Dear Parish Family,

Summer is the perfect time to reconnect with God. The pace is a bit slower. There are less regular commitments. The weather is generally better. Now, there are plenty of ways to reconnect with God, and this list is far from exhaustive, but I hope it helps to at least begin the effort.

Idea #1: Create a daily prayer rhythm

When it comes to prayer, small consistent efforts over time are much more effective than grand displays of prayer that happen infrequently.

Here is my favorite way to pray daily: Contrition, Thanksgiving, and Petition. Spend a few minutes in prayer each day and talk to God using these three types of prayer.

- 1. Contrition: talk to God about any mistakes you made in the last 24 hours and tell him sorry for those mistakes.
- 2. Thanksgiving: talk to God about all of the blessings in your life that you are thankful for.

3. Petition: talk to God about what you need—understanding that He is a good Heavenly Father who delights in giving us what we need.

This daily exercise takes about five minutes to complete. However, if you were to complete it every day for the next 30 years, it would add 54,750 minutes of prayer to your life. The impact could be enormous!

Idea #2: Experience God in normal life

Have you ever heard of the transcendentals? They are called that because they transcend the limitations of the Earth. They are bigger than the Earth. They elevate us to God. God is present in them.

There are three transcendentals to focus on that can be found in normal life.

1. Truth. In John 14:6, Jesus says that he is "the way, the truth, and the life." God is present in the truth. God is present in scientific and mathematical truths. Isn't it nice to know that we don't have to make up the truth because God has done it for us?

2. Beauty. Beauty is absolutely a sign that God is present. Why do we choose to go on vacation to beautiful places? We could go on vacation next to an airport, but we do not because we are attracted to the beautiful.

3. Goodness. Have you ever met someone who is just friendly? There is something about them that is attractive. Or have you ever had a good day or a good conversation? These are signs of God's presence too. Friendship, food, laughter, and rest are all things that are good.

When you experience something that is true, God is present.

When you experience something that is good, God is present.

Be on the lookout for truth, beauty, and goodness in your daily life and all of a sudden, God is more present than you previously thought.

Idea #3: Go to confession

There is no better way to restart a relationship with God than by going to confession. We offer three times here at the parish:

- 1. Wednesdays at 11:15am (Downtown Chapel)
- 2. Saturdays at 8:30am (Parish Church)
- 3. Saturdays at 3:00pm (Parish Church)

The priest is not there to judge you. No, in fact the priest thinks more highly of you because you chose to come to confession. Then after, there is no better feeling than when the weight of that sin is released.

I hope this summer provides a great opportunity to reconnect with God. Summers come and go, but can you imagine if this was the summer that your relationship with God advanced to a whole new level?

Faith Like a Child

If you Google Search recommendations on how to raise generous children, almost every list of ideas begins with — or at least contains — the directive for adults to be good models of generosity themselves. Our children learn from our actions much more than from our words. Of course, when I think back over the years while my children were growing up, I think I may have learned as much from them as they learned from me. There is a time between early childhood and middle school where a child seems to be freer to give and share than at any other time in life. It is around the age of First Communion when the cries of "mine" turn to laughter and smiles, and the urge to be a part of something bigger than oneself leads to sharing. St. Michael the Archangel Catholic Parish brings you a traveling town hall, presented by representatives of Right to Life

Action Coalition of Ohio (RTLACO) to promote the sanctity of human life, and help you prepare for the two most important ballot initiatives coming up in the next five months.

Issue 1 which is the Special Election that will be held on August 8th to increase the threshold of votes needed to amend the Ohio Constitution from 50%+1 to 60%.

Defeating Ohio's extreme pro-abortion, anti-parent Constitutional Amendment in November. This anti-parent amendment removes parental consent guardrails currently in place to protect minors, lowers health standards for women and will legalize late-term abortions in Ohio. It will enshrine abortion until birth and other medical procedures, with no notification for parents of minors, into the Ohio Constitution.

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Do you ever feel restless? I certainly do. Daily tasks and challenges, but also the more basic demand of simply existing — sooner or later, this can all feel crushing and tire us out.

Which is why Jesus' words are such stunningly good news: "Come to me all you who labor and are burdened and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). How vastly weird that this man speaks as though he is capable of giving us the deep repose we desire. Is his claim the height of absurd grandiosity? No, because next he immediately proclaims that he is "meek and humble of heart." We here touch a mystery: Jesus is capable of giving us rest because he is the one who forever reposes in the heart of God the Father. He is "yoked" to the Father in his divinity. But he is humbly "yoked" to us, sharing in our humanity.

The good news, my fellow tired-out friends: we don't have to despair in our burdens and exhaustion, no matter how heavy they feel. This week, join me in opening our hearts to hear him say to us, "Come! I will give you rest." We come to him in the Church, Eucharist, the Scriptures, prayer, in the poor. There he will give us rest.

Why July's Devotion to the Precious Blood Might Speak To You

Far from an outdated tradition, this sign of piety has much to heal our hearts ...

In the Catholic Church, the month of July is dedicated to the Precious Blood. It is a wonderful time to be reminded of that gift, recalling all the while that devotion to the Precious Blood marks not only one fleeting summer month but our entire year, offering true and abiding sustenance.

The privilege of receiving the Blood of Christ is even more profound when we remember that Christ is the fulfillment of the Scriptures, and the fulfillment of many ancient covenants associated with blood. The first sacrifice pleasing to God was Abel's slain lamb. This angered Cain, who spilled Abel's blood. To the ancient Hebrews, blood was associated with the soul. God says to Cain: "What have you done? The voice of your brother's blood is crying to me from the ground." (Gen 4:10) And so, the soul of Cain cries out to God for peace.

Abraham established the covenant of circumcision. The blood of the lamb on the doorposts at Passover spared the Israelites' children from death. Moses sprinkled the blood of animal sacrifices on the people to bless them as part of rituals commanded by God. In His own time, Jesus would have been very familiar with the sight of sinners coming to the temple with the offering of a lamb, confessing their sin while they placed their hands on the animal's head, and then slitting its throat as a substitute, to die for them. "I am the Lamb of God," would have had such a visceral meaning when spoken to a people familiar with that common occurrence. The Shepherd of us all becomes the Lamb of sacrifice. The blood of Jesus delivers the peace for which Abel's blood cried. We are the blood-purchased children of God. At Gethsemane and Golgotha, the blood of Christ fell to the ground and answered Abel's cry with a searing beauty beyond imagining.

An ancient medieval tradition spoke of "the Pelican-in-Her-Piety," as a symbol of Christ, and it is an image prevalent in many a church and cathedral, from stained glass windows to floor mosaics. Legend held that when a mother pelican's young were languishing or dying, she would impale her own breast to feed them from her blood, which would revivify them even at the expense of her life. It is a stunning symbol of Christ. If you encounter someone who is shocked by such images of consuming or being blessed by blood, tell them, to paraphrase C.S. Lewis, "God is good, but He is not tame." The new life Jesus gave came "with water and blood." (1 John 5:6).

St. Longinus, yes, saint, is the soldier who pierced the side of Christ with a lance. He declared that truly Jesus was the son of God, because the blood of Christ spilled on Longinus and healed his eyes. Tradition tells us that Longinus converted, left the army and spread the Gospel until his own martyrdom.

In honor of the Precious Blood, let us receive the Eucharist with ever more gratitude for the Lamb of God. May we find compelling ways, like the storied Pelican, to nourish others, giving without limit. And may we pray to St. Longinus, whose vision was blessed by Calvary's blood, to spread the Gospel in whatever ways, be they small or great, that we can.

What a faith, what a savior have we, that even a man who wounded the side of God may become a saint. Thus, what is our excuse not to try?
