What does the Feast of the Epiphany represent?

Epiphany, also called Feast of the Epiphany, Theophany, or Three Kings' Day, (from Greek epiphaneia, "manifestation"), Christian holiday commemorating the first manifestation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi, and the manifestation of his

divinity, as it occurred at his baptism in the Jordan.

What is the message of the Epiphany?


