



Dear Friends,

This weekend we hear how our Lord provides heavenly food for the Israelites to eat. From this, Jesus makes the proclamation, that He is the Bread of Life. Given this truth, we must consider in our prayer, how we can set aside our "wants and/or wishes" in order to be created anew in the image of God, as His divinely adopted sons and daughters.

Jesus, through the Most Holy Eucharist, *shares Himself* with all of us who are willing to RECEIVE HIM and BELIEVE in HIM. However to **receive** Him with *eyes of faith*, knowing then it is Him in the Eucharist, sometimes requires setting aside "what we think we want" to answer His divine call.

Ask yourself in prayer, after receiving Him (Jesus) in the Eucharist —when receiving the Lord's most sacred presence — His body, blood, soul, and divinity — **how, in a personal sense, am I called to respond to Jesus?**

This is one of the primary means by which God heals and strengthens individuals through the experience of Christian community. Someone with this gift has an amazing ability to create a warm, welcoming environment in which a person's needs for nurture and companionship are met.

PRAY: *Tear or cut off this prayer and keep it where you'll remember to pray it throughout the week*

*Come, Holy Spirit, Lord of the Gifts, to Sacred Heart Church and to our Sister Parishes; Open our minds and hearts to hear your voice and feel your direction. Reveal to each of us the special and particular gifts (Charisms) You have given to us to use for others, especially in our Sacred Heart parish and Family of Parishes. Provide opportunities for **me** to test and discern whether I might have the **Charism of Hospitality**. Then reveal to **me** how I can use the Charisms you've given to **me**. Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in each of us the fire of your love as we discern and use the Charisms you have given. Amen!*

ASK & ACT: What is this note saying to **me**? Do I feel that hospitality is central to **my** living as a disciple so that I do whatever I can to make guests feel welcome? Do people tell **me** that they love spending time in my home, many feeling free to just drop by? Do I gladly open my home and provide food and shelter for others, even when I am not prepared to have guests? Have newcomers told **me** that I have made them feel especially welcome in the parish, at work, or in a group? Do I find it as fulfilling to welcome guests or strangers to **my** home or community as I would welcome Jesus? I will Pray over these questions, asking God to lead me into discernment of whether (or not) He has given me the **Charism of Hospitality**.

Saint OF THE WEEK

AUGUST 5 | SAINT EMYGDIUS

On August 5, it is the feast day of St. Emygdus. Emygdus was born in Treves, Germany of a noble Frank family. When he was 23, he embraced the faith of Christ despite opposition of his parents who were idolaters, and this faith he steadfastly professed. He lived with three disciples, Euplus, Germanus and Valentinus. He scorned human pleasures, and thus he applied himself the more entirely to divine things. Fired with a burning love of the neighbor, he journeyed to Rome to bring about the salvation to many souls, and he was there received as a guest, in the Island of the Tiber, where he cured, by baptism, the daughter of his host, who had been ill for five years of an incurable disease. A little later he opened the eyes of a blind man, in the presence of the people by the sign of the Cross. Thereupon the crowd, thinking that he was the son of Apollo, carried him off by force to the Temple of Aesculapius. He there declared himself the servant of Christ, and by calling upon Christ's name he restored to health a great number of sick persons, who were vainly beseeching the help of the idol. Emygdus tore down the altars, and having broken in pieces the statue of Aesculapius, he cast it into the Tiber. These acts, and the conversion of thirteen hundred of the heathens, which followed, together with that of the priests of Aesculapius, enraged Posthumius Titanus, the Prefect of City. Emygdus, by the counsel of an angel, escaped from his threats, and betook himself to the Pontiff, Saint Marcellus, by whom he was consecrated Bishop, and sent to Ascoli.

On his way to Ascoli, Emygdus made more conversions, and performed a miracle where he made water gush out of a mountain after striking a cliff. Polymius, the local governor, attempted to convince Emygdus to worship Jupiter and the goddess Angaria, the patroness of Ascoli. Polymius also offered him the hand of his daughter Polisia. Instead Emygdus baptized her as a Christian in the waters of the Tronto, along with many others.

Enraged, Polymius decapitated him on the spot now occupied by the Sant'Emidio Red Temple, as well as his followers Euplus, Germanus, and Valentinus. Emygdus stood up, carried his own head to a spot on a mountain where he had constructed an oratory (the site of the present-day Sant'Emidio alla Grotte). After Emygdus' martyrdom, his followers attacked Polymius' palace and pulled it down. The blessed death of Emygdus took place during the persecution of Diocletian.

Emygdus is the patron saint against earthquakes.



Reflect AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

First Reading:

Early in their Exodus journey, the Israelites expressed fear and frustration to Moses. God heard and responded to their "grumbling" by sending bread from heaven. **When you have you experienced God answering your plea for help?**

Second Reading:

Paul told the Ephesians that as believers in Christ you should "put away" the bad parts of "your former way of life." **How have you done this in your life as a believer in Christ?**

Gospel:

We hear today the introduction of Jesus' extended "bread of life" discourse. In referring back to the ancient Israelites who ate "manna" (bread) in the desert, Jesus tells the crowds: "I am the bread of life." **How would you explain to someone how Jesus sustains you?**



The fruitfulness of evangelization depends upon the graces called down through intercession.

- ~ *For docility to the Holy Spirit and the boldness and courage of the apostles to put the mission above all else as we transition to Families of Parishes.*
- ~ *For those in our Family of Parishes, and especially in Sacred Heart, who are resistant to any changes as we transition to any new ways, to be at peace with the Holy Spirit*
- ~ *For our nation, that a sense of peace and civility would fill the hearts of leaders as we heal and move toward unity.*
- ~ *May those in Sacred Heart parish trying to discern the Lord's will, including those discerning their Charisms, be led to the knowledge of their personal mission for the Kingdom, along with the will and strength to accomplish it.*

We ask all this in the Name of the Father, the Son & the Holy Spirit (Sign of the Cross). Amen.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

"You cannot see the forest for the trees" is a widely known saying that can bring wisdom to our understanding of our journey. Often, our sight becomes limited to what is immediately before us. We lose touch with lessons and experiences from the past and promises and hope for the future. As human beings, we have the privilege of being able to choose things. What I like and don't like, want, and don't want can be major preoccupations of our minds and hearts. Our preferences and desires begin to define us more than the simple fact of our being. Who we are matters more than what we are or what we have. If we don't move beyond the external and superficial stuff to what really is of essence, we risk becoming very unsettled, disorientated, angry, and unhappy. We fail to see the bigger picture of hope and promise that lies ahead and the Divine Presence that has sustained and carried us before.



We like it when the "now" time of our lives satisfy us. Even the people who witnessed Jesus feed the five thousand got confused and distracted. It felt good when thousands of people were able to eat. They wanted to know what they could do to get this to happen again! But Jesus quickly reminds them that this is not the point of this sign. As much as the now time of our lives is of concern, it is not what is ultimately important. We need to learn the difference between being and doing, drawing more strength from who we are and who God is rather than what is happening around us and the choices we can make. Jesus is the true bread that came down from heaven. Jesus is the very incarnate presence of God who sustains life and assures us that we will not perish. This is not easy to understand and feel. We have to practice being in the presence of ourselves, others, creation, and God. We are brought to a holy place when we encounter the sacredness of being. This is real prayer.

Then, we learn to trust. It is when we cease trusting that we start to become afraid, uncertain, apprehensive, and doubtful, and overly self-concerned. We even start to grumble. God has our back. That is the essential powerful message of the living bread come down from heaven. God, who is alpha is also omega, the beginning and the end, and has everything in between in his care as well. A woman once remarked that her most powerful God moment happened when she and her husband cuddled with their new baby for a time. Without exchanging words and using only the affection communicated through sight and touch, they rested in being with each other. This brought them to the sacred, where they realized that a greater Being was with them. It was real. They knew that they were part of something bigger, intimate, and profound. When we rest in the Living Source of life, we will find that our souls are no longer hungry or thirsty. ©LPi






