Please contact the parish office to schedule a baptism. It is recommended that parents seeking Baptism for their child attend two baptismal preparation classes.


### Sacrament of Marriage:





**Q.** I was raised Catholic. I spent 12 years in Catholic school and 4 years at a Catholic university. I raised my 3 children Catholic and now they are raising their

children the same. My New Year's resolution is to re-evaluate my Catholic faith. I have never taken an unbiased, critical, serious look at what I have been taught. Everything is on the table for me. I suspect that next year at this time, I will no longer be a Catholic and perhaps not even a Christian. My question is: how many people do you know who have done something similar and how did they explain this to their family?

A. I find your question puzzling on several levels. How do we "explain" truth? Explaining something that is true should not be at all difficult. The Catholic Church holds the fullness of truth. In your case however, the first thing I would suggest is to be a little more honest with yourself. I am aware that millions have left the Church. I am not aware of anyone that did so knowingly using a false pretense. You declare: "an unbiased, critical, serious look at what I have been taught" while at the same time announce: "I suspect that next year at this time, I will no longer be a Catholic and perhaps not even a Christian." You have drawn your conclusion before your phony investigation. Skip the charade and just leave if that is your real objective. However, before you make your preplanned exit, consider Pascal's Wager.

Pascal's Wager is a philosophical argument presented by the seventeenthcentury French philosopher, theologian, mathematician, and physicist, Blaise Pascal (1623–1662). He observed that every human being wagers their eternal soul that God either does or does not exist. Pascal's argument is lengthy. It takes into consideration the cost to us now of our wager, odds of winning or loosing, and the rewards or negative consequences. Consider as well the jeopardy your "wager" may be placing on your family's eternal destiny. You may be gambling with more than just your own eternal soul.

If you wager that there is a God by living a sacramental life and you are wrong, what have you lost? Study after study has shown that devout Christians, on the whole are healthier and more content than non-religious people. That is a gain not a loss. If I, on the other hand, wager that there is no God and I am wrong, the consequences of that mistake are eternal.

The consequences may also be paid by others you influence.

If you will honestly drop the pretense, I will applaud your decision to seriously investigate our Catholic faith. I started down that path twenty plus years ago, but I started from a completely different prospective. I spent the first fifty years of my life being taught and believing the Catholic Church was a diabolical institution leading spiritually ignorant Catholics down the path to eternal damnation. You on the other hand were blessed to have a head start on me. Be thankful and build on that advantage.

My regret is that I am going to run out of time long before I run out of new discoveries. So will you. So will all of us. The Catholic Church contains the fullness of the truth. There is so much to discover that no human being (in three lifetimes) will have a sufficient number of days to uncover all the wonders of our Catholic faith. Which brings us to your question, how to explain things to your family. I suggest that you just share each new discovery you make and watch their faces light up.

There are so many great resources available for us. Let me suggest starting with the teachings of the Church Fathers. Read what the disciples of the original apostles wrote. Ask Fr Phil, Fr Steve, Deacon Alan and Deacon Rich what study material they would recommend. There is a wealth of information on the internet too, but use caution here. There is also a lot of dangerous, false information to be found there as well.

# I HOPE I AM LIKE HIM

"Who is this Christ? Is he like you?"

Perhaps you've heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

"He is nothing like me," the saint is said to have answered. "But I hope I am like him."

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. "One worthier than I is coming," he insists. And because of that humility and that total embrace of God's will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament he baptizes the Son of God.

Let's examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God's plan?

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply

When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically

placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers, and this is symbolized by the white garment.



An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons: for example, in thanksgiving, for the intentions of another person (such as on a birthday), or, as is most common, for the repose of the soul of someone who has died. One must never forget the infinite graces that flow from the Sacrifice of the

One must never forget the infinite graces that flow from the Sacrifice of the Mass which benefit one's soul. Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical "*Mirae caritatis*" (1902) beautifully elaborated this point and emphasized the connection between the communion of saints with the Mass: "The grace of mutual love among the living, strengthened and increased by the sacrament of the Eucharist, flows, especially by virtue of the Sacrifice [of the Mass], to all who belong to the communion of saints."

When a priest offers Holy Mass, he has three intentions: First, to offer the Mass reverently and validly in accord with the norms of the Church. Second, to offer the Mass in union with the whole Church and for the good of the whole Church. Third, to offer the Mass for a particular intention, such as the repose of the soul of someone who has died.

The special personal fruits of the Mass benefit the celebrating priest who acts in the person of Christ in offering the Mass and to the people who are in attendance and participate in the offering of the Mass. These fruits are both extensively and intensively finite, since each of us is finite. Therefore, the more a Mass is offered, the more benefit is conferred.
