RELIGIOUS EDUCATION & FAITH FORMATION



"Throughout the history of the Church, there have been apostolic movements dedicated to prayerful contemplation, and others resulting in transforming action. As we have crossed the threshold into a new millennium, we look to the "Upper Room" as a symbolic place where we

return over and over again, so that we can become 'contemplatives in action.' As persons who are both prayerful and energetic in service to the Gospel, we must always keep vigil for the advent of the Risen Lord, with the flame of faith alive in our hearts. Only the Lord can refresh our spirits and renew us in the ministries that flow from our Baptism and Confirmation. (Stations of the Resurrection from the Archdiocese of Detroit) On this Pentecost Sunday let us ask God what gifts he has given us for the building of His kingdom on earth. And pray for the courage and zeal to use those gifts. Coming to Adoration on Thursdays is a great way to return to the Upper Room to receive a new outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our lives every week.

Last week we celebrated the Ascension of the Lord. Bishop Barron shares, "Friends, in today's Gospel, Jesus is taken up to his Father in heaven. We tend to read the Ascension along essentially Enlightenment lines rather than biblical lines-and that causes a good deal of mischief. Enlightenment thinkers introduced a twotier understanding of heaven and earth. They held that God exists, but that he lives in a distant realm called heaven, where he looks at the human project moving along, pretty much on its own steam, on earth. On this Enlightenment reading, the Ascension means that Jesus goes up, up, and away, off to a distant and finally irrelevant place. But the biblical point is this: Jesus has gone to heaven so as to direct operations more fully here on earth. That's why we pray, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." Jesus has not gone up, up, and away, but rather-if I can put it this way-more deeply into our world. He has gone to a dimension that transcends but impinges upon our universe." And this is where we find ourselves on Pentecost Sunday as we experience more of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in the life of the Church as Jesus continues to lead His Body here on earth.

LITURGY CORNER Come, Holy Ghost

Come, Holy Ghost,

During his Last Supper with his friends, Jesus says "I tell you the truth, it is better for you that I go. For if I do not go, the Advocate will not come to you. But if I go, I will send him to you." (John 16:7) – Jesus promised six times that the Holy Spirit would come to us after he left.

Creator Blest,

The Scriptures are full of examples of the creative work of the Holy Spirit, inspiring those who have collaborated with the Holy Spirit, as a model for us today.'

And in our hearts take up thy rest;

We receive the Holy Spirit at Baptism. However, at Confirmation, the bishop says "Receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Note the word "gift" is singular: we are not receiving the sevenfold gifts that some of us memorized. Rather we are invited, not as infants, but as people capable of saying yes, or no, to invite the Holy Spirit to be "at rest" – to be "welcome and at home" in our hearts, not as a passive guest, but as counselor, as comforter.

Come with thy Grace, and heav'nly aid

We open ourselves to being suffused in Grace, our "cup" overflowing, spilling out in generous abundance into the world, if only we will say yes. The spirit is both the source and the reality of heavenly aid, protecting us from evil – not taking us away, for Jesus prayed that we, who are not of the world, remain in the world so that we, to whom he entrusts the proclamation of the Good News be protected as we do his will: My prayer is not that you take them out of the world but that you protect them from the evil one. (John 17:15)

To fill the hearts which thou hast made, to fill the hearts which thou hast made.

Empowered by the Holy Spirit, who infills every empty space in our hearts, we are empowered to worship God, who loves us so, who trusts us with spreading his Good News.

ST. MARY PRAYER CORNER

St. Lucy miraculously intervened for a blind man. This story is from a family member of our prayer team (winter 2022): I am an intensive care physician and recently, I had a patient wake up after a prolonged surgery with profound vision loss. This alarmed all the staff, we quickly asked for emergent imaging and consultation by a neurologist and ophthalmologist. Our team was able to rule out many of the more likely causes of blindness such as stroke but, this led to the most likely cause that we feared (and usually irreversible); complications known as 'postoperative ischemic optic neuropathy'. The ophthalmologists broke the news to the patient and his wife explaining that, he would likely be blind. They were understandably devastated and so was I. In a moment of quiet during this busy day of caring for my patient, I remembered, St. Lucy is the patron saint of vision, so I offered a simple prayer. I said, "St. Lucy, I need help. This patient needs your help, please pray for him." Then I went back to work. To my surprise, his vision began to return 1 hour later, and within 3 hours was back to normal. This man then asked me to explain what had happened... I told him that I had no explanation except, that this was a miracle! He chuckled and told me that he was a pretty miraculous guy. --Dr. Mary Jarzebowski God answers prayers in surprising ways, when we are most desperate. Today we give God all the glory for this miracle. St. Lucy, pray for us to have vision in desperate times.

SAVE THE DATE!


