SALAM ! SHALOM ! PAX ! PEACE ! And, of course, HAPPY VALENTINE'S DAY ! This week we also have another 'day of love', ASH WEDNESDAY. It may seem at first glance that these two are 'miles apart' in what they celebrate and illuminate. But they both point toward LOVE. Valentine's Day does so by encouraging us to identify specific persons as the objects of our daily love. It invites us to treasure all the many people in our lives whose presence and words and actions make our lives worthy and satisfying. They are worth noting. They are worth the effort of a card or flowers or candy. It is worth the effort ! Ash Wednesday likewise invites us to identify that we have a 'loved one' whose

love lead to His Birth, Life, Suffering and Death. And then, love lifted Him even from the grave. Lent invites us to show by repeated small gestures – prayers, fastings and good works – both that we appreciate what Jesus has done for us, both in the distant past as well as here and now, and that we want to paint each moment with His love. For Forty Days – excluding Sundays and the Tridium of Holy Week – we wallow in the joy and hope and energy that comes from being so loved. Enjoy St. Valentine's Day. Make the extra efforts it inspires (life, made up of small moments, is best celebrated in many small ways). Then commit yourself to truly engaging in Lent this year – despite the pandemic – by being part of Ash Wednesday (perhaps even at Church), and dedicating yourself to do some Prayer, Fasting and Good Deeds through Lent. This week celebrate both that you are loved – and find life most satisfying when you love in return.

We are blest to be here in Canton and vicinity with it being so very cosmopolitan. It has encouraged me to investigate and appreciate the many cultures and religions that surround us. This week we find this expressed in the fact that so many of them celebrate NEW YEAR at this time. January 29 thru 31 was Buddhist New Year, for the Mahayana version. February 12 is the Lunar New Year for the Confucians, Daoists, and other Buddhists – in conjunction with Nirvana Day on February 15. The Baha'i balance their lunar calendar with Ayyam-i-ha for four days. It is not really just a coincidence that we have Ash Wednesday at such a time. (However, remember, all history has occurred in just 365 days.) Perhaps this year, a year of 'healing', is a good time to see how we can start something new as well. Have a great Lent !

The SEARCH discussion groups continue – we have eight of them at various days and times, some focused on certain groups (eg. men, women, teens, recent moms). It may be just the thing to inspire your Lent this year – by 'connecting'. Contact the office for help joining. Remember, YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE ! WE ARE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER. Wear your Masks ! Keep your distances ! Wash your hands ! BE RESURRECTION ALIVE ! Christ IS RISEN ! Alleluia ! He is RISEN indeed ! Alleluia !

Lenten Disciplines of Fasting & Abstinence

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

Thank You Message from Fr. John

On the weekend of Jan. 30/31 I was scheduled to preside at the Sunday 11:00 a.m. Mass. However, due to an impending snowstorm that Sunday, I asked Fr. Tom if I could switch Masses with him and take the Sat. 4:00 p.m. instead. He graciously agreed. The Saturday 4:00 p.m. Mass attendees were surprised to see me, as I am not usually at Resurrection on that day. I mentioned offhandedly that the reason why I was there was because of the impending snow storm (which failed to materialize!), and the fact that I didn't have snow tires on my car. I said they were the summer tires the car originally came with when I bought it new in the fall of 2019, and I was trying to squeak one more winter out of them before replacing them with a set of all season tires (because I am cheap!).

I was therefore quite surprised when last Sunday I found an envelope in the sacristy with my name on it containing \$600 for new tires! Fr. Tom told me that some parishioners had taken up an impromptu collection for me. Well, I am very touched and deeply grateful for this spontaneous act of kindness and generosity! In the future, I will also be more careful about mentioning any material "needs" I may have, less this becomes a habit! God Bless you all.

From Duty to a Grace-filled Lent

Lent is a forty-day season often set aside for fasting, prayer, and giving to the poor in preparation for Easter. It is like a spring cleaning for the soul. In fact, the word "lent" is from the Middle English "Lencten," meaning spring.

What do you think of when you hear the word "lent"? How has Lent gone for you over the past couple of years? Are you stuck in a rut? Have you made Lenten resolutions only to give up quickly? Or have you not bothered lately because they just feel like a duty? Want to try something new?

Maybe this could be the year Lent inspires your heart and soul! Lenten "sacrifices" are not a Church requirement for Lent, but they can be a wonderful avenue to notice God more in your life. Here are 5 suggestions that might help you to have a great Lent:

- 1) Get creative about what might feed your soul. This week's Sonrise is full of great Lenten options. Ask God to stir interest as you read the possibilities. Notice which ones catch your eye and ask God what might be a good fit for you this year. Are you working from home so you could finally attend one of Deacon Paul's Friday morning Bible studies? His engaging stories and his mastery of scripture will feed your faith! Has all the stress of the past year made you a little self-focused? Then consider filling a "Love in a Box" for a local family who is struggling. Have you avoided the Stations of the Cross because it reminds you of being forced to attend them as a child? Consider carving out 30 minutes a week and doing a self-guided tour of Resurrection's outside Stations of the Cross. You can walk or drive them and there is an audio guide available on our Facebook page to help you "pray as you go".
- 2) Keep it simple. It is better to choose one or two things that you feel passionate about rather than a long list of good intentions. You will be less discouraged, and you will be able to get the most out of the commitments you do make.
- 3) Choose something that will make you more loving, not less. Dorothy Day's confessor encouraged her to not give up smoking for Lent. Refraining from smoking had been her yearly sacrifice but others in her community found her unbearable to live with during that time. Instead, she was invited to pray for the grace to want to give up smoking and her desire for smoking eventually vanished. Remember, the goal of Lenten sacrifices is to draw you closer to God, not to make you and everyone who knows you miserable!
- 4) Have some accountability to make it happen. Encourage your spouse or a friend to do your Lenten sacrifice with you or at least ask regularly about how things are going. If you are doing it on your own, set up a spreadsheet so you can "check it off" each day or set a daily alarm on your phone to remind you. You can also take time now to carve out the time in your planner for the next 6 weeks. What would it take for you to follow through on your Lenten commitments?
- 5) Allow your Lenten sacrifice to be an invitation to pray. Are you doing a Love in a Box? Pray for the recipient each time you place something in the box. "Giving up" criticizing? When you notice your critical spirit, invite God to see the situation with love. Resist the urge to do "religious things", and instead notice God's presence and compassion this Lent. Don't miss the opportunity to find a Lenten plan that is right for you!

Current list of needed items include:

- Pasta & Pasta Sauce
- Canned meats (tuna, chicken, spam)
- Paper products, bar soap
- Cereal (hot and cold)
- Canned fruits and vegetables
- Coffee, tea and sugar
- Hearty soups with meat (beef, chicken)
- Peanut butter, jelly, honey
- Can or box potatoes and rice

Leave the food items in the box to the south side of the entrance doors or bring inside to the front kitchen. Watch expiration dates.

LaMora Clinic Committee News

The La Mora Clinic continues to care for the sick especially during the pandemic. Due to the severity in the area the clinic has requested that we authorize funds to help refurbish one of the rooms in the clinic. The new space will be used exclusively to treat those with or suspected of having Covid-19. It is important to make the space safe for the staff and the other patients at the clinic. We have authorized \$2,000 for this project. The additional funds that we have sent will be used to help with salaries and to purchase medications and medical supplies.



Brothers and sisters, Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God. Avoid giving offense, whether to the Jews or Greeks or the church of God, just as I try to please everyone in every way, not seeking my own benefit but that of the many, that they may be saved. Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ.

Gospel: Mark 1: 40-45

A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean." The leprosy left him immediately, and he was made clean. Then, warning him sternly, he dismissed him at once.

He said to him, "See that you tell no one anything, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer for your cleansing what Moses prescribed; that will be proof for them."

The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter. He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere.



In today's Scripture passage from Leviticus, the Lord God instructs Moses and Aaron in the ancient Israelite camp how to handle carefully those who have leprosy. In St. Mark's Gospel, the evangelist through Jesus' words, shows Christ's compassion to a leper who asks our Lord: If you wish, you can make me clean. In spite of Jesus' directive not to, the man publicly professes his miraculous healing. St. Paul exclaims: Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God and to imitate Christ in all things. As Jesus' followers, how do we extend compassion and love to those on the margins of society? Please reflect on offering time at a local soup kitchen or homeless shelter that serves our less fortunate sisters and brothers.


