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

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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Brothers & Sisters in the Lord: *Praised be Jesus Christ! Now and forever!*

It's that time of year again – preparations, anxieties and suspicions heighten about "how" will the festival be; "if" there will be this / that, or "who" will be working this year etc. etc. For myself, after having lived outside of Cleveland for nearly twenty-five years, the worries and "talk" that I hear at this time of the year is the same as it was when I was a teenager working at the parish. Some of you may remember that it was in the late 70's when some terrible fights and gangs caused the festival to be shut down early on a Labor Day night. Over the years, we have learned, and our Festival Committee (Chairmen: Andrew Philbin & Phil Wancata; Michelle Buhaley, Tony Raffin, Louise Raffin) in collaboration with the Second District have been hard at work. For the last decade we have been blessed with pretty good crowds and terrific security provided by the CPD, the Guardian Angels and other Security Officers. We are blessed in being designated a "Councilmatic Event" which, thanks to our Coucilwoman Jasmin Santana (who is a great supporter of our efforts here) it is because of her support we are supplied with Lawenforcement throughout our neighborhood; EMS & SWAT on call; Officers on the property in collaboration with the Security that the parish hires and many other benefits provided by the City of Cleveland offering our guests the safest and securest campus. In reality, the new school addition has "enclosed" our campus enabling our security parameters to be tightened. Of course, heaven forbid something should ensue, I am confident that the Police and Security Officers know how to "nip" it in the bud; also a mature and positive attitude among our visitors and workers helps create a healthy and safe atmosphere. Let us remember that fear and anxiety are the tools of the Devil: The Evil One. Lastly regarding the festival, although we have successfully orchestrated and benefited from having a Drive-Thru since Covid hit in 2020, this year, due to the new building and the unknown about WiFi access, we will not be providing a Drive-Thru at this year's festival. We will as we have always done, provide "take-out" for the meals sold in the Villa. Now, let's focus on God's Word.

When hunger overtakes you, the importance of what you were doing fades until you find the satisfaction of a filled stomach. Whatever you were doing, that day's pursuit, succumbs to the simple need for sustenance. A life spent primarily on the pleasures of food and drink is meanly lived, yet no one can go without eating. Wisely, we often combine caloric intake with the good of eating together, changing the meal into a communal repast of joyful conversation. We do well when the replenishing of the body is joined with true communion with others, the one thing really worth living *for*.

In the first reading the Israelites, wandering in the desert, are hungry and grumbling to Moses about it. Forgetting that the Lord is with them, they fear they will starve to death in the desert, and begin to long for the lush and fertile land along the Nile River in Egypt.



CROWING OF OUR LADY OF MERCY

Holy Mother the Church has on many occasions asserted that it is lawful to venerate images of Christ, His Mother, and the saints and has often instructed the faithful on the proper understanding of such veneration. On Saturday, September 28th, Bishop Malesic, in a formal and solemn act will crown the image of the Christ Child and Our Lady of Mercy. The act of crowning is one form of reverence frequently shone to images of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In our case, with the Mother of God holding Her Son in Her arms, both images will be crowned and according to the Rite, the crown is placed on the Son's head first, then the Mother's.

Both in the East and in the West, the practice of depicting the Blessed Virgin Mary wearing a regal crown came into use in the era of the Council of Ephesus (A.D. 431). Since this time, Christian artists have often portrayed the glorified Mother of the Lord seated on a throne, (as is the case of Our Lady of Mercy, seated on a throne of clouds) dressed in royal robes, surrounded by a court of angels and saints.

In the act of crowning the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Church proclaims Her as Queen; the Mother of the Son of God, the Messianic King. Mary is the Mother of Christ, the Word incarnate, in Whom "all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominations or principalities or authorities." She is the Mother of the Son of David and of Him the angels said in prophecy: "He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High...."

PLAN NOW not to miss this historic event at our parish: The Coronation of Our Lady of Mercy. September 28th at 4:00pm.

In the moment, they would accept a return to slavery if it meant a filled stomach each and every day.

Their predicament symbolizes the spiritual choice we ourselves must make in choosing to live either for our bodies or for the Lord. We could prefer life in Egypt — that is, a life enslaved to the pursuit of being comfortably satisfied. Or we could risk embarking on a desert journey lived in obedience to God who will lead us to a life that already tastes of heaven. For in his mercy the Lord feeds his hungry people with a food unknown to them, described in the psalm as the bread of angels. He rains down from heaven manna, a word in Hebrew that perfectly captures the wonder and surprise they felt when they first discovered it: what is it?

As we heard in last week's Gospel, Jesus had just fed the multitude in a deserted place by multiplying a few loaves and fishes. When the crowd finally finds Jesus again the next day, Jesus discerns that they were looking for him because they had the satisfaction of filled bellies. Instead, they should desire the "food that endures for eternal life." As with the Israelites in the desert before God, the crowd faces the same spiritual choice before Jesus: selfsatisfaction or the life that only God can give. This life, described here as eternal, and later in the chapter as life in the Son, is the gift of God and sustained by the true bread from heaven. God has authorized — set his seal upon — the Son to give this life. Jesus can give this life because God has sent him from heaven as the true living bread, the bread of life.

In this time of Eucharistic Revival, we also need to ask ourselves about our faith in Jesus as the true bread from heaven. With the Israelites, let us wonder about the Eucharist, the true manna, asking: what is it? This means a renewed embrace of the Church's faith, continuous from apostolic times, that the Eucharist is truly the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ, under the sacramental sign of bread and wine. Simply, the Eucharist is Jesus, his personal reality hidden under the sensible appearance of bread and wine. He gives himself in this sacramental way so that we might receive him precisely as our true food and drink, and thus have eternal life, life to the full. No mere symbol could possibly be the true bread of heaven, for it is not meaning or significance that sustains us eternally, but only God.

But our asking what is it about the Eucharist must also include asking, what is the Eucharist to me? Do I find in the Eucharist the life I am looking for? Do I taste heaven when I receive it? When we receive the Eucharist, do we understand what Jesus meant in saying we will never hunger or thirst again? When Jesus hands himself over to us as our daily bread, do we find fulfillment in the divine life, the divine love, contained within it? We too face the same spiritual choice: do I live for self-satisfaction, or do I long for and seek the life only God can give when He sends the true bread from heaven? Am I willing to let God lead me beyond an enslaved life of comfort and security for a desert journey to the promised land?

Only by faith can we know Jesus in the Eucharist. But do we treat the Eucharist in the same way we would the risen Jesus? (continued on page 7)

PARISH FISH POND

Shortly after becoming Pastor here in 2016, I installed a small fish pond on the property between the rectory and church on Fulton Road, starting it with eight small Koi fish. Over the last eight years, the pond has suffered damage from intentional vandalism by individuals who are simply not mentally well. The location of the pond exposes it to a lot of litter from the carelessness of traffic and people on Fulton Road. At the present, we have about thirty-five Koi and they have out grown the size of the existing pond. We need a larger pond and for this reason we are preparing to re-locate the pond to behind the rectory making it more visible; a cleaner area and safer place... If anyone would like to help with the cost of the new pond, please contact me. I know many of you like to check in on the fish; our school children love to see them. No doubt, it is beautiful and relaxing to watch the fish. I am very happy to have created the fish pond here on the parish-campus and it is my hope that it can continue to be a source of joy for years to come. WHY DO CATHOLICS HAVE VIGIL CANDLES



As a child, one of the things my parents loved about coming to St. Rocco Church was the fact that there were votive candles that could be lit. In the 1970's many Catholic Churches did away with votive candles... part of the "renewal" of the times. Multitudes of visitors to our Church during the festivals would light candles anywhere for the same reason - their parishes in the sub-burbs didn't have candles. We are very blessed to have the opportunity to light votive candles. The light signifies our prayer, which is offered in faith, entering the light of God. It also shows reverence and our desire to remain present in prayer even as we continue on our day. Burning votive candles are a common sight in most Catholic churches. The vigil candle is a symbol of hope and faith. It represents the light of Christ that shines in the darkness, bringing comfort and peace to those who seek it. The votive candle is often used as a reminder to keep the light of Christ brightly burning in our lives, no matter what challenges we may face.

When you come to church for Holy Mass, take the time to make the offering and light a candle before the image of Our Lord, the Blessed Virgin or the Saints – it is a symbol of your prayer, your presence, your faith and hope!
