From the Desk of Father Nick

The miraculous feeding of the multitudes that we hear in the Gospel this weekend is a story that always fascinates us. Jesus, seeing the large crowd and desiring to feed them, takes five loaves of bread and two fish, blesses them and hands them to his disciples to distribute to those gathered. And it wasn't that everyone there got a small morsel. They all had their fill of the bread and fish and the disciples gathered twelve baskets full of leftovers. For Jesus, this act of feeding the multitudes was both the fulfillment of his desire to nourish and strengthen the people under his care, as well as a foreshadowing of the Eucharist, where the Lord nourishes and strengthens us with the miracle of the bread become his Body. What may not seem naturally possible with faith becomes an act of the loving providence of God.

When I read this story I always imagine the reaction of the disciples who had distributed the food and the crowd that was fed. I wonder if the disciples made their way through the crowd with a touch of doubt in their hearts. I can imagine that they expected to run out of food after ten or twenty people were fed. How were the disciples' hearts changed once they realized the food wasn't running out? I know I have moments in my life where I go into something with a heart that doesn't fully trust and each step of the way God works amazing things to turn my heart around and remind me, yet again, just how powerfully he works in the world and in my life.

As for the crowds who had gathered to hear Jesus' teaching, I imagine their surprise as the disciples come around with bread and fish to feed them. Jesus and his followers aren't rich, so how could they afford all this food? I also wonder how quickly word spread that Jesus had worked a miracle in order to ensure the crowd had their fill. And when the crowds left and returned to their homes and villages, what did they tell their family and friends? Even though a disciple had physically given them the food, I would suspect that they all said, "Jesus fed me!" While our minds tend to ponder what is reasonable, when our hearts begin to reflect on the depth of the work of faith in our lives we may not be able to comprehend it all, but we acknowledge God in our lives and his desire to provide good things for us. The miracle stories like this one may be fascinating, but let us always know that God continues to work the same good things for us.

Power to share

“There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish; but what good are these for so many?” The concern reveals a very practical and common problem in our family, church and society today. While the needs are overwhelming, the supply is limited. The contrast between the need for the big hungry crowd and the limited supply of food became

quite a challenge!

Is this supply-demand equation possibly balanced? The disciples become pessimistic. They calculate that “the two hundred day’s wages worth of food would not be enough for each to have even a little”.

While facing such difficulty, Jesus tells the people to sit down and asks His disciples to share from what they have, even with only their current humble resources. All they have is the five loaves of bread and two fish. After Jesus blesses them, the blessed breads and fish are broken and shared. Surprisingly, they cannot imagine that after the whole crowd is fully fed, they collect the leftovers of twelve baskets of fragments which are more abundant than the original five breads and two fish that the boy originally had.

The message seems to be clear: Do not underestimate the power of sharing. If we are willing to share, the outcome can be beyond our calculation and imagination. Please do not overlook ordinary gifts or little things in life. Being rich or poor cannot be determined merely by how much money we have or how many treasures we possess, but by how often we share and use them.


Just as the boy who was asked to share his five ordinary loaves of bread and two fish to feed the five thousand, so we are called to use the five fingers each in our two hands to share and to care. Our bare hands with five fingers on each represent much more than their ordinary appearance. Seeing only their face value without recognizing the hidden potential of what they can do can be deceiving. If we had to list all the accomplishments done by the five fingers on our two hands during our lifetime, that list would be endless. I am not sure that we would have enough time and paper to finish the list! Our five fingers and two bare hands look humble, don’t they? Do not stare at the bare and be scared! Their potential can be beyond our imagination. They can even outweigh the feeding done by the five loaves of bread and two fish.

As Jesus calls us to share, He asks us to offer to others from what we have been given and what is available. As long as we are willing and able to share, we can feed a lot of people. Sharing never makes us poorer, but richer!

Saint James the Greater—First Century

Feast Day: July 25

Jesus called James and John, the sons of Zebedee, to leave their livelihood as fishermen and follow him. Perhaps because of their zeal and temperament, Jesus called them “sons of thunder”. James was the first of the twelve to be martyred; he was beheaded in Jerusalem by order of Herod Agrippa about 44. He is the patron saint of pilgrims, laborers, rheumatism, several Latin American countries and Spain, where Santiago de Compostela has been a famous pilgrimage center since the Middle Ages. Some legends say James preached in Spain before his death; others say his relics were transferred there. “The greater” distinguishes him

from the other apostle James “the lesser”, who likely was smaller and younger.



Saints Joachim and Anne

First Century Feast Day: July 26

Not mentioned in the Bible, Joachim and Anne are first named as the parents of Mary in the apocryphal Protoevangelium of James, which may date from the second century. In this story, they are old and childless, like the Old Testament Hannah, mother of Samuel, when angels deliver the news that Anne will conceive a child. Anne was an especially popular saint in medieval England, and her feast was celebrated in the West by 1350; Joachim’s feast was authorized or suppressed by various popes, but was joined with Anne’s in 1969. They are the patrons of married couples; Anne is also the patron of childless women, expectant mothers, and miners.



Blessed Stanley Rother - March 27, 1935-July 28, 1981

Feast Day: July 28

An Oklahoma farm boy, Father Stanley Francis Rother was born in Okarche, Oklahoma. Ordained a priest for the Diocese of Oklahoma City and Tulsa in 1963, he served in the diocese’s Guatemala mission for fourteen years, ministering to the native Tzutuhil tribe. Fr. Stan (or Padre Francisco, as he was affectionately known), learned the Tzutuhil language and became one with his poverty-stricken flock, ministering to his parishioners in their homes, eating with them, visiting the sick, aiding with medical problems and helping on their farms. While he served in Guatemala, a civil war raged between the militarist government forces and the guerillas and hundreds of thousands of Catholics were killed due to the Church’s insistence on helping people. Eventually, Fr. Stan was targeted. For his safety, he returned to Oklahoma, but was not able to hold himself back from his people. After a short period that was akin to his own “Garden of Gethsemane” moment, he returned to his people, famously saying that “the shepherd cannot run.” Within days of his return to Santiago Atitlan, three men entered the rectory and killed him. A true imitation of the Good Shepherd who laid down his life for his flock, Fr. Stan was declared a martyr and beatified in 2017.
