our bodies. They are the operation center for our thinking, acting, and livelihood. Without loving hearts, the needy become invisible; the cry of the poor becomes silenced; people’s pain means nothing!

A callous or hardened heart is like “a piece of meat”, an ear that cannot hear, an eye that cannot see, a nose that cannot smell, or tongue that cannot taste. We become the living dead. The psalmist invites us to revitalize, cultivate, and educate our human senses. Melting hearts, defrosting them, and softening them will open the way for healing and understanding.

One of my own personal concerns is to guard against my presumptive mentality of arrogance that “I have been there! I have done it!” As familiarity breeds complacency, so arrogance feeds contempt, doesn’t it? It is tragic to see people suffering. But it is more tragic when their sufferings are not recognized and felt because of human numbness and indifference.

As a priest, I have heard many heart breaking stories and situations. I have celebrated many funeral Masses already. As a refugee for years in many refugee camps, I have been tempted to think, “I’ve gone through many worse things.” What suffering have I not yet experienced? Who could suffer more? Whether I am ignorant, naïve, over confident, self-doubtful, or low-esteemed, the psalmist reminds me that without a living heart, my homily can easily become an empty noise; the Mass I offer can become a hollow performance!


Saint Blaise

DATES: DIED 316 FEAST DAY: FEBRUARY 3

Saint Blaise is a bishop and martyr who lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. For a time, Blaise lived in a cave to escape persecution. On his feast, the church recalls a miracle cure associated with him and celebrates the blessing of the throats. Blaise apparently saved the life of a boy who was choking on a fish bone. The saint said that anyone who lit a candle in his memory would be free of infection, thus candles are used in the traditional throat blessing. He is listed among the Fourteen Holy Helpers, saints revered as healers. He is the patron saint of throat illnesses, animals, wool combers, and wool trading.

The sixth grade English Language Arts classes at Northside Catholic Assumption Academy are coming to the end of a unit entitled "Animal Allies." In this unit, students learned about how people and animals can interact, learn, and benefit from one another in various ways.

We read several stories from The Jungle Book, which focus on Mowgli's experiences in the jungle raised by wolves. Mowgli makes many animal friends in the jungle, who teach him about survival in the jungle as well as important life lessons. Additionally, we read another story from The Jungle

Book entitled "Rikki-Tikki-Tavi" in which a young mongoose helps to save a family from getting attacked by cobras. All of these stories are related because they teach children that animals are unique and valuable, and can also teach us many things. Students are also using these stories to learn about elements of plot, characterization, types of conflict, and figurative language. In English class, students wrote an essay on The Jungle Book in which they either wrote about important life lessons they learned from the book, or life lessons that Mowgli learned from each of his animal teachers. 
