Family of Parishes Liturgy of the Word Commissioning Service

St. Colette Parish and the parishes of Our Lady of Victory, St. Edith and St. Kenneth make up a Family of Parishes of the Northwest Wayne Vicariate. The purpose of the Family of Parishes is to provide opportunities to work collaboratively in areas of mission and service to the people in our four parishes. Our Family of Parishes was established on July 1, 2021.

A Commissioning Service for our Family of Parishes will take place on Tuesday, October 5th at 7:00 pm at Our Lady of Victory Church in Northville. Bishop Gerard Battersby will preside at a Liturgy of the Word Service and hymns will be provided by music ministers from the four parishes. After the Service there will be a reception serving light refreshments. Our Lady of Victory Church is located at 133 Orchard at Main Street, about one mile west of downtown Northville.

Everyone from the four parishes of our Family of Parishes is invited to the Commissioning Service on Tuesday, October 5th. Please join others in prayer at the Liturgy of the Word Service and the reception that follows.

MERCY IN ACTION

October 16th is the Annual Mercy in Action day throughout the Archdiocese. We are not going to gather in the Activities Center as in the past but will offer projects to take home and items that can be donated to help the less fortunate.

Blessing of Animals

Monday October 4th, 6:00 pm—Parish Parking Lot

October 4th is the Memorial of St. Francis of Assisi, who is the Church's patron saint of animals and the environment. In honor of this great saint, it is the tradition of the Church to provide a blessing of animals such as your family pets! Bring your pets to the parish parking lot on October 4th and participate in the blessing of animals. It is a very brief ritual and should last about 10 – 15 minutes.

We Need Altar Servers – Children, Teens & Adults

Our parish is in dire need of additional altar servers to serve at weekend Masses. When we hear the term “altar servers” we often think of children and teens who volunteer to serve at the altar during Mass. However, most of us don't realize that altar serving is not limited to children and teens. Adults are welcome to serve as well. Altar serving at St. Colette Parish is open to all males and females from the third grade and older.

If you are an adult male and served as an altar server in your youth, or, always wanted to serve but didn't get the opportunity, you are a perfect candidate. If you're an adult female who in your youth wanted to be an altar server but were not allowed to serve because it was limited only to boys, then you too are a perfect candidate. A husband and wife may serve together as a couple. A parent (or parents) can serve with their child or children and make it a family activity.

Maybe God is calling you or your child to be an altar server here at St. Colette Parish. If your child is a third grader or older, a teen, or if you yourself is interested in volunteering as an altar server here at St. Colette Parish, please contact the parish office at 734-464-4433 or at parishoffice@stcolette.net. Prior to serving at the altar there is a brief training session and new servers usually serve with veteran servers prior to serving alone at Mass.



Pastor’s Corner

The first weekend of October is observed in the Catholic Church as Respect Life Sunday. Each year in October we are called to reflect on one of the basic teachings of our Christian faith: all life is sacred from conception until natural death and all life must be protected with dignity and respect. This observance reminds us of the societal sins of legalized abortions and assisted suicide, the condemnation of capital punishment, unjust wars, the use of nuclear weapons and human trafficking. We are called to end racism, poverty, and to promote restorative and economic justice. Other life issues include the rights of children to quality education and all citizens to health care, the care of the aged and dying and of refugees and migrants, and the protection of the environment.

One way to observe Respect Life Sunday is with your participation in the annual “Life Chain” sponsored by Right to Life – Lifespan. Participants at a “Life Chain” give witness for the right to life along roadsides across the Metro Detroit area and the rest of our country. Beginning this Sunday, October 3rd St. Colette Parish is fortunate once again to provide the celebrations of the Children’s Liturgy of the Word at the 10:00 am Mass. At this Mass, the children in the assembly are dismissed from the main body of the church after the Opening Prayer. They go to the church’s chapel and hear the proclamation of the Sunday Scripture Reading assigned to that day’s Mass, receive instruction based on those Readings from a catechist, recite the Profession of Faith and offer Prayers of the Faithful. Afterwards they return to the main body of the church and are reunited with their families. The Children’s Liturgy of the Word is intended for children Kindergarten – 6th grade. Since this is a classroom-like situation, the catechist, aide and children will have to wear a face-covering and practice proper social distancing when in the chapel area. I encourage families with children K – 6th grade to celebrate the 10:00 am Mass so their children can have the opportunity to participate in the Children’s Liturgy of the Word. This service is offered by our parish’s Religious Education Program, so if you have any questions please don’t hesitate to contact that office.

St. Francis of Assisi is the Church’s patron saint of animals and environment. A popular custom on his feast day, October 4th, is the opportunity for the blessing of animals. Here at St. Colette Parish we will observe the annual blessing of animals on the parish parking lot on Monday, October 4th at 6:00 pm. Please bring your family pets, large or small, on Monday, October 4th and participate in this very popular custom.

On Tuesday of this week, October 5th at 7:00 pm, staffs and parishioners from the four parishes that make up our Family of Parishes (Our Lady of Victory, St. Colette, St. Edith, St. Kenneth), will gather at Our Lady of Victory Church in Northville for our Family’s Commissioning Service. With our transition to a Family of Parishes, the four parishes come under the care of a team of “Family Pastors” who share responsibility for all four parishes. The four pastors are: Fr. Denis Theroux (OL Victory), Fr. Jim McNulty (St. Edith), Fr. Tom Belczak (St. Kenneth) and me. In formal terms, this means that each pastor receives a new assignment from Archbishop Vigneron naming them “Family -Pastors.” At the Commissioning Service the pastors are installed and prayed for as they assume their new pastoral responsibilities.

Everyone is invited to attend the Family of Parishes Commissioning Service on Tuesday, October 5th at 7:00 pm at Our Lady of Victory Church in Northville. The Commissioning takes place during a Liturgy of the Word Service and not a Mass. Afterwards there will be a reception serving light refreshments. Please attend this Service and join others in prayer as we venture into this new reality of Family of Parishes.

Communal Celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick This Sunday, October 3rd, In the Church at 1:15 pm

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is intended for anyone seven years and older who is chronically ill, undergoing medical testing or surgery, disabled by disease, age or addiction, or is affected by psychological or emotional problems. As the title states, this is a sacrament for the sick and not the dying!

If you need to celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, please join others this Sunday, October 3rd at 1:15 pm in the church. The celebration of the sacrament will begin once everyone is assembled and depending on the number being anointed the ritual should take approximately 20 – 30 minutes.

The communal celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick takes place in our parish every month (usually the first Sunday). The personal celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may take place anywhere and anytime there is a need for it (like prior to medical testing or surgery). Contact the parish office to arrange for the personal celebration of this sacrament when the need arises.

Fall (Traditional) Homeschool Information

This fall, St. Colette Parish does not offer an on-site, in person, traditional school year of catechism. Instead, students can attend religious education classes offered by the other parishes of our Family of Parishes: Our Lady of Victory in Northville, St. Edith in Livonia, or St. Kenneth in Plymouth. You can find the information for our Family of Parishes Fall catechism programs on our website (stcolette.net) under Religious Education then Children’s Faith Formation.



We do offer a homeschooling program during the fall for those families that would like to work one-on-one with their child at their own pace. Registration ended September 20th. Please call the Religious Education Department at 734-464-4435 for registration information.

Children’s Liturgy of the Word starts October 3rd

Do you have a child in Kindergarten to 6th grade? Beginning October 3rd, each week at our 10:00 am Mass trained catechists will provide a short experience exploring the readings for your child(ren). Children are to sit with their families as Mass begins. Before the Readings the priest will offer a blessing and the children will be dismissed to the chapel with seasoned Catechists who will share with them the Readings for that weekend and then discuss with them the content so that they will understand. The children then come back into the Mass as the gifts are being brought forward and return to sit with their families. No registration is required and ALL children are welcomed every weekend. Please consider attending the 10:00 am Mass so that your child(ren) can participate in this wonderful opportunity. **Please note: Children are REQUIRED to wear masks in the chapel for Children’s Liturgy of the Word since this is a Catechism setting.**


PARISH PICNIC THANK YOU





He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery." And people were bringing children to him that he might touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw this he became indignant and said to them, "Let the children come to me; do not prevent them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it." Then he embraced them and blessed them, placing his hands on them.

Genesis 2:18-24 • Hebrews 2:9-11 • Mark 10:2-16 From the beginning of creation, God made them—Mark 10:6

What do you think of when you hear the phrase: right relationships? Do you think of making sure you surround yourself with the right people, good, loving and faith filled; or do you think of doing relationships correctly? And if the second what does that mean, to do relationships correctly? Our readings this weekend speak of the Sacrament of Marriage, but what we bring to marriage is what we are to bring to all our relationships. Yes, when two people stand before God and pledge themselves to each other the assumption of the Church is that both people will work and work hard to keep that relationship healthy and whole. Notice we don't call this sacrament of love and service the Sacrament of the wedding ceremony. The ritual is only the beginning of a lifetime of sacramental love and service to each other. A lifetime that is meant to be filled with committed love, forgiveness, presence and partnership. All too often couples spend years preparing for the ceremony and minutes working at constructing a solid foundation for a lifetime lifegiving relationship. But one of our take-aways from this weekend's readings is the idea that all relationships require our investment and hard work. If we believe that God is in all the created universe (and this is a teaching of our Church), then all that we meet should be treated with committed love, forgiveness and our full attention. No one is unimportant or expendable or should be invisible. Let us do all that we can to support those married couples in their sacramental life and work hard at seeing Christ in everyone we meet.

Let us pray: *Dear God, bless those who are married and help me to value everyone I encounter.*

Reflection: What do you think makes a good marriage? Can you find those qualities within yourself? If not what can you do this week to work on that?




