



HEARTS ON FIRE at Sacred Heart

Where Faith is Known, Lived, & Shared

I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing. (Luke 12:49)

On November 22, 2020, Archbishop Vigneron wrote a Pastoral Note on Families of Parishes: Led by the Spirit on Mission. In the following weeks we will view and pray with excerpts from that Note.

LISTEN to the Archbishop: "And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." These final words of Our Lord should give us confidence to face head-on the challenges we see. Whether they are challenges within the Church or in our culture, we need only to remember Jesus' promise. When I was made a bishop almost 25 years ago, I chose the words "*Aspicientes in Jesum*" as my motto: "Keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus." They express this same sentiment: confidence that Jesus keeps his promises. The great virtue of the Christian life is perseverance in the midst of trials and uncertainty. Jesus has promised to remain with us. Jesus is trustworthy because he died for us. Je-sus is all-powerful because he rose from the dead. Therefore, keep your eyes on him and trust him.

PRAY: Tear or cut off this prayer and keep it where you'll remember to pray it throughout the week
Come, Holy Spirit, to Sacred Heart Church and to our Sister Parishes in our Family: Infuse us with the grace of confidence in our Lord Jesus! In all things fix our eyes on Him who alone can guide us on the path you desire for us, even as we encounter trials and uncertainties. Give us strength to persevere because we know Jesus is trustworthy in fulfilling his promise to be with us always. Do not let our eyes wander anywhere but steadfastly on Jesus. Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faith-ful and kindle in us the fire of your love as we gaze on His holy face. Amen!

ACT: What is this Note saying to *me*? I must ask myself, and answer honestly, whether I "keep my eyes on Jesus," even and especially when in the midst of trouble. And my honest answer is "no," even though I know I should. I will pray to the Holy Spirit to give me the wisdom and strength to do that better this week—when I am frustrated or upset, let me see the face of Jesus and follow Him.

Saint OF THE WEEK

MARCH 24 | ST. CATHERINE OF SWEDEN

On March 24, it is the feast day of St. Catherine of Sweden. Catherine of Sweden, Saint, the fourth child

of Saint Bridget of Sweden and her husband, Ulf Gudmarsson. At the age of seven she was sent to the abbess of the convent of Riseberg to be educated and soon showed, like her mother, a desire for a life of self-mortification and devotion to spiritual things. At the command of her father, when about thirteen or fourteen years old, she married a noble of German descent, Eggart von Kurnen. She at once persuaded her husband, who was a very religious man, to join her in a vow of chastity. Both lived in a state of virginity and devoted themselves to the exercise of Christian perfection and active charity. Despite her deep love for her husband, Catherine accompanied her mother to Rome, where St. Bridget went in 1349.

Soon after her arrival in that city Catherine received news of the death of her husband in Sweden. She now lived constantly with her mother, took an active part in St. Bridget's fruitful labors, and zealously imitated her mother's ascetic life. Although the distinguished and beautiful young widow was surrounded by suitors, she steadily refused all offers of marriage. In 1372 St. Catherine and her brother, Birger, accompanied their mother on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land; after their return to Rome St. Catherine was with her mother in the latter's last illness and death.

In 1374, in obedience to St. Bridget's wish, Catherine brought back her mother's body to Sweden for burial at Wadstena, of which foundation she now became the head. It was the motherhouse of the Brigittine Order, also called the Order of St. Savior. Catherine managed the convent with great skill and made the life there one in harmony with the principles laid down by its founder. The following year she went again to Rome to promote the canonization of St. Bridget, and to obtain a new papal confirmation of the order. She secured another confirmation both from Gregory XI and from Urban VI but was unable to gain at the time the canonization of her mother, as the Schism delayed the process. When this sorrowful division appeared, she showed herself a steadfast adherent of the party of the Roman Pope, Urban VI, in whose favor she testified before a judicial commission. Catherine stayed five years in Italy and then returned home, bearing a special letter of commendation from the pope. Not long after her arrival in Sweden she was taken ill and died. Catherine wrote a devotional work entitled "Consolation of the Soul", largely composed of citations from the Scriptures and from early religious books; no copy is known to exist. She is the patron saint of Europe, against abortion and for healing and protection from miscarriage.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Any good teacher or parent will tell you that once a lesson is really learned it doesn't need to be taught again. When we internalize things we have learned, they become a part of who we are and influence how we perceive and interact with our world. The same is true for the law God has written upon our hearts. Once humanity learns this lesson, we will simply know it to be true and act accordingly. Sometimes, it is hard to get people to learn the lessons they need to learn. They are often distracted, disinterested, conflicted, misdirected, or just too stubborn and unable or unwilling to see what is right before their eyes. Understanding that God is in a loving and committed relationship with those fashioned and formed in God's own image, seems like such a simple lesson to learn. But history and experience has proven that it is not.

We struggle with faith, especially when that faith asks us to learn something very particular about ourselves. We must, like a grain of wheat, fall to the ground and die. Because God's DNA is at the very core of who we are, there are specific pearls of wisdom that must be acquired before we can live a full life. One very powerful lesson is that it is not the task of the world to tell us who we are and what has meaning, but God. For many, death is not an opportunity for greater life but a permanent ending to the life they have known. Jesus knew every dimension to what it means to be fully human because he was! He knows the joys, limitations, sorrows, frustrations, wonders, suffering, opportunities, and joys of the human experience. Jesus can teach us a wealth of knowledge and life's lessons from his example, especially obedience.

When we accept the law God has placed in our hearts and gain wisdom from it, then when we suffer we learn to listen more attentively to the Voice behind that law. We naturally flee to our Creator for inspiration, consolation, hope, direction, and comfort as we navigate through this time of darkness. We will not need to run from it, subdue it, fight it, or be overcome by it because we will know, having internalized this profound lesson before, that God will bring new life. God's law is love and love never fails. Even in the moments of Jesus' deepest despair, he glorified the name of his Father. What he learned allowed him to put everything in perspective and be obedient to the tender, loving Voice that echoed within. As Lent quickly winds down, may we learn the same! Then, may we gain the fortitude and wisdom to help others see what is right before their eyes. ©LPI




A BIBLE STUDY ON THE ANNUNCIATION

INSIDE THE SCRIPTURAL ROSARY



From its traditionally held inception as a gift from the Blessed Mother to St. Dominic to the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary in the victory at Lepanto, to the addition of the Luminous mysteries by Pope John Paul II in 2002, the rosary has long been one of the most treasured prayers of the Catholic faith.

Why pray the Rosary?

Each of the 20 mysteries of the rosary — Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful and Glorious — takes us through the life of Jesus, from the Annunciation to the Coronation of Mary. The Word of God in the Gospels is translated to the beads of the rosary. Pope John Paul II reflects, in *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, on the mysteries beginning with Mary's experience, a truth which emphasizes the rosary's contemplative nature. He further quotes Pope Paul VI, stressing that the contemplation of the rosary and its mysteries mustn't be lost, or it runs the risk of becoming a passive repetition rather than an intentional meditation on the mysteries.

The rosary is also one of the most powerful tools of intercessory prayer that Catholics can wield. Our Lady has urgently asked Catholics at many times to pray the rosary for particular intentions; just as the communion of saints has often responded to her request, so can Catholics today, offer a daily rosary for the intentions of the Holy Father, for the salvation of the world or for any intentions one holds in their heart.

In his pastoral letter *The Power of the Word of God*, Archbishop Vigneron too recommends a continued reverence for this prayer, noting especially the connection between the rosary and the Word of God. He writes that "It is especially fruitful to pray the Scriptural Rosary, which makes more explicit the biblical foundations of the mysteries."

What is a Scriptural Rosary?

A Scriptural Rosary provides the opportunity to not only meditate on each mystery during a decade's prayers, but to also recite a verse of sacred Scripture between each Hail Mary or a longer passage between each decade. The Knights of Columbus provide a guide to praying a Scriptural Rosary, with suggested verses for the Glorious, Luminous, Sorrowful, and Joyful mysteries.

The ample opportunity for reflection and meditation in a Scriptural Rosary is not unlike the intentional listening and meditating one experiences during the practice of *lectio divina*. A Scriptural Rosary almost blends pieces of a *lectio divina* study into a rosary to craft one contemplative prayer experience: one reads a verse before a Hail Mary (*lectio*), meditates on its connection to the decade's mystery (*meditatio*), prays the appropriate Hail Marys with the mystery and Scripture verse in mind (*oratio*) and journeys through the rest of the rosary with renewed connection to the Scripture (*contemplatio*).

"Meditation engages thought, imagination, emotion, and desire," the Catechism teaches. "This mobilization of faculties is necessary in order to deepen our convictions of faith, prompt the conversion of our heart, and strengthen our will to follow Christ... This form of prayerful reflection is of great value, but Christian prayer should go further: to the knowledge of the love of the Lord Jesus, to union with him."

Use the Scriptural Rosary to both engage in meditative prayer and seek deeper knowledge of our Lord. To deepen one's knowledge through sacred Scripture is to become familiar with the voice of God and, in turn, be more equipped to hear him in one's life. ~ Maggie Sicilia Bickerstaff

We are cautioned to be especially careful during the Coronavirus outbreak. Here are some simple ways to keep sickness away.




WASH YOUR HANDS
