

#### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION & Faith Formation



Ordinary time – ordinary Christians – extraordinary courage St. Anne Line (martyr +1601) Anne, an English woman who suffered under Elizabeth I's persecutions of Catholics, was faithful to the core. Having been disinherited by her Calvinist father, Anne married Roger Line, also a disinherited convert. When Roger was discovered attending a Mass, he was banished to Flanders, although he continued to send Anne money. But after he died in 1594, Anne became nearly destitute. Around this time, Jesuit Fr. John Gerard asked Anne to manage a house for priests-in-hiding. She carried out this task with reverent diligence until the house was raided during Mass. Fr. Francis Page was successfully hidden, but Anne and two other laypersons were arrested. At trial, Anne insisted that not only was she not sorry for concealing priests, but that she would hide "a thousand more" if she had the chance. She was sentenced to death and hanged on February 27, 1601. Afterward, two condemned priests were marched past her lifeless form. Fr. Mark Barkworth stopped to tenderly kiss her hand: "Oh, blessed Mrs. Line, who has now happily received your reward! You are gone before us, but we shall quickly follow you to bliss, if it please the Almighty."

#### LITURGY CORNER

#### How do we begin Mass?

As the community, we gather, walking into the church, marking ourselves with the sign of the cross, genuflecting to the tabernacle and taking our seats. Once we have readied ourselves for the sacred mysteries through prayer, completing the process of gathering, we begin the act of liturgy with the entrance procession accompanied by music. The entrance hymn we sing, guides our hearts through the movement toward the great sacrifice that is about to take place, unifying the faithful who gather together.

We begin with the procession as a sign of triumph and royalty as well as a reminder of our own Christian pilgrimage from this life to our eternal reward. We begin the rite with the invitation to stand, a way for us as a community to join in the pilgrimage to the altar. Our posture of standing is drawn from sacred Scripture when the people of Israel "would rise up and worship" each time Moses entered the Tent of Meeting where the Tabernacle was located.

Processions can be seen in many examples of our liturgical life: the Mass (entrance, presentation of gifts, communion procession and recessional), eucharistic processions, Palm Sunday processions with palms, funeral processions, etc. In Scripture, we find examples of processions with the Ark of the Covenant and in Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem.

We witness this order in the entrance processional

Incense, carried in first (when used) - symbolizing the sanctifying grace of the Holy Spirit and the prayers of the Saints rising to heaven

Crucifix - the triumphal symbol of our salvation, the reminder that this life is fleeting and is a preparation of the life to come.

Altar servers with candles - to light the way of the procession Book of the Gospels (carried by the first reader in absence of the deacon) Celebrant

Next week, we'll consider what happens when the procession reaches the sanctuary and Mass begins.
