ADORATION OF THE MAGI • **BOTTICELLI**

Sandro Botticelli's **Adoration of the Magi** containing portraits of his contemporaries as well as a generally accepted selfportrait, was probably executed in the 1470s, early in his career. The scene takes place in a shed with a broken stone wall at the right. New branches emerging from the block of stone, like the peacock, denote rebirth and immortality. Referring to Christ's death, on the other hand, is the traditional morning pose of Saint Joseph, who stands behind the Virgin and Christ under the radiant star of Bethlehem. The elevation and setting of Mother and Child replicate that of the altarpiece itself elevated on the altar in the chapel. The crumbling arches at the far left signify the decline of pre-Christian Rome.

The eldest king, kneeling in front of Mary, bears the likeness of Cosimo de' Medici of the Medici family. He holds the feet of Christ, which he covers with a veil in the manner of a priest with the monstrance containing a consecrated Host. Many of the figures bear the resemblance of Cosimo's sons and grandsons, including the second king kneeling in the center with the red mantle. The art historian, Vasari, describes the heads in this scene as indescribable. "Their attitudes are all different, some full-faced, others in profile, some in threequarters, some bent down, and in various other ways. The expressions of the attendants are both young and old and greatly varied, displaying the artist's perfect mastery of his profession. It is a marvelous work in color, design, and composition." Standing to the far right is a young man in yellow who gazes out of the picture. This is a convention of self portraiture in the Renaissance, and the figure has thus been assumed to be Botticelli himself.

This altarpiece was dedicated on the feast of the Epiphany. The patron, **Gaspare di Zanobi del Lama**, had made a fortune through business connections with the Medici family and his position as broker for money changers. It was commissioned for his funerary chapel in Santa Maria Novella. The work is now on display in the Uffizi Gallery in Florence, Italy.

Last week, on the feast of the **Holy Family**, one of the few paintings Michelangelo ever painted was featured on the cover of the bulletin. Having forever considered himself a sculptor above all else, Michelangelo despised painting. Around 1503, he was commissioned to depict the Holy Family, the "**Doni Madonna**." It is a powerful triad compressed into a tight foreground space. Mary sits on the ground, a reference to her humility and her role as the closed garden. She twists

back toward sharply а herculean Christ, who seems to be supported by Joseph. massive The chiseled appearance of the draperies is as characteristic of his paintings as it is of his sculptures, and their sharp edged quality is enhanced by strong color.

In the background, a young John the Baptist gazes toward the Holy

Family, and five nude youths pose by a wall. The energy inherent in the poses, draperies, and monumental forms of Mary, Christ, and Joseph contrasts sharply with the languid background nudes. These have been variously identified in light of Neoplatonism, juxtaposing paganism with Christianity, and as an image of salvation. However, the iconography of the work has remained elusive. Some have even proposed, that since Michelangelo preferred the human form to nature, the upright nude youths take the place of any need for trees or landscape. This piece is also featured in the Uffizi, Florence.

In 1505, Michelangelo was summoned to Rome by Pope Julius II, to design and carve his monumental tomb. The original plan called for a free-standing, three-level structure with some 40 statues. The fate of Michelangelo's venture changed when after spending eight months choosing Carrara marble, the pope demanded the artist's attention turn to the Sistine Chapel: four years of painting in wet plaster to fresco the world's most famous ceiling. The tomb wasn't completed until 1545, but on a much reduced scale. The most famous sculpture associated with the tomb is his figure of Moses.

MAY CHRIST BLESS THIS HOUSE

The feast of the manifestation, or Epiphany, is traditionally celebrated on the twelfth day after Christmas, January 6. In the dioceses of the United States, this feast has been moved to the Sunday between January 2 and January 8. If a priest is not present, a parent (or another adult) may lead the blessing. Here is an abbreviated version of the blessing for families to use in their home.

Begin with the Sign of the Cross, and all pray in silence for a moment. Then, the leader prays:

O Lord, Almighty God, bless this house, that it may become a shelter of health, chastity, self-conquest, humility, goodness, mildness, obedience to the commandments, and thanksgiving to God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Upon this house, and those who dwell herein, may your blessing remain forever. Through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

The leader takes the blessed chalk (or the sign prepared with adhesive) and all proceed to the entrance of the home. While all look on, the leader reads the corresponding words as the numbers, crosses, and letters are inscribed (or as the sign is affixed).

The final inscription on the lintel (molding) should read:

20 + C + M + B + 22

LEADER: The three wise men: Caspar (**C** is inscribed on the lintel)

> Melchior, (**M** is inscribed)

and Balthasar (**B** is inscribed) followed the star of God's Son who became man two-thousand (**20** is inscribed on the left)

Twenty-two years ago. (**22** is inscribed on the right)

May Christ bless our dwelling, (+ is inscribed after the **20**)

and remain with us throughout the new year, (+ after **C**)

and grant that our comings and goings (+ after **M**)

will be in search of truth. (+ after **B**)

The leader continues:

Almighty God, incline your ear. May you bless us and all who are gathered here. Send your holy angel who will defend us and fill with grace all who live here.

May the Lord \clubsuit bless us, protect us from all evil and bring us to everlasting life.

Amen.
