Gospel: Jn 11:1-45

**Now a man was ill, Lazarus from Bethany,
the village of Mary and her sister Martha.
Mary was the one who had anointed the Lord
with perfumed oil
and dried his feet with her hair;
it was her brother Lazarus who was ill.
So the sisters sent word to him saying,
“Master, the one you love is ill.”
When Jesus heard this he said,
“This illness is not to end in death,
but is for the glory of God,
that the Son of God may be glorified through
it.”
Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and
Lazarus.
So when he heard that he was ill,
he remained for two days in the place where he
was.
Then after this he said to his disciples,
“Let us go back to Judea.”**

**The disciples said to him,
“Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you,
and you want to go back there?”
Jesus answered,
“Are there not twelve hours in a day?
If one walks during the day, he does not
stumble,
because he sees the light of this world.
But if one walks at night, he stumbles,
because the light is not in him.”
He said this, and then told them,
“Our friend Lazarus is asleep,
but I am going to awaken him.”
So the disciples said to him,
“Master, if he is asleep, he will be saved.”
But Jesus was talking about his death,
while they thought that he meant ordinary
sleep.
So then Jesus said to them clearly,
“Lazarus has died.**

And I am glad for you that I was not there,
that you may believe.
Let us go to him.”
So Thomas, called Didymus, said to his fellow
disciples,
“Let us also go to die with him.”
When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus
had already been in the tomb for four days.
Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, only about
two miles away.
And many of the Jews had come to Martha
and Mary
to comfort them about their brother.
When Martha heard that Jesus was coming,
she went to meet him;
but Mary sat at home.
Martha said to Jesus,
“Lord, if you had been here,
my brother would not have died.
But even now I know that whatever you ask
of God,
God will give you.”
Jesus said to her,
“Your brother will rise.”
Martha said to him,
“I know he will rise,
in the resurrection on the last day.”
Jesus told her,
“I am the resurrection and the life;
whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will
live,
and everyone who lives and believes in me
will never die.
Do you believe this?”
She said to him, “Yes, Lord.
I have come to believe that you are the
Christ, the Son of God,
the one who is coming into the world.”
When she had said this,
she went and called her sister Mary secretly,
saying,
“The teacher is here and is asking for you.”
As soon as she heard this,
she rose quickly and went to him.
For Jesus had not yet come into the village,
but was still where Martha had met him.
So when the Jews who were with her in the
house comforting her
saw Mary get up quickly and go out,
they followed her,
presuming that she was going to the tomb to
weep there.

When Mary came to where Jesus was and
saw him,
she fell at his feet and said to him,
“Lord, if you had been here,
my brother would not have died.”
When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews
who had come with her weeping,
he became perturbed and deeply troubled,
and said,
“Where have you laid him?”
They said to him, “Sir, come and see.”
And Jesus wept.
So the Jews said, “See how he loved him.”
But some of them said,
“Could not the one who opened the eyes of
the blind man
have done something so that this man would
not have died?”
So Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb.
It was a cave, and a stone lay across it.
Jesus said, “Take away the stone.”
Martha, the dead man’s sister, said to him,
“Lord, by now there will be a stench;
he has been dead for four days.”
Jesus said to her,
“Did I not tell you that if you believe
you will see the glory of God?”
So they took away the stone.
And Jesus raised his eyes and said,
“Father, I thank you for hearing me.
I know that you always hear me;
but because of the crowd here I have said
this,
that they may believe that you sent me.”
And when he had said this,
He cried out in a loud voice,
“Lazarus, come out!”
The dead man came out,
tied hand and foot with burial bands,
and his face was wrapped in a cloth.
So Jesus said to them,
“Untie him and let him go.”
Now many of the Jews who had come to
Mary
and seen what he had done began to believe
in him.

Reflection

The Bible, the love story between God and humanity, is sealed by God's covenant with His people. Covenant has been one of the most consistent threads that weaves the fabric of divine-human relationship together. Co-venant features a two-sided venue where both parties come to and join together. This is not a one-way street; it means a contract, agreement or accord on which the two partners make a mutual commitment. To seal this bilateral deal, they make a promise and commit themselves to each other. In bad times or good, they are called to be faithful to each other. In it, God becomes explicit in declaring that *"I am the Lord your God and you are My people"*. They belong to each other. Yet, human betrayals, abandonment and disobedience have severely degraded and decayed this commitment. Even so, God continues to be faithful and loving. The more we sinners run away, the more God reaches out and yearns for us.

Throughout scripture, this covenant has been honored as one of the most enduring motifs celebrating and enriching the divine-human relationship. From the creation accounts, the roles of Jewish ancestors, Abraham, Moses, David, kings and judges to the high-low experiences of God's people in the Old Testament, the covenant remained. From the infant and passion narratives, the ministries of John the Baptist and Jesus to the events of Jesus' resurrection and ascension and the coming the Holy Spirit in the New Testament, this covenantal bond has coherently strengthened and unified all elements of this biblical love story. In any vicissitudes of life, the covenant, *"You are my God and we are Your people"* has permeated the entire scripture. This timeless and unchanging dynamic continues not only to be reviewed, renewed and restored, but also to be an inspiration and guide for the life of the faithful in the future.

To the Prophet Jeremiah, the covenant is not merely written in stone or leather, but in people's hearts and minds. Thus, at home or in exile, in dark times or brightness, and in success or failure, God's people are reminded to learn by heart, to remember this covenant and hand it down to younger generations.

Jesus comes to usher in a new covenant – one that would reconcile us to God and draw all people to Himself. In disclosing His imminent death in the gospel this week, Jesus seems to long for the restoration of the original divine-human covenant broken due to human sinfulness. A ransom for many, His death is not an end in itself, but a life-giving death that opens to a new life and promising future. *"If a grain of wheat does not die, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit."* Covenant relationship demands the death to one's own selfishness and egoistic life style.

Jesus' passion, suffering, death and resurrection reaffirm to us that God's love is much greater and powerful than our sinfulness and failures, and life is stronger than death: The heart and soul of the divine-human covenant.


