


This Friday, Mar 5

LaMora Clinic

From time to time we hope to share with you some of the plight of the Salvadoran people who have experienced so much tragedy and hardship for many years. They are immensely grateful for all our parish has done and continues to do to help them through the support of the La Mora Clinic. We share the following event which occurred in 1980 in El Salvador:

On December 2, 1980, four North American women were abducted and killed by Salvadoran troops on a remote stretch of highway outside San Salvador. Several days later their bodies were exhumed from a shallow grave: Maura Clarke and Ita Ford, both Maryknoll Sisters; Dorothy Kazel, an Ursuline Sister; and Jean Donovan, a lay missionary from Cleveland. Each had followed a different path: Maura and Ita, with many years in mission in Nicaragua and Chile; Dorothy, the longest in El Salvador; Jean Donovan, only twenty-seven, who had wrestled with the possibility of marriage and a lucrative career before choosing to remain in El Salvador. But for each one, called by Christ to live out her faith in solidarity with the poor, the path had led to the same cow pasture.

In those nightmare years in El Salvador, thousands of civilians were killed by security forces on suspicion of "subversion". Representatives of the Church who embraced the "option for the poor" shared the same fate. Witnesses to the cross, they joined a long line of witnesses to the resurrection.

In a letter that Sr. Ita Ford wrote to her niece shortly before her death she said "I hope that you come to find that which gives life a deep meaning for you. Something worth living for - maybe even worth dying for, something that energizes you, enthuses you, enables you to keep moving ahead. I can't tell you what it might be - that's for you to find, to choose, to love. I can just encourage you to start looking and support you in the search".

These are truly in the mix for those who respond to the call of Ash Wednesday for PRAYER – FASTING – and GOOD DEEDS.

But we also have a second aspect to this Friday. Being First Friday, as we always do, there will be at the 8:30 am Mass both the SACRED HEART devotion as well as the ANOINTING of the SICK. PLEASE JOIN US. However, being the only First Friday during Lent, Mass will be followed - at roughly 9:30 am.- by PRIVATE CONFESSIONS. As you know, we do them each Saturday from 2:45 till 3:30 pm. Further, we will have a Communal Penance Service later – on March 24 at 7:00 pm. But this provides an additional opportunity for those who desire this aid to spiritual health. PLEASE JOIN US ! (As you know, our Family of Parishes also offer Confessions at various times and ways – i.e. private or communal. Check them out on the web.) and check-out the bulletin or the Blast for other opportunities here at Resurrection.

CONGRATULATIONS to Karen Hogan and her teams for a wonderful and inspiring Lenten Event last Sunday evening ! I admit that even I am becoming more open and appreciative of these 'zoom' events. THANK GOD for such resources ! THANK YOU , Karen ! CONGRATULATIONS to all who participated ! I am glad to see that the Little Black Books and the Word Among Us prayer aids are being used. (The PURPLE books help the children.) We believe we will soon have an additional resource for you. And there is always the BEST aid – the BIBLE. Finding the Promise in the Passion

Lent is upon us and this liturgical season traditionally reminds us of suffering and our need to turn to God. For many of us, suffering has been a persistent companion over this past year. Some have even called the past 12 months a perpetual Lent- we have been asked to give up a lot and we have come face to face with many hardships in our lives and in the world. How might we best live into this season of Lent as we reflect on our current lives? Perhaps we can discover meaning as we acknowledge our hardships and also trust in God's promises in the midst of our losses.

I am reminded of Mark's gospel account of the Crucifixion and Jesus' cry, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" For many years, this passage shook me to the core. I was overwhelmed with the hopelessness that I heard in this lament. Did Jesus truly feel forsaken by his Father? Was he wondering if he had been wrong about being the Christ, about God's plan, about a bigger picture? If my faith was based on the Risen Lord, I knew that I needed to reconcile Jesus' desperation on the cross with the Promises of God. I then discovered Psalm 22 and I realized that Jesus was praying the first line of this psalm. Like many pious Jews of his time, Jesus would have memorized most, if not all, of the psalms and would have used them regularly for private and communal prayer. "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" begins a psalm of lament that expresses great anguish and suffering. The psalmist speaks of being scorned and mocked, his hands and feet pierced, even having his clothes divided. Early Christians saw Psalm 22, written over 500 years before Christ, as a prophetic depiction of Jesus' passion and death.

But Psalm 22 does not only speak of suffering. The second half of the psalm acknowledges the anguish but also points to God's promise of redemption. It speaks of God hearing the pray-er when he cries out to Him and of the psalmist proclaiming God's name to the assembly. It promises that future generations will be told of the Lord and that they will remind those yet unborn, "He has done it!" Psalm 22 doesn't deny the suffering, but it does offer a hope of everlasting victory in the midst of the hardship.

How might Psalm 22 and the Passion narratives speak into our lives today? I invite you to consider three ways:

- First, when we are broken, we can turn to our memorized prayers just as Jesus prayed a familiar psalm during his darkest hour. Traditional prayers can bring profound comfort to us and those we care for during difficult times.
- Second, Jesus' Passion and this psalm invite us to cry out to God with the rawness and the messiness of our feelings. We don't need to pray with a cleaned up, "Christian" version of our emotions. Jesus understands our pain and he wants to be present for us in our distress. Jesus demonstrates that there is a profound and mysterious comfort when we are authentic and brutally honest with The God Who Knows Suffering.
- Third, we can remember that even in times of great tribulation, we can cling to God's promises just as Jesus did. This doesn't mean that we simply say "Praise God" even when life is horrible. Instead, it means that we acknowledge the hardships and at the same time trust in the hope that is in Christ. Consider praying with Psalm 22 this Lent and ask God to bring to light His suffering as you lay your troubles at the foot of His cross.







First Reading: Genesis 22: 1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18

God put Abraham to the test. He called to him, “Abraham!” “Here I am!” he replied. Then God said: “Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a holocaust on a height that I will point out to you.”

When they came to the place of which God had told him, Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood on it. Then he reached out and took the knife to slaughter his son. But the LORD’s messenger called to him from heaven, “Abraham, Abraham!” “Here I am!” he answered. “Do not lay your hand on the boy,” said the messenger. “Do not do the least thing to him. I know now how devoted you are to God, since you did not withhold from me your own beloved son.” As Abraham looked about, he spied a ram caught by its horns in the thicket. So he went and took the ram and offered it up as a holocaust in place of his son.

Again the LORD’s messenger called to Abraham from heaven and said: “I swear by myself, declares the LORD, that because you acted as you did in not withholding from me your beloved son, I will bless you abundantly and make your descendants as countless as the stars of the sky and the sands of the seashore; your descendants shall take possession of the gates of their enemies, and in your descendants all the nations of the earth shall find blessing— all this because you obeyed my command.”

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 116

Response: Our blessing cup is a communion with the Blood of the Lord.

Second Reading: Romans 8: 31b-34

Brothers and sisters: If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him?

Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us, who will condemn? Christ Jesus it is who died—or, rather, was raised—who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us.

Gospel Acclamation: Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel: Mark 9: 2-10

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them. Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here! Let us make three tents: one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified. Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them.

As they were coming down from the mountain, he charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone, except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead. So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what rising from the dead meant.

The Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

The topic of sacrifice links today's First and Second Readings. In Genesis, Sarah and Abraham are blessed in their older years with their only son, Isaac. God tests Abraham by directing him to sacrifice Isaac. As Abraham is about to follow through, a messenger from heaven proclaims: Abraham, Abraham! ... Do not lay your hand on the boy Abraham offers a ram in place of his son. To encourage the Christian community in Rome, St. Paul reminds them that God sacrificed His only Son ... who intercedes for us. In St. Mark's Gospel, the evangelist tells of Christ's Transfiguration, where God the Father clearly reveals Jesus in His glorified state. Jesus then alludes to Peter, James, and John of His death and Resurrection. Our own giving of the "first fruits" of our prayer, service, and generosity back to God, our parish, and our neighbor, are solid acts of Christian love. Sacrifice brings great joy, peace, and grace to those who embrace stewardship in their lives. This Lent, in a spirit of evangelization, pause and reflect on how you can use your God-given gifts to spread the Good News of the Gospel.




