


JULY 31, 2022 | EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Which modern martyr died defending the Eucharist? No danger or threat could **TOPETION** intimidate this fearless priest. The Communists didn't like priests like Fr. János Brenner.

They liked priests who obeyed. They liked priests who cowered. But Fr. Brenner wasn't afraid of anyone. He was young and vivacious. Born in Hungary in 1931, János was only a teenager when the Communist government took over his country after World War II. Inspired to become a Cistercian, he entered at the age of eighteen, but he and his classmates had to do their formation in secret. He enrolled in a diocesan seminary and was ordained in 1955. During his formation, he wrote, "Even if the road is rough, I look at your pain-ridden face and follow you. I ask you only one thing: May I always fulfill most precisely what you give to me as my vocation." Even when a government official made him aware of personal threats to his life, he simply said: "I'm not afraid, I'm happy to stay." Two weeks before his twenty-sixth birthday, on the freezing night of December 14th, 1957, Fr. Brenner received a message that someone was dying and needed the Last Sacraments. He immediately took his anointing oils and the Blessed Sacrament and set off down the road in the darkness. But the message was a fake. He was walking into a trap. Ambushed, Fr. Brenner was stabbed thirty-two times and trampled in the dirt of the road. When they found his body in the morning, he was still clutching the Blessed Sacrament. Since he was a martyr, he was beatified in May 2018 in Hungary. (Get Fed Catholic Company)

## LITURGY CORNER

Eucharistic prayers begin with a preface. Prefaces may have a seasonal theme, or they may relate to the feast of the day. Some Eucharistic Prayers have a "built-in" preface, as with Eucharistic Prayer IV. Here is the Preface text from the fourth Eucharistic prayer:

It is truly right to give you thanks, truly just to give you glory, Father most holy, for you are the one God living and true, existing before all ages and abiding for all eternity, dwelling in unapproachable light; yet you, who alone are good, the source of life, have made all that is. so that you might fill your creatures with blessings and bring joy to many of them by the glory of your light. And so, in your presence are countless hosts of Angels, who serve you day and night and, gazing upon the glory of your face, glorify you without ceasing. With them we, too, confess your name in exultation, giving voice to every creature under heaven, as we acclaim:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

All Prefaces take us into the body of the Eucharistic Prayer with the "Sanctus" - from the Latin for "Holy."

This preface addresses God as Father, a term of approachability, and it yet speaks of a glory that is "unapproachable light." This contrast prepares us for what follows: the Sanctus, and then a retelling the story of Salvation History, the story of God's overwhelming love for us, and with its climactic gift of God's Son for our salvation (To be continued)

### ST. MARY PRAYER CORNER

Have a Conversation with God: tips for your intercessory prayer.

**P Praise:** Begin speaking to God with praise and songs on your lips, speak from your heart. (Example: I praise you my Lord, for you do love me; You rescue and protect me from all life's storms. You always hear me...)

**R Repent:** Respond to praising and loving God with a repentant heart. (Example: Lord I am deeply sorry for offending the ones I love, especially You...)

**A Ask the Holy Spirit:** The Holy Spirit always knows how to pray. (Example: Come Holy Spirit come, You are welcome here. Help me, guide my prayer, show me how to pray for each situation on my heart...)

**Y Yield to God:** Listen for God's promptings within your heart as you surrender to God. (Example: I surrender my heart and my spirit to Your Will; God, come, speak to me, I desire to hear Your voice...)

Sit quietly with God, honor and surrender your intellect and imagination to God. Look at the face of Jesus, give Jesus your thoughts one by one, listen for His reply. What is Jesus saying? Stay focused on Jesus, wait, relax, let your heart beat with His. Just spend time with God.

To end your time of prayer, praise and thank God for His wonderful love and mercy. Ask for an infilling of the Holy Spirit each day. \*Keep a journal, it is a good way to honor words and thoughts God gives you. (Reference: <u>Powerful Prayers in the War Room</u> by Daniel B.
