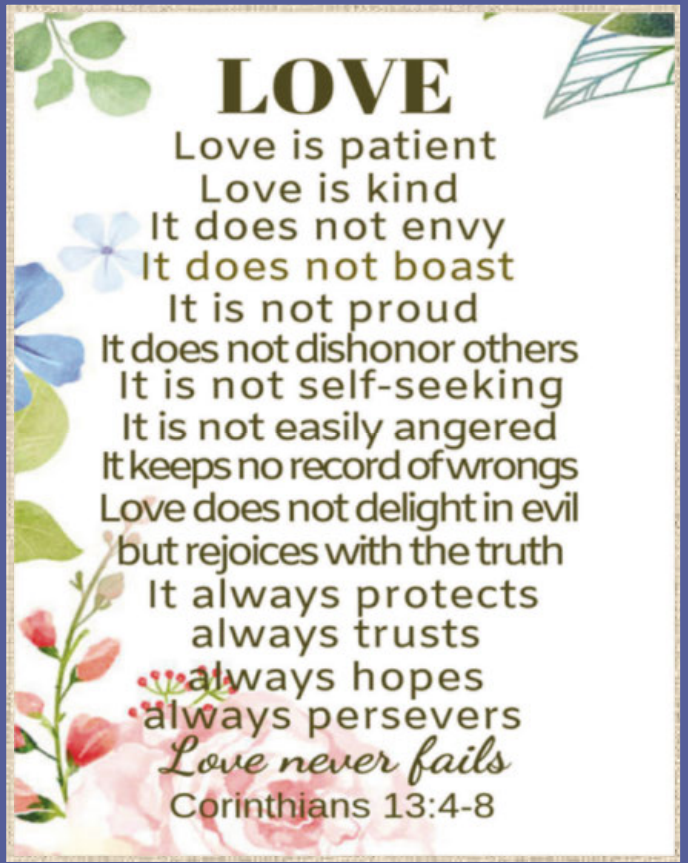

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Last week we heard from the prophet Nehemiah, in the Temple with the people as they gathered for the first time, following their exile in Babylon. Today we are hearing from the prophet Jeremiah and how he received his call from the Lord to be a prophet.

The selection from Paul's letter to the Corinthian Church picks up where we left off last week. Today we are hearing of the greatest virtue – Love – and how it is lived out: with one being patient and kind, avoiding jealousy or being pompous, never rude, seeking other's interests rather than one's own interests.

In the passage from Luke's Gospel, Jesus is in the local Synagogue on the Sabbath and has just read from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah (we heard about that last weekend). And now Jesus tells how He will not be accepted by His own town's people, how He will be rejected.

In our contemporary language we may recognize the phrase: "Familiarity breeds contempt." Familiarity breeds jealousy and contempt. How often have we seen a neighbor who better themselves through higher education, moves on and lands a lucrative job, comes home to visit and we say something as similar as what Jesus experiences in His home town. "He grew up with us – and now look at Him! – who does He think He is to do these things"?

Jealousy and contempt cannot be a part of a follower of Jesus Christ. As we listen to Paul's words, he begins his famous discourse on Love with an extended discussion. Eloquence, prophecy, even faith and generosity can be used in a way that fragments rather than builds up. Whatever gifts we may have, they have to be accompanied by the "cement" / the bond of Love for them to be productive rather than destructive. We are told so often in both the New and the Old Testaments that we need to love God and our neighbor. Sometimes, as in the parable of the Good Samaritan, we are given an illustration of what that means in practice. But today's section of Paul's letter is one of the few occasions when the nature of Love is explored more fully. What is noticeable is how his list ties in with his description in his letter to the Galatians of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. If we are alive to the life of God's Spirit, then these fruits flow from them. We will be patient and kind, forbearing, gentle, humble, respectful and forgiving. We will not be resentful or ready to take offense, but we will celebrate joyfully the accomplishments of others. Centered on the Truth, we will always be ready to excuse, to trust and to hope ... and to keep on doing so, even in the face of adversity. For true and authentic Love will not come to an end. In Paul's view it is the one thing that takes us into the perfection that is God's own life. All the other gifts will serve their purpose and wither away. Love will not! Love has no end!

Paul's hymn to Love, even though a favorite at weddings, is to be applied to each and every one of us regardless of our position in life. Paul's point, in writing this, is to prompt us to live together as Christians in the unity that will reflect the unity in the triune God. If we are to be honest, many of us do not even think seriously about living in community, or about how we might best do it. We limit our boundaries of care to our family and friends and spend more time defending our rights than worrying about our responsibilities. We find fault with those who do want to become actively involved with the larger community. There may even be times when we find the Exchange of Peace at Mass a too challenging intrusion on our privacy. So, it may be a useful test to take each of the words that Paul offers us and ask how loving am I – for this is Paul's point: in defining love as patient and kind, etc., he is defining God Who is patient, God Who is kind, God Who is not jealous, ... God Who is forgiving, God Who has no end. Now, can we slip in our name in the place of the word LOVE and say: "am I patient, am I kind, do I avoid jealousy towards others, ... am I forgiving of those who have hurt me." If not – there is still work for us to do. However, if we are able to do so honestly, then we are on the road to Peace in our hearts and lives, and on the way to bringing that Peace to all who come into our lives.

Let us pray for the Conversion of the World and for peace.

Saints for the Week

OOPS!

In last week's bulletin I forgot to mention three important Saint Celebrations. I include those, now, along with this coming week's feasts.

January 24 – St. Francis de Sales - He was born near Annecy, in Savoy, studied the law, and was ordained to the priesthood despite the opposition of his father. St Francis taught that we can all attain a devout and spiritual life, whatever our position in society: holiness is not reserved for monks and hermits alone. St Francis is the patron saint of writers and journalists, who would do well to imitate his love and his moderation: as he said, "whoever wants to preach effectively must preach with love."

January 25 – The Church celebrates the conversion of St. Paul because of its extraordinary nature. Paul, who was known as Saul before his conversion, was born at Tarsus in Cilicia, of Jewish parents. He became a Pharisee, was well educated in the Law, and became an enemy of the infant Church and engaged in the persecution of Christians. It is noted that he was present at the stoning death of St. Stephen. It was between the years 34 and 36, while on the way to Damascus for another persecution, that Paul experienced his conversion. Profoundly influenced by the grace of God, the converted apostle preached Christ to the nations. The feast of Paul's conversion ends the Church Unity Octave – an annual eight-day period of prayer for Christian unity.

Diocese of Greensburg Begins Listening Process for Synod on Synodality
As the Holy Father, Pope Francis, has requested that all of us share our ideas about the future of our faith, please participate in a short survey received at Mass last week. Beginning in February, Bishop Kulick is inviting the members of the community, including young people, to join him and participate in:

- one of the seven Town Hall Listening Sessions in the Diocese, or
- one of the three online E-Synod meetings scheduled.

Please pick up a flier at the entrances of the Church to see where these are being held. These Town Hall Listening Sessions are not exclusively for members of the parish where they are being held. Parishioners and members of the community are invited to join Bishop Kulick at any of them, no matter the location. Each will begin with a short prayer service then move into small group break-out sessions in the social hall of each Parish.

Saints for the Week (continued)

January 28 – St. Thomas Aquinas - born of a noble family in southern Italy, and educated by the Benedictines, he studied in Paris and in Cologne under the great philosopher St. Albert the Great. It was a time of great philosophical growth. Thomas attempted and succeeded in developing a simple common-sense philosophy that is known as the Summa Theologiae, a standard textbook for many centuries and still an irreplaceable resource today. Out of this also came some of the poetic hymns that we still sing today (Tantum Ergo, O Salutaris Hostia, among others).

January 31 – St. John Bosco – born of a peasant family in Piedmont, raised by his widowed mother, he became a priest, and had a particular concern for the young – first of all by means of evening classes, to which hundreds came, and then by setting up a boarding-house for apprentices, and then workshops for their training and education. He founded a congregation, which he named after St Francis de Sales (a saint for whom he had great admiration), and today the Salesians continue his work all over the world.

February 2 – Presentation of the Lord – forty days after His birth, Jesus was presented in the temple by Mary and Joseph to fulfill Jewish law. There He was recognized by Simeon and Anna, who were waiting for the coming Messiah. St. Luke records the event; also known as “Candlemas Day” because candles are blessed and lighted this day on which Simeon called Jesus “a light to the Gentiles.”

February 3 – St. Blaise – born in Amiens of a wealthy family at the start of the 9th century, he received a Christian education, became Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia and was martyred during persecutions in 316. Known as “the apostle of the North.”

A tradition related to Blasé (Blaise) says that he retreated to a cave and became a hermit during the persecution. While there, he befriended wild animals and cared for them when they were wounded or sick. One day, hunters found Blaise in the woods surrounded by the wild animals. They captured him with the intention of putting him in prison. On the way to Sebaste, Blaise encountered a woman whose little boy was choking to death on a fishbone. Blaise healed him and the blessing of throats on this day derives from that story. Blaise was then delivered to the governor and beheaded.

Blessing of throats will be held at all weekend Masses this weekend by the priest extending crossed candles over the people in the congregation.

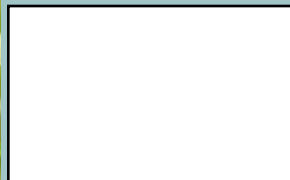
