UNDER THE PATRONAGE OF ST. JOHN HENRY NEWMAN

St. John Henry Newman, the 19th-century's most important English-speaking Catholic theologian, spent the first half of his life as an Anglican and the second half as a Catholic. As he would later write, "To be deep in history is to cease to be a Protestant." He was a priest, popular preacher, writer, and eminent theologian. When Newman was named a cardinal in 1879, he took as his motto "Cor ad cor loquitur"—"Heart speaks to heart." Three years after Newman died, a Newman Club for Catholic students began at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. His feast day is celebrated on October 9. St. John's is under St. John Henry Newman's patronage and relies on his intercession for our parishioners and students. His motto, "Cor ad cor loquitur", can be found on the stained glass window in the choir loft of the church.

From the Pastor's Desk


One of the beautiful aspects of the Catholic Faith is that it requires our whole selves – we cannot give ourselves halfheartedly to it. Our Lord wants our hearts. Yet from our hearts then flows the outward expressions of our Faith. Over the centuries, the Church has incorporated different outward actions into her prayers in order to point to the inward faith in the heart.

For example, this is found in the celebration of the Mass. At different points in the liturgy, we make different outward expressions of faith. We genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. We sit in attention to the Scriptural readings, and we stand out of respect for the proclamation of the Gospel. We sign our forehead, our mouth, and our heart with the Cross at the Gospel as a prayer that the words of the Gospel may be present in our minds, lips, and hearts. We kneel during the Consecration when Our Lord is made present on the Altar. These are just a few examples that are incorporated officially into Catholic practice.

Some of you may have noticed that I have been facing the tabernacle when we pray the Creed on Sunday (“I believe in one God...”). Maybe some of you have wondered why I do this, and it’s a valid question.

While this posture might be somewhat unusual, it is precisely at this crucial moment during Mass that we are professing our Catholic Faith together. So it seems most appropriate that we take up the same posture and together face our Lord in the tabernacle while doing this. After all, it’s not as though somehow you are professing the Creed to me and I to you.

I think there is also an idea of leadership found in facing this direction together. The priest leads the faithful in right worship of the true and living God. When a general leads his troops into battle, does he walk backwards? I’d hope not! That would be silly. Now, there are some people who will mention or remember how priests used to “have their backs to the people” during Mass. This kind of language, while technically true, demonstrates a misunderstanding of what is actually going on in the Mass. Rather than saying that the priest has his back to the people, it would be more accurate from a theological standpoint to say that the priest is facing the same direction as the people. After all, the priest is trying to go to heaven and trying to take his people with him. It would not make sense for a priest to lead his people through this valley of tears into heaven while walking backwards. In the



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Mass specifically, the priest takes the prayers and sacrifices of the people (“Pray, brethren, that my sacrifice and yours...”), unites them to the Sacrifice of the Eucharist being offered on the Altar, and leads his people to heaven.

Our liturgical posture is important. It teaches us what is inwardly happening in our hearts and in front of our eyes on the Altar. So let us continue this pilgrimage toward heaven together, the priest and people together!



MUSIC AND LITURGY

Extraordinary Ministers Series - pt. 3

In this week of the series on extraordinary ministers, comes a ministry that most of us are very familiar with, the Lector (reader). We have, for many years, seen and heard from our brothers and sisters in Faith, assist the Priest in proclaiming the Word of God in the First and Second Readings, as well as lead the congregation in the petitions during the Universal Prayer of the Church. The word *lector* is actually the Latin word for reader, so you have secretly been using the Latin title since presumably when you first learned about readers in the Church.

The lector was what was once a part of the minor orders, following the order of the porter. It was (and still is) the lector's duty to proclaim the Word of God when the Ordinary Minister of the Word (that being of the Priest, Deacon, or Instituted Lector) is able to be assisted by others during the Sacred Liturgy so as to more freely give them the ability to celebrate the Mass and perform their functions properly. When one lectors, the reader is sharing in the priest's ministry and is faithfully fulfilling a longtime historic position that has been respected for centuries throughout the Church. It is the duty of the lector, to read faithfully and clearly the Word of God, and to allow Sacred Scripture to speak for itself.

Thankfully, we have those members of our congregation that are willing to assist the celebrant in such a noble task and that they have the presence of mind to be Faithful to a ministry that goes as far back as St. Justin the Martyr. If you are ever interested in becoming a Lector, please feel free to reach out to me!





Saints Joachim & Anne's Story

In the Scriptures, Matthew and Luke furnish a legal family history of Jesus, tracing ancestry to show that Jesus is the culmination of great promises. Not only is his mother's family neglected, we also know nothing factual about them except that they existed. Even the names "Joachim" and "Anne" come from a legendary source written more than a century after Jesus died. The heroism and holiness of these people however, is inferred from the whole family atmosphere around Mary in the Scriptures. Whether we rely on the legends about Mary's childhood or make guesses from the information in the Bible, we see in her a fulfillment of many generations of prayerful persons, herself steeped in the religious traditions of her people. The strong character of Mary in making decisions, her continuous practice of prayer, her devotion to the laws of her faith, her steadiness at moments of crisis, and her devotion to her relatives—all indicate a close-knit, loving family that looked forward to the next generation even while retaining the best of the past. Joachim and Anne—whether these are their real names or not—represent that entire quiet series of generations who faithfully perform their duties, practice their faith, and establish an atmosphere for the coming of the Messiah, but remain obscure.

Reflection

This is the "feast of grandparents." It reminds grandparents of their responsibility to establish a tone for generations to come: They must make the traditions live and offer them as a promise to little children. But the feast has a message for the younger generation as well. It reminds the young that older people's greater perspective, depth of experience, and appreciation of life's profound rhythms are all part of a wisdom not to be taken lightly or ignored.

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CATHOLIC TRADITIONS AND TREASURES

Why do Catholics light Votive Candles?

"Light a candle for me." Christians have used candles to recall Christ's words: "I am the light of the world; he who follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). Churches and outdoor shrines often have candles that the faithful can light as they pray. Catholic praying at home may place candles before religious pictures or statues to create a reverent atmosphere.

Candles attached to religious pictures or statues may be called vigil or votive lights. The term vigil comes from the Latin word *vigilia*, which means "watching" or "waiting". When a Catholic lights a vigil candle, he is praying and waiting for news such as a friend's recovery from an illness or the birth of a child. Votive candles are lit when praying for a special favor, such as God's blessing on a new business or academic success. The candles are meant only to inspire prayer and hold no power of their own. COMPENDIUM CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH USCCB

55. What is divine Providence?

Divine Providence consists in the dispositions with which God leads his creatures toward their ultimate end. God is the sovereign Master of his own plan. To carry it out, however, he also makes use of the cooperation of his creatures. For God grants his creatures the dignity of acting on their own and of being causes for each other.

56. How do we collaborate with divine Providence?

While respecting our freedom, God asks us to cooperate with him and gives us the ability to do so through actions, prayers and sufferings, thus awakening in us the desire "to will and to work for his good pleasure" (Philippians 2:13).




