Please contact the parish office to schedule a baptism. It is recommended that parents seeking Baptism for their child attend two baptismal preparation classes.


Sacrament of Marriage:

As Christmas cards continue to pour in, I just want to thank everyone for all of your thoughtfulness, kindness, and generosity. Sometimes we as priests don't realize the impact we can have in peoples lives. Some of the kindness you expressed in your cards was so heartfelt and beautiful; thank you so much.

Is Christmas Over?

Don't you dare take down your tree yet! Christmas has just begun. Even though WNIC 100.3 FM stopped playing Christmas music on December 26th, and just because the stores took down their Christmas décor, doesn't mean we should. As Catholics we celebrate the Christmas season until January 9th— The Baptism of the Lord.

But there is a long-standing tradition in many Catholic cultures to leave our trees up until the festival of lights, Candlemas Day, the presentation of the Lord in the temple—February 2nd. St. Elizabeth Ann Seton



Feast Day January 4

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint." ©LPi

Q: I am a former Catholic who left the Church over 25 years ago. I left because of my disgust over all the changes. The papal conclaves make me

wonder if those first apostles would even recognize the simple and humble Church they had, when compared to the pompous and ceremonial Church of today.

A: It's kind of like asking if Henry Ford would recognize a brand new Lincoln Continental when compared to his first horseless carriage. To some extent he might see a very basic similarity, such as there being no horse. But he would certainly marvel at all the many magnificent improvements. The speed, comfort, climate control, sound system, cruise control, GPS and distance he could travel on a single tank of gas would be a few of the hundreds of improvements which he would not recognize.

It would not be reasonable to assume that after such exposure Mr. Ford would insist that we all go back to his little 1896 Quadricycle. No, on the contrary, he would marvel at such amazing progress. It seems far more reasonable that he would truly admire the developments and appreciate the innovative engineering that had been built on the basic engineering that he established so long ago.


I think it would be similar with the original apostles. It is clear that our understanding of doctrine has deepened as it developed over the years. So too have customs and practices. Jesus predicted this development when he told the apostles: "But when He, the Spirit of Truth,

comes, He will guide you into all the truth" (John 16:13). So too has the liturgy and other necessary structures for guiding the Church been strengthened over time. What we have today is built upon the foundation that was established at the beginning of the Church. Those first seeds of truth have blossomed into a mature forest of rich understanding and tradition. That first hierarchal structure that was established by Jesus Christ himself has had the ability to expand to meet the needs of today's 1.2 billion member Catholic Church.

We are all free to consider things that we don't like as pompous and ceremonial. However, others see such things as a necessary structure. God and the things of God are rightly to be honored with a degree of ceremony and respect. The Lord God spelled out a lot of such guidelines to Moses, after the Exodus. St Paul wrote: "Let all things be done decently and in order." (1 Corinthians 14:40). The development of the structure including the pomp and pageantry help to serve to that end.

Although it is not in the bible: "Don't toss the baby out with the bath water" is sound advice that you may wish to seriously ponder. None of us have a guarantee of the rest of today, much less tomorrow. Any one of us could step into the next life without even a moments notice. Do you really want to do that having so blatantly rejected the Church Jesus established? Since our Lord thought establishing his church to be of utmost importance, how can we even consider walking away?

Epiphany Water Blessing

On the Solemn Feast of the Epiphany, there is a special rite that a priest can offer once a year which provides a sacramental known as Epiphany Water and is held on the evening of January 5th.

Traditionally, the Feast of the Epiphany is observed on January 6th. This date is different than what is currently observed in the Novus Ordo calendar which has always been relegated to the weekend. It is found not only in the pre-1960 liturgical books but also in the 2002 Roman Missal. It was a rite that was included in the Roman Ritual in

1890. It is more commonly heard of in the Eastern Church, especially with the Byzantines. The Eastern Church would focus on the Baptism of Jesus during

the Feast of the Epiphany (whereas, we celebrate the two on different dates). That is why there is the Blessing of the Epiphany Water; it is meant to recall Jesus as He sanctified the river Jordan and instituted the Sacrament of Baptism.

The solemn rite includes various devotional prayers and specific prayers offered by the priest to cast out evil. This sacramental is quite powerful as it receives a two-fold prayer of exorcism. The rite itself takes about forty-five minutes and people are encouraged to bring their own large containers filled with water. Also, be sure to bring salt as that will receive special prayers as well. Please clearly label all containers of water and salt that you bring so that they can be taken home with you. There will not be any extra containers of water being blessed that will be given out - you must bring your own. It's important that you bring large containers of water. Bottles less than one gallon will not be accepted, and they must already be filled with water (preferably good drinking water to provide you with a variety of applications). Every single container of water will be individually blessed.

So as not to unduly prolong the rite, please make sure you bring a container that is one gallon in size or more (unless you have difficulty carrying a one gallon container of water). The rite will take place Wednesday, January 5th at 7:00 pm at St. Augustine. If you are unable to attend but would like to have Epiphany Water, please drop off your large containers of water to the parish office no later than Tuesday, January 4th, so that sufficient time is given for everything to be set up appropriately. To those simply dropping off water and not staying for the rite, please limit your quantity to 2 one gallon containers, as all containers will need to be transported to the church.

Seeing the Light of Christ in 2022

"Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." John 8:12

She wasn't born blind. She had 70 years of perfect eyesight. She never even had to rely on reading glasses. Sadly, in the last 20 years of her life, her vision failed suddenly, leaving her in dark shadows and with a label of "legally blind." Along with that came a dependency on others, uncharacteristic of someone so self-sufficient. First, she was stripped of her driver's license. Soon after, her days of knitting, tatting, cooking and reading were gone - gone, but sorely, not forgotten. One might have expected her to become bitter and disheartened, longing for the life she once knew. Perhaps this was the case but she never showed it. My mom was a strong woman. She made the best of a challenging situation and never, ever did she feel sorry for herself or complain about her blindness.

There are many references to Jesus healing blindness in the Bible, both physical and spiritual. How I wanted my mom to have

her vision restored, just like the people in the Bible. How amazing it would have been for her to once again see the faces that loved and cared for her for so many years. That didn't happen; it wasn't God's plan. There was no miracle that brought her sight back.

While a miraculous healing would have brought much glory to God and made her life so much easier, there was a deeper healing that took place, along with lessons to be learned. My mother accepted her cross of blindness as a way of sharing in Jesus' cross. To all those around her, my mom was a role model. She lived her life showing that acceptance and perseverance are better qualities than discontent and complaining - a light of inspiration to all who knew her.

As one year ends and another begins, I strive to pull myself out of the shadows of our world and live in the light that Jesus gives us, each and every day. I am thankful to have my 20/20 eyesight and even more thankful to have a positive outlook going into 2022 knowing that God has dominion over all and He gives us his Son, the Light of the World, to guide us.





What does it mean to have a Mass "offered" for someone?

An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons: for example, in thanksgiving, for the intentions of another person (such as on a birthday), or, as is most common, for the repose of the soul of someone who has died. One must never forget the infinite graces that flow from the Sacrifice of the Mass which benefit one's soul. Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical "Mirae caritatis" (1902) beautifully elaborated this point and emphasized the connection between the communion of saints with the Mass: "The grace of mutual love among the living, strengthened and increased by the sacrament of the Eucharist, flows, especially by virtue of the Sacrifice [of the Mass], to all who belong to the communion of saints."

When a priest offers Holy Mass, he has three intentions: First, to offer the Mass reverently and validly in accord with the norms of the Church. Second, to offer the Mass in union with the whole Church and for the good of the whole Church. Third, to offer the Mass for a particular intention, such as the repose of the soul of someone who has died.

The special personal fruits of the Mass benefit the celebrating priest who acts in the person of Christ in offering the Mass and to the people who are in attendance and participate in the offering of the Mass. These fruits are both extensively and intensively finite, since each of us is finite. Therefore, the more a Mass is offered, the more benefit is conferred.
