Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity


About Today's Observance

The most basic belief of our Christian faith is our understanding of one God in three Persons: God as Father and Creator, Jesus as Son and Savior, the Holy Spirit as sanctifier. Not three gods but only one God manifested in three Persons. This understanding of God is known as the Holy Trinity. The Trinity is our faith's greatest mystery and was revealed to us in the person of Jesus Christ. This is evident in all of the Gospels, but especially in the Gospel of John.

The emphasis of the doctrine of the Trinity evolved in the 4th and 5th centuries when the Arian heresy denied that Jesus was equal to God the Father. At this time various Church Councils confirmed the true teaching that God the Father and Jesus share the same substance; that is, they are equal. During Mass, at the Profession of Faith, we acclaim they are "consubstantial." About one thousand years ago a special feast devoted to the Holy Trinity developed in northern Europe and by the mid-fourteenth century it was promulgated for the universal Church.

Two religious traditions are associated with the Trinity. One is marking the body with the Sign of the Cross and saying, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Another ancient Trinitarian prayer is the doxology: "Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit." Later these words were added, "As it was in the beginning is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen."

Over the centuries many symbols have been used to portray the Holy Trinity. One is represented by an older man (the Father), a younger man (the Son), and a dove (the Holy Spirit). Another symbol is a triangle surrounded by rays of light with an eye in the middle. Tradition says St. Patrick is credited with using a shamrock to teach the ancient Irish the meaning of the Holy Trinity.

Pastor’s Corner

Last weekend the Easter Season ended with the observance of Pentecost Sunday. From Pentecost until Advent (beginning this year on November 28th) the Church resumes Ordinary Time (it started after Christmas until Ash Wednesday). Our English title of Ordinary Time can be confusing. We often think of something ordinary as being plain or non-eventful. In the liturgical sense, Ordinary Time means “counted time” as in ordinal numbers, numbers that express a position in a series, such as first, second, third, etc. This past week was the Eighth Week in Ordinary Time. The counting continues until the end of November with the Thirty-Fourth Week. The Scripture Readings at Masses during Ordinary Time reveal to us all the different mysteries of our faith and the challenges for our participation in these mysteries.

Every year on the two Sundays immediately following Pentecost the Church celebrates two important liturgical observances. Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity; a day that commemorates our basic Christian belief in the one true God whose presence is made known to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Next weekend is the observance of the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (formerly known by its Latin title, *Corpus Christi*). This observance commemorates our Catholic belief in the real presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

This weekend our country is observing the national holiday of Memorial Day on Monday. Memorial Day gives us the opportunity to remember all deceased veterans and innocent men, women and children who died during times of war. It is also a time of prayer for peace in our world so that disagreements between countries do not have to be settled by war or other forms of violence. Weather permitting the weekend is a time for outdoor activities such as BBQ’s gardening, and the unofficial beginning of summer. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our activities with others may be curtailed. Enjoy the long holiday weekend with your family and friends and please remember to drive safely. Also, let’s not forget the reason for the holiday: remembering those who gave up their lives for our freedom and liberty!

Some liturgical protocols discontinued since March of 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic reinstated. Please read the article on page twelve of today’s church paper for detailed information regarding these protocols. Please remember that if you are fully vaccinated you do not need to wear a face covering in church unless you desire to do so and you may sit anywhere in the church. Those who are not fully vaccinated are to wear a face covering. The two center sections of pews are open seating without practicing social distancing and every pew is available. The two side sections of pews (along the windows) are for those who wish to maintain social distancing with every second pew used and red markings on the pews at six-foot intervals.

The Archdiocese of Detroit is offering the first of three “Family of Parishes Gatherings” on Tuesday of this week from 7:00 – 9:00 pm. This is a virtual event that can be viewed at home. Another is the opportunity to view it with others in our parish’s Activities Center. To participate, please register online at fopgatherings.org. For more information please read the insert in today’s church paper.

Currently our parish is joining all the parishes of the Archdiocese of Detroit by participating in the annual Catholic Services Appeal (CSA). Every parish is given a CSA target goal established by the Archdiocese. This year our parish’s goal is \$173,034. Every parish household is asked to make a sacrificial gift to this year’s CSA. The hope is that the average gift will be in the vicinity of \$275 per household. For some, especially those on fixed incomes, this will not be possible, even as a sacrifice, so whatever gift they can give will be appreciated. For others a gift of \$275 or more gift can be made to this year’s CSA campaign. What is asked from everyone is not an equal gift but an equal sacrifice. What is important is that each of us does the very best they can. Please consider making a pledge to the CSA allowing you to spread the payment of your gift over several months.

Prayerfully consider the most generous gift possible to support the CSA. When you receive your information in the mail regarding this year’s CSA campaign, please read it very carefully and support the CSA to the best of your ability. May God bless you for your continued support.

COVID CURTAILS HELPING OTHERS—A new way of doing things



During this past year, many organizations have had to adjust their way of helping others to reduce the spread of COVID and abide by the covid restrictions put in place by the CDC and state health department. In talking with the soup kitchens and food pantries that St. Colette has supported over the years, I have been told several different ways they are helping people. Soup kitchens are not serving sit down or cafeteria-style food lines that we have helped serve before. Soup kitchens are doing this with a skeleton crew and are not able to have volunteers from parishes help out. Before when serving a meal they put the food on a plate (that was washed later by a volunteer), put a dessert on the plate (baked by a parish volunteer at home and brought that morning to the kitchen), poured a cup of coffee or water at the table. Now they have out a bottle of water or a juice box. Consequently, the soup kitchens are dealing with a new expense, take out containers, prepackaged snacks or cookies and bottled water or juice boxes. Today they are prepackaging food in take out containers and many are handing out the containers from a table in their parking lot. With this new procedure the social interaction is limited and of course, the warm smile that used to accompany a spoonful of the entree of the day is hidden by the mask the server wears.

Food pantries are putting bags together of food for a family based on the number of people in the family and passing them out in drive up lines. While people are very grateful for the food they receive for their family it's not what they would choose if they could shop the pantry shelves like they did before COVID. Each pantry I talked with said that each family receive a brown bag of paper products and cleaning products if they have them to pass out.

One little known fact is that those who are eligible to have a Bridge card or food stamps they cannot buy the most needed items of all besides food. They cannot purchase toilet paper, Kleenex, paper towels, paper napkins, personal hygiene products, cleaning products for the kitchen, bathroom or laundry. No bar soap, laundry soap or a cleaner to clean your bathroom.

In July St. Colette Parish has a Non Food Drive for Livonia Cares. This Non Food Pantry is housed at Holy Cross Lutheran Church on Six Mile. Any Livonia resident (the eligibility requirements are on the Livonia city website) can go there once a month and pick up paper products, cleaning products and personal hygiene products.

Your continued generosity to serve others by your donations of food items, non food items and monetary donations is gratefully accepted and acknowledged by the organizations we support.

New COVID-19 Liturgical Protocols

On May 19th, Archbishop Allen Vigneron issued new COVID-19 liturgical protocols in light of guidance from national and state public health officials. These protocols are meant to permit and encourage the reverent offering of and active participation in the liturgical life of the Church.

Besides announcing the new liturgical protocols, Archbishop Vigneron reminds us that “we must continue to live with a ‘spirit of cooperation’ to adapt to the circumstances we face and, importantly, to care for and protect those who are most vulnerable.” Furthermore, he states, “Each of us is called to keep in mind our need to care for the common good – including a deliberate consideration to receive the COVID vaccine for the good of oneself and one’s neighbor. The care for the common good entails a particular care and love for those who are most vulnerable among us, in this situation the elderly and the immunocompromised.”

New Liturgical Protocols

- Those who are fully vaccinated may wear a face-covering and practice social distancing but are no longer required to do so in churches.
- Those who have not been fully vaccinated are to continue wearing face-coverings and to practice social distancing to protect themselves and others in churches. Because a parish community – and our society – require mutual trust and a commitment to the common good, each individual is asked to make the best decisions for oneself as well as for others. Parishes do not have the responsibility to verify who is and who is not vaccinated.
- Each parish is to provide a portion of the church where social distancing and face-coverings are consistently maintained.

In our church the two side sections of pews (along the windows): We will continue using only every second pew, practice social distancing in the pews by sitting near one of the red markings, and the wearing of face coverings (see above).

In our church the two center sections of pews: We will be using every pew without social distancing and the option for fully vaccinated to wear a face covering.

- All unvaccinated Catholics are encouraged to consult with their doctor about vaccines. Resources to assist Catholics in understanding the moral use of COVID vaccines can be found at aod.org/vaccines.
- All church doors will be unlocked for entrance into the church.
- The in-person collection in the pews during Mass by passing the collection baskets is resumed.
- The Presentation of the Gifts of Bread and Wine by members of the assembly is resumed.
- The Sign of Peace is resumed allowing parishioners and families to make their own determinations about how widely to share some sign of peace.

It is no longer imperative to endorse social distancing during the Communion procession. Since it is such a short period of time, social distancing is not crucial here.

COVID Liturgical Protocols Which Remain in Place

- Clergy and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will continue to sanitize their hands after they receive Communion and prior to distributing Communion. They will continue to wear face-coverings while distributing Communion.
 - Parishes are to continue refraining from the distribution of consecrated Wine at Communion.
 - Scripture Readings and music for weekend Masses will continue being printed in the church paper. Please receive a copy when you enter the church so you can more fully participate in the Mass.
- Saturday’s 4:00pm Mass at St. Colette Church will continue to be livestreamed and available on Facebook.

Our church is open for private prayer Monday – Thursday from 8:00 am – 3:00 pm, Friday from 8:00 am – 2:30 pm, Saturday from 9:00 am – 5:00 pm, and Sunday from 7:00 am – 1:00 pm. Please note that some days the church is used for Masses or funerals and for cleaning and disinfecting. Contact the parish office for updated availability of the church building.
