



Communal Celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick Next Sunday, November 7th In the Church at 1:15 pm

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is intended for anyone seven years and older who is chronically ill, undergoing medical testing or surgery, disabled by disease, age or addiction, or is affected by psychological or emotional problems. As the title states, this is a sacrament for the sick and not the dying!

If you need to celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, please join others next Sunday, November 7th at 1:15 pm in the church. The celebration of the sacrament will begin once everyone is assembled and depending on the number being anointed the ritual should take approximately 20 – 30 minutes.

The communal celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick takes place in our parish every month (usually the first Sunday). The personal celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may take place anywhere and anytime there is a need for it (like prior to medical testing or surgery). Contact the parish office to arrange for the personal celebration of this sacrament when the need arises.

Pastor’s Corner

Today, October 31st children (and many adults) will be observing Halloween with parties and “trick or treating” receiving candy and other treats from family members and neighbors. Please keep them in your prayer’s so they may have an enjoyable and safe observance this year.

Our English word, Halloween is an abbreviated version of “All Hallows Eve” because “hallow” means holy or another word for someone who is a saint. So, Halloween is the Eve (or day before) that we celebrate all the holy ones (the hallowed) of our Christian faith. We call this day, November 1st, All Saints Day. On All Saints Day we have the opportunity to remember all the holy men and women whose names and lives we know and those who have been forgotten in human history. We look to them as our spiritual heroes and our role models and are called to imitate their lives of courage and trust in God.

All Saints Day is such an important observance in our faith lives that the Church designates it as a Holy Day of Obligation for Catholics to celebrate Mass. However, when November 1st is on a Monday or Saturday, as it is this year, Catholics are dispensed from the obligation to celebrate Mass. For those who desire to celebrate the All Saints Day Mass on Monday, November 1st, Mass will be celebrated in our church at 9:00 am.

All Saints Day is followed on November 2nd with the observance of the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, better known as All Souls Day. This is the day we remember all our deceased brothers and sisters in death. Though this day is not a Holy Day of Obligation, it is a popular day for Catholics to celebrate Mass and to remember their loved ones who have died. Masses on All Souls Day will be celebrated in our church on Tuesday, November 2nd at 9:00 am and 7:00 pm. At these Masses, during the praying of the General Intercessions, we will name all those who have died and were buried from our church since last year’s observance of All Souls Day.

Because All Saints Day and All Souls Day are observed at the beginning of the month, in Catholic tradition the month of November is dedicated as the month of the faithful departed. The theme of death for November fits this time of year for people living in the northern hemisphere of our planet. The harvest is complete, the concept of dying becomes more evident in our outdoor plants, cold weather and a hint of winter are in the air and the days are filled with less sunshine.

In our parish church we observe the month of November with the long scroll located on the back wall of the sanctuary and the memorial mum plants decorating the worship space. The scroll lists the names of all the deceased who were buried from our church during the past year. At the baptismal font you will notice the Book of the Names of the Dead. During the month of November, you may write in the book names of family members and loved ones who have died. Another way for us to remember the faithful departed is that we are invited to bring to church photographs of our deceased loved ones and place them on the windowsills of the church. The photos will remain on the windowsills throughout the month of November. At this time of the year please remember in your prayers and sacrifices all the faithful departed.

Tuesday, November 2nd is Election Day in many communities. Please remember to go to the polls on Tuesday and exercise our very important responsibility and moral obligation of voting in public elections.

On Wednesday, November 3rd at a Mass celebrated at 7:00 pm, we will welcome to our parish Most Rev. Gerard Battersby, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Detroit, as the presiding celebrant for our annual celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation for the students of our Religious Education Program. Please pray for our students as they celebrate their full sacramental initiation into the Catholic Church (the other two being Baptism and First Eucharist). We congratulate this year’s Confirmation Class and thank their parents, sponsors, catechists, as well as Theresa Lisiecki, Mary Jo Parnell, Aleta Cheal, Aileen Picano and Suzanne Sims for their dedicated involvement preparing them for this very important day in their faith lives.

Finally, next weekend is the time our country ends Daylight Saving Time. When you go to bed on Saturday, November 6th please remember to set your clock BACK one hour! Remember: we Spring forward/Fall back. I’m sure for many people this is one of their favorite nights of the year because we can stay up late and still get an extra hour of sleep!

Guidelines for Face-Coverings And Social Distancing in Church

In light of the current surge in COVID-19 cases, the Archdiocese of Detroit has updated guidelines regarding face coverings and social distancing: All Mass-goers, regardless of vaccination status, are encouraged to wear face-coverings and to practice social distancing when in church.

More extensive social distancing is available in the side sections of pews (along the windows) where every second pew is used. In the center sections of pews, please try to practice some form of social distancing by avoiding sitting directly behind the person/people in front of you.


We Need Altar Servers – Children, Teens & Adults

However, most of us don't realize that altar serving is not limited to children and teens. Adults are welcome to serve as well. Altar serving at St. Colette Parish is open to all males and females from the third grade and older.

If you are an adult male and served as an altar server in your youth, or, always wanted to serve but didn't get the opportunity, you are a perfect candidate. If you're an adult female who in your youth wanted to be an altar server but were not allowed to serve because it was limited only to boys, then you too are a perfect candidate. A husband and wife may serve together as a couple. A parent (or parents) can serve with their child or children and make it a family activity.

Maybe God is calling you or your child to be an altar server here at St. Colette Parish. Did you know that our faith is not about pleasing ourselves, not about bartering with God to get what we want? Our faith is about pleasing God. Just as God is a trinity our faith is based in a three-fold relationship: God, others and ourselves. How do we honor and please God? By loving. First and foremost, we are to love God with everything we have within us, meaning our character strength, our mind in seeking to understand God and with our heart in love and prayer. Faith does not stop there. If anyone says they don't need other people (Church) to honor God, they are wrong. We need one another not to take care of us, although that happens when we give ourselves over to the community; but in service as we learned in last week's Gospel. But this commandment to love does not stop there. We must also love ourselves, not in the "gimmie/get what I want" way. We love ourselves by taking care of our need for health and rest. Love is a very complicated thing but so very worth it if we do it right.

Let us pray: *Dear God, give me the strength to be good and loving to all I meet including myself.*

Reflection: Heart, Understanding, Strength. These are the three ways we are to love God. Pick one and come up with one way you will seek to love God in this coming week.

November: Month of the Faithful Departed Bring a Photo of Your Deceased Loved One to Church

As a way of remembering our deceased loved ones you are invited to bring to church a photograph of them which will remain on display throughout the month of November. The photo can be of a deceased parent or grandparent, child or grandchild, relative, neighbor, or friend. The photos can be 5 x 7" or 8 x 10" or smaller to accommodate room for other photos. When you bring the photo or photos to church simply place them anywhere on the window sills located on either side of the main body of the church. Photos should be framed (though not necessary) and please include your name and phone number on the back of the photo. Photos can be placed in the church beginning the weekend of October 30th/31st and they will remain in church until the weekend of November 27th/28th. Photos not taken home on November 27th/28th will be taken to the parish office and the person whose name is on the back of the photo will be contacted to make arrangements to pick up the photo at the office.

Book of the Names of the Dead

In the Catholic tradition the month of November is dedicated to the remembrance of the faithful departed. Located at our church's baptismal font is the *Book of the Names of the Dead*. In this book people have written the names of deceased family members and loved ones. During the month of November you are invited to do the same. Before or after Mass please visit the area near the baptismal font and include names of the deceased you want to be remembered during this time of the year.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

The Daily Examen of Stewardship

“Stewardship” can get a bum rap these days. When folks hear the term “stewardship” from the pulpit, their eyes tend to kind of glaze over. “Here’s Father asking for more money,” they groan inwardly, “Get ready for the passing of the pledge cards.”

Christ refutes this idea when he gives us what he calls the greatest commandments — instructing us to love God and to love our neighbor. Now, Christ is a man who chose his words carefully. He meant exactly what he said — and he didn't say that the greatest commandments were to tithe and to give money to charity. If he had wanted stewardship to be only about money, he would have said so.

Sometimes we are indeed called to show our love for God and neighbor in the form of a financial gift. But the concept of Everyday Stewardship — living mindfully in prayer, grateful for our blessings, and gracious to our neighbors, committed to God, and accountable to each other — is about so much more.

I propose a twist on the long-held practice of the “Daily Examen” — a pious devotion wherein, at day's end, we go over the events of the last 24 hours and discern God's will. A Daily Examen of Stewardship might contain questions like this:

*How did I love God today? In whom did I love Him?
What did God give me today? With whom did I share it?
What did I give to Him?
To whom did I reach out today? Who reached out to me?
Where was God on my list of priorities today? First?
Second? Third, fourth? — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS ©LPI*


