Jesus' birth is *for* us; note how often the word "for" appears "on this holy night." Yet what do these words — 'for us' – really mean? They mean that the Son of God, the one who is holy by nature, came to make us, God's children, holy by grace. This is a "magnificent gift," a gift that is "pure grace," which does not depend upon anything we can do, but solely on God's love for us.

God's gift to us on Christmas is not merely a thing or an object. Instead, God gave His only-begotten Son, who is all His joy.

And yet, our own ingratitude toward God, and our injustice towards so many of our brothers and sisters can make us wonder if God was right in giving us this gift of His Son. In fact, nothing we can do can make us worthy of this gift.

Rather, it is only out of God's unfailing love for us, His unchanging love that changes us that leads God to give us His Son.

It is because of God's infinite love for us that Jesus was born, not in a palace, but in the manger of a stable. Jesus came into the world as each child comes into the world, weak and vulnerable, so that we can learn to accept our weaknesses with tender love... God loves to work wonders through our poverty.

This is a sign, he continued, to guide us through life. In Bethlehem, God lies in a manger, as if to remind us that, in order to live, we need Him, like the bread we eat. We need to be filled with His free, unfailing, concrete love. The manger, poor in everything yet rich in love, teaches us that true nourishment comes from letting ourselves be loved by God and loving others in turn.

God came to us at Christmas as a weak and vulnerable Child to teach us how to love. God came among us in poverty and need, to tell us that in serving the poor, we will show our love for Him.

I offer this prayer to the newborn Savior: "Jesus, you are the Child who makes me a child. You love me as I am, not as I imagine myself to be. In embracing you, the Child of the manger, I once more embrace my life. In welcoming you, the Bread of life, I too desire to give my life. You, my Savior, teach me to serve. You who did not leave me alone, help me to comfort your brothers and sisters, for, from this night forward, all are my brothers and sisters.

What can you, (and your family) learn from the Holy Family?




Jesus' mother, Mary, was conceived without sin. Her husband, Joseph, was a saint. Jesus's grandparents, on his mother's side,

Joachim and Anne, are also saints. By the way, the names Joachim and Anne do not appear in the Gospels. These are the names that tradition gives us for Mary's parents, both of whom were supposedly from Sepphoris, a large town not far from Nazareth. So Jesus, Mary and Joseph make up what we call the "Holy Family," whose feast we celebrate this week. But did you ever think about the rest of Jesus's family? His aunts and uncles, cousins, step-brothers and step-sisters and all the rest? They were probably ordinary people, living in Nazareth, which was a poor town with just about 200 to 400 people in Jesus' time. They were probably regular people, not saints. Maybe not even especially holy.

Why am I mentioning this? Because when we think about Jesus's family, we usually think about just Mary and Joseph, and maybe Joachim and Anne. But apart from them, Jesus was born into a regular human family, a family that probably had quarrels and misunderstanding and tensions, like any family. Even the Holy Family had to deal with misunderstandings. At one point in the Gospels, after Jesus has left Nazareth and settled in Capernaum, by the Sea of Galilee, we are told that his family thought he was "out of his mind" and Marv and the rest of his family set out to "restrain" him. That's quite a story. So when you pray to Jesus, Mary and Joseph, you are praying to the Son of God, to the Blessed Mother and to a saint. You're also praying to three people who understand family life. Remember that the next time you struggle with something going on in your own family, whether your family is holy or on the way to holiness.
