

# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION & Faith Formation



Holy Families Christ chose to be born and grow up in the bosom of the holy family of Joseph and Mary. The Church is nothing other than 'the family of God.' From the beginning, the core of the church was often constituted by those

who had become believers' together with all their household.' When they were converted, they desired that 'their whole household' should also be saved. These families who became believers were islands of Christian life in an unbelieving world. In our own time, in a world often alien and even hostile to faith, believing families are of primary importance as centers of living, radiant faith. For this reason, the Second Vatican council, using an ancient expression, calls the family the Ecclesia domestica (the domestic church). It is in the bosom of the family that parents are 'by word and example...the first heralds of the faith with regard to their children. ... It is here that the father of the family, the mother, children, and all members of the family exercise the priesthood of the baptized in a privileged way 'by the reception of the sacraments, prayer and thanksgiving, the witness of a holy life, and self-denial and active charity' Thus the home is the first school of Christian life and 'a school for human enrichment.' Here one learns endurance and the joy of work, fraternal love, generous - even repeated - forgiveness, and above all divine worship in prayer and the offering of one's life. We must also remember the great number of single persons who... are especially close to Jesus' heart ... The doors of homes, the domestic churches,' and of the great family which is the Church must be open to all of them. 'No one is without a family in this world: The Church is a home and family for everyone, especially those who 'labor and are heavy laden.' (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1655-1658)

#### LITURGY CORNER

The Four Gospels of Christmas: The story of Emmanuel – God-with-us

Christmas – the moment when we celebrate God becoming one of us and dwelling with us, is so pivotal in human history that the church has developed four different liturgies in an attempt to help us gain some appreciation of the event.

If you attend Mass on Christmas Eve in our parish, you will hear the Christmas story as recounted in the gospel of Matthew. This gospel, in its longer form begins with Matthew's genealogy of Jesus. Then, we encounter Joseph, who hears that Mary, his betrothed wife, is pregnant. Rather than publicly accuse her and even subject her to stoning to death, he decides to break off the engagement quietly. The angel of the Lord appears to Joseph and reminds him that he is a son of David and explains that the child Mary carries is God's child, He who is Emmanuel, God-with-us.

If you attend Mass "in the night" – Midnight Mass, you will hear the story of Jesus' birth as told by Luke. This gospel recounts the journey undertaken by Joseph and Mary, and the wondrously powerful irony of the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords, being born in a stable – Emmanuel, God-with-us. His birth announcement is not heralded in the courts of king Herod or Caesar Augustus, but before poor shepherds, who "watch their fields by night." Gloria, in excelsis Deo!

If you attend Mass at dawn on Christmas morning, a Mass we do not celebrate in our parish, you would hear a continuation of the birth story told by Luke. The shepherds hurry from their fields to see this Child announced by the angels, and, full of joy, they spread the Good News of Emmanuel, God-with-us.

If you attend Mass at 10:00 AM on Christmas, you will hear the earliest recorded Christian hymn, which opens the Gospel according to John. In beautiful poetry the gospel begins by speaking of "The Word" – the second person of the blessed trinity, and it reaches its climax with

And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth.

The whole point of Christmas can be summed up as this: Emmanuel, God-with-us, chooses to be intimate with us.
