Beginning Saturday, August 7th the use of the confessionals will be restored for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Following the general procedure, if you are fully vaccinated the wearing of a face covering in the confessional is optional. If not fully vaccinated you should wear a face covering.



COVID-19 Liturgical Protocols

COVID-19 protocols, issued by Archbishop Allen Vigneron, are meant to permit and encourage the reverent offering of and active participation in the liturgical life of the Church.

Besides announcing these protocols, Archbishop Vigneron reminds us that “we must continue to live with a ‘spirit of cooperation’ to adapt to the circumstances we face and, importantly, to care for and protect those who are most vulnerable.” Furthermore, he states, “Each of us is called to keep in mind our need to care for the common good – including a deliberate consideration to receive the COVID vaccine for the good of oneself and one’s neighbor. The care for the common good entails a particular care and love for those who are most vulnerable among us, in this situation the elderly and the immunocompromised.”

The liturgical protocols used at St. Colette Church are the following:

- Because a parish community – and our society – require mutual trust and commitment to the common good, each individual is asked to make the best decisions for oneself as well as for others.
 - *Those who are fully vaccinated may wear a face-covering and they may sit anywhere in the church. If they prefer to continue practicing some form of social distancing, they should sit in the side sections of pews (along the windows).
 - *Those who have not been fully vaccinated are to continue wearing face-coverings and to practice social distancing to protect themselves and others in the church. They should sit in the side sections of pews.
- The parish does not have the responsibility to verify who is and who is not vaccinated.
- All unvaccinated Catholics are encouraged to consult with their doctor about vaccines. Resources to assist Catholics in understanding the moral use of COVID vaccines can be found at aod.org/vaccines.
- During the Sign of Peace, everyone is to make their own determination about how widely to share some Sign of Peace with those around them.
- Clergy and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion sanitize their hands after they receive Communion and prior to distributing Communion. They are to wear face-coverings while distributing Communion.
- St. Colette Parish continues refraining from distributing consecrated Wine at Communion.
- The safest and most hygienic way to receive Communion is in the hand. If one must receive Communion on the tongue, please receive Communion from the priest or deacon and try to be the last person in line. If sitting in the special needs pews and one must receive Communion on the tongue, the priest or deacon will do so after Mass.
- Scripture Readings and music for weekend Masses are printed in the church paper. Please receive a copy when you enter the church so you can more fully participate in the Mass.
- Saturday’s 4:00pm Mass at St. Colette Church is livestreamed and available on Facebook.

Marriage Anniversary Mass

Every year in the Fall, St. Colette Parish honors and celebrates with married couples who are observing a significant marriage anniversary. This year’s celebration will take place in church on **Sunday, October 17th at the 12 Noon Mass**. Married couples whose marriages were witnessed by a Catholic priest or deacon and are observing their 10th, 25th, 40th, 50th, 60th, 70th or 75th Anniversary are invited, with their families, to join in the celebration. After the 12 Noon Mass, all the couples will be called to stand in their place and renew their marriage vows and receive a Papal Blessing.

If you are observing one of the significant marriage anniversaries listed above this year, contact the parish office at 734-464-4433 or parishoffice@stcolette.net. Please leave your name, contact information, anniversary year, and the name of the church where your marriage was witnessed. Since Papal Blessings need to be ordered ahead of time, **please contact the parish office by Friday, August 13th**.

These are not the only years a couple can request a celebration honoring their anniversary of marriage; especially if it is a significant anniversary such as 15th, 20th, 30th, 35th, 45th, 55th, 65th, or any year. The anniversary blessing for a couple whose marriage was witnessed by a Catholic priest or deacon can be celebrated during or after almost any weekend or weekday Mass and family and friends are invited to participate. To make arrangements for the blessing of a married couple contact the parish office as listed above.

Pastor’s Corner

Today and on the Sundays of August 8th and 22nd, our Gospel Readings at Mass are from the Gospel of John known as the “Bread of Life Discourse” when Jesus instructs us about his real presence in the Holy Eucharist. The second part of every Mass we celebrate is called the “Liturgy of the Eucharist.” I encourage you to read the article below, and future articles, to reacquaint ourselves with this part of the Mass.

On Friday of this week, August 6th, the Church observes the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. This Feast commemorates the time when Jesus and three of his apostles travel up a mountain where Jesus’ body shines like the sun and his post-resurrection glory is revealed. On the same day people throughout the world will commemorate the 76th anniversary of the first time a nuclear bomb was used as a weapon of war. An August 6, 1945 a nuclear bomb was detonated over the city of Hiroshima in Japan. Three days later another was detonated over the city of Nagasaki. On Friday, August 6th in Hiroshima the day will begin when survivors of the bomb and their families will say a silent prayer for peace. Later all will gather at a monument bearing the names of all who died because of the bomb. In the evening, lanterns bearing the names of the deceased victims will float down a river as people sing, “So long as this life lasts, give peace back to us, peace that will never end.” Similar memorials will take place in Nagasaki on Monday, August 9th.

August 6th and 9th are days for all citizens of the world to join in prayer and to work for lasting peace. Pope St. John Paul II said when he visited Hiroshima, “In the past it was possible to destroy a village, a town, a region, even a country. Now the whole planet has come under threat.” In 1983, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops issued a Pastoral Letter on the nuclear arms race. They used the Scriptures, traditional Catholic social teaching and the experience of peacemakers in forming their teaching. The result of their work is called *The Challenge of Peace: God’s Promise and Our Response*. In this Letter the bishops say, “Peace, like the Kingdom of God itself, is both a divine gift and a human work. We are called to be a Church at the service of peace.”

Today certain countries as well as international terrorists groups continue to move forward in developing nuclear power as a weapon of war. The threat of using nuclear bombs to kill people, and to annihilate the entire world, is once again a serious threat as it was during the height of the Cold War in the 1950’s and 1960’s. Today and every day may we pray for peace in the world and for greater cooperation between nations to solve their differences with negotiations rather than armed combat.

Reflections on the Liturgy of the Eucharist – Part 2

This year the Sunday Gospels during August (except for August 15th and 29th) are taken from the sixth chapter of the Gospel of John. This chapter of John’s Gospel is known as Jesus’ “Bread of Life Discourse.” As we hear the proclamation of these Gospels let us take time to reflect on some practical ways we Catholics are called to celebrate the part of the Mass known as the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

After the singing of the Lamb of God, the priest announces, “Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lord.” The assembly responds, “Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed.”

Then the members of the assembly form lines at various points of the church waiting their turn to receive Communion. The reception of Communion is accompanied by the singing of hymns that are intended to be sung by everyone in church. These hymns are not meant to be “background music” while we are receiving Communion. They are intended to express the unity we are celebrating in the Eucharist. When walking in procession waiting your turn to receive Communion, it is recommended that we take with us our church paper so we can join in the singing of the Communion hymn.

Just prior to receiving Communion, the recipient is to make a simple bow of the head (like a nod) as a sign of reverence. This is different from the bow we make during the recitation of the Profession of Faith when we make a profound bow, which is, bowing at the waist. The simple bow of the head prior to receiving Communion is the approved sign of reverence as directed by the Catholic bishops of our country. We should not genuflect at this point since the general rule is for us not to genuflect when walking in procession because we can cause the person behind us to trip and fall!

When it is our turn to receive the Eucharist, the Communion minister says “Body of Christ” and we are to respond by saying “Amen” which means, “I believe.” There are two ways to receive the consecrated Bread: in the palm of the hand (which is the ancient and older way), or on the tongue. To receive in the hand simply place one hand below the other and raise your hands to about mid-chest. If you are right handed place your right hand under the left hand (and vice versa if you are left handed). After the response of “Amen,” the Communion minister places the consecrated Host on the recipient’s palm whom then steps aside and consumes the Host. The second option is to receive the consecrated Host on the tongue. After responding “Amen” simply open your mouth and slightly extend your tongue and the Communion minister will place the Host on the person’s tongue. *(Continued next week.)*







If you have ever known someone who is wealthy enough to pick up the tab whenever you go out to dinner or to a movie, you know that there are some people who might like him or her just for what he can give them. We see a similar scenario in the Gospel reading today. Jesus had just miraculously fed thousands of people and the crowds were now following him everywhere. He knew that many of them were only interested in what they could get or in seeing some new spectacular display of his power. However, they were missing the point of the miracles. Jesus performed the miracles as evidence for who he is. He is the Son of God who reunites us with his Father. He is going to share with us his Body and Blood in Holy Communion. Jesus told his followers—and that includes us—to believe in him not for what he does but for who he is.



Let us pray: All too often I pray for the things I want you to give me, Lord. Today I just want to simply praise you for who you are and thank you for being my God.

Scope: Jesus gave us the Eucharist at His last supper – at least that’s what we read in Matthew, Mark & Luke. In John’s Gospel, Jesus washes the feet of his disciples. 


