SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

Embarking on this New Year we encounter today (Sunday) the three wise men in search of the Christ child. I believe our lives too are shrouded in searching.

God, the Father is constantly in search of us, His children, who have wandered away from the fold. The Father sends His son Jesus so we don't have to search amidst the dangers and toils of life. Jesus is present when we search for how He provides for us each and every day. Divine Providence gives us what we need. The danger was robbers, murderers and those in power who cared little for life (like the Roman Emperor). They were willing to search, amidst the danger, because they wanted to know truth.

Many today are searching and they don't even know what they are searching for, or the fact that their soul is searching for consolation from their Creator God. Consumerism, politics, financial woes, medical mysteries, the pandemic, the loss of control is the evil's way of saying our Savior is a myth. The Evil one





Mary's Son.





“I have set watchmen, Jerusalem, upon thy walls, that shall never cease crying aloud, day or night; you that keep the Lord in remembrance.” (Isaiah 62:6)

Did you know we have our very own “watchmen” protecting us here at St. Paul on the Lake? That’s right, our watchmen are the *church bells* residing up in the bell tower. In a previous bulletin article we learned about the *Sanctus bells*, which remind us that at the sacrifice of the Mass heaven is opened up, so that we might join our prayers with all of the angels and saints in giving thanks and praise to the Lord. In this article we will take a similar look at church bells, what they are for, and how they act as our watchmen.

Why do we have church bells? What is their purpose? From several Old Testament references as well as their practical use throughout the centuries, we come to learn that church bells have three main purposes – bells act as a call to sanctify time, a call to worship, and a call to battle.

First, church bells act as a *call to sanctify time*. Back in the middle ages, villages and farms were more or less gathered around monasteries. And when the bells of the monastery would ring the farmers knew that the monks would be praying. Though the farmers could not go to the church, they wanted to join in prayer. And so when the bells would ring, especially at 6 AM, noon, and at 6 PM, the farmers would stop working, take off their hats and they would pray.

Today our church bells do the same thing. When the bells ring throughout the day at St. Paul on the Lake, they remind us that God is present in the day-to-day of our lives, when we are at our desks or in our home, when we are running errands or meeting with friends. When the bells at St. Paul peal at noon and 6 PM we are reminded to pray, knowing that God is present whether at a lunch break or sitting down for dinner. The bells are there to remind us that God our heavenly Father...a Father rich in love and mercy... is present *always*.


Second, church bells act as a *call to worship*. At St. Paul on the Lake, the bells peal at five minutes before Sunday Mass. The bells are thus calling us to come to the church. They are calling us to go from normal time into a holy time...a time set apart...into God’s time. The prayers of the Church, especially the prayers of the Mass, take us out of time and into eternity. They take us out of the mundane and into heaven. In the Mass heaven meets earth, and we are joined to God. The choirs of Angels come down and we are together with God and with all his angels and saints who praise Him. And so the bells call us to *that* heavenly worship. They call us into heaven.

Finally, the bells are a *call to battle*. No, not a political battle, and not a battle of nations, but rather a spiritual battle. Did you know that church bells typically receive a special blessing when they are installed for church use? At the time of the blessing the Bishop prays,

“Pour out on this bell the dew of the Holy Spirit. Whenever it rings may the enemy of the good take flight, the Christian people hear the call to faith, the empire of Satan be terrified, your people be strengthened as they are called together in the Lord, and may the Holy Spirit be with them as He delighted to be with David when he played his harp...and when the peal of this bell resounds in the clouds may a legion of angels stand watch over the assembly of your Church, the first-fruits of the faithful, and afford your ever-abiding protection to them in body and spirit.”

So the bells act as our watchmen, calling down the legions of angels by God’s power to banish the forces of Satan, to bring us into battle and lead us into victory over sin, over hell, and over death. God’s power leads us to victory over the struggles in our own lives...victory over the difficulties in our marriages and families...and victory over the sins with which we struggle. The bells remind us that God and all of his angels and saints are with us to help fight the battle, and to win. This is the victory assured to us by Christ’s Passion and Resurrection. Alleluia, Christ is victor!

So today and every day the bells call us to *sanctify time*, to remember God in the midst of every moment of our day. The bells call us to *worship*, to come into heaven with the rest of the Church to praise God. And the bells call us to *battle*, to fight against the wickedness and snares of the devil, to fight against the world and the flesh, to fight to win for our kids, to win for our families, and to win for our own souls. May we rejoice one day with God in heaven, and may we all begin the heavenly reign as kingly priests even now as we live on earth!

MAKE A WARM FLEECE-TIE BLANKET: We are blessed by our partnership with the local charity, *Blanketed with Love*. Students and families have the opportunity to assemble a cozy blanket (at home) for someone in need. Blankets will be donated to St. Aloysius Parish, Gianna House and The Pope Francis Center. The kit includes instructions; sharp scissors are required but will not be provided. Volunteers are encouraged to make a \$15-20 donation to offset the cost of the fleece. Please specify how many blankets you wish to complete when calling to sign-up.

SHOP AND PACK SENIOR GROCERY BAGS FOR SENIORS IN NEED: St. Aloysius Parish has a food pantry program that benefits senior citizens in need of food. Volunteers or families are encouraged to shop and fill one or more Senior Grocery Bags for those in need. BLESSING BAGS: Volunteers are needed to pack and prepare bags filled with basic necessities and non-perishable food; including warm gloves, hand warmers, granola bars, socks, etc. Bags will be given to homeless men and women in need by St. Aloysius Parish and St. Leo's Soup Kitchen. 

- Fruit: 1 or 2 cans
- Vegetables: 2 cans
- Soup: 2 cans
- Juice: 1 can or 2 juice boxes
- Meats: 1 can of one of the following – Tuna, Chicken or Beef
- Cold Cereal: 1 box
- Hot Cereal: 1 container Oatmeal or Grits

Dry Items to include:

- 1 bag of dried rice
- 1 bag of dry beans
- 1 box of macaroni and cheese
- 2 boxes of different of pasta or noodles
- 1 desert/brownie or cake mix
- 1 sleeve saltine crackers
- Sauces: 1 can spaghetti sauce OR 1 can of tomatoes
- Instant Potatoes: 1 box or can
- Milk: 1 package dry milk

ST PAUL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS AIDS FOUR SEMINARIANS

The St. Paul Knights of Columbus gave four seminarians a \$500 scholarship.

Deacon Robert Karle SJ is in his eleventh year of Jesuit formation and will be ordained a priest in 2021. He is studying theology at a Jesuit theologate in Berkley CA. Bobby is also very proficient in yoga and spearheads Ignatian Yoga. His grandparents are Don and Gertrude McSorley (both now deceased) who were longtime St. Paul parishioners. Deacon Bobby is proud that he will be using the chalice given to his grandmother by the St. Paul KofC when his grandfather died.

Brother Luke VanBerkum, OP, a member of St Paul Parish, is in his fifth year in the Dominican Order and is studying theology at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington DC. He will profess final vows in the Dominican Order in February, 2021, and will be ordained a deacon in March, 2121. Br. Luke's brother, Fr. Anthony Van Berkum OP, also a St. Paul parishioner, was ordained a priest in 2020. Their parents, Mark and Michaele VanBerkum, are also St. Paul parishioners.


The Dominicans are known as the Order of Preachers – hence the OP behind their names. The Dominicans and the Jesuits operate and teach at many colleges in the United States and do parish work.

James Bird, who served at St. Paul last summer, is in his first year of theology at Sacred Heart Major Seminary in Detroit. **Arturo Medina** is in his first year of philosophy at Sacred Heart Major Seminary. They are both diocesan seminarians. At Sacred Heart Major Seminary, those entering with a college degree take two years of philosophy and four years of theology. Fr. Colin of St Paul suggested both these men for the KofC grant.

For many years the St. Paul Knights of Columbus have collected scholarship funds from the parish monthly bottle and can drive. Thus far, the St. Paul KofC have given sixty five \$500 scholarships to aid seminarians.

The parish bottle and can drive takes place on the second full weekend of each month. **The seminarians and the KofC thank those who have helped by giving your bottles and cans.**

Much more importantly than this financial help, the seminarians appreciate and need our prayers. **Please pray that these four men and other continue their studies and priestly formation and be good priests.**

Catholic Funerals and COVID-19

Catholic Funeral Rites

The following excerpts are taken from the General Introduction of the *Order of Christian Funerals*

Contrary to common assumption, the purpose of the funeral Mass is not to celebrate the life of the deceased but to offer worship to God for Christ's victory over death, to comfort the mourners with prayers, and to pray for the soul of the deceased. Relatives or friends who wish to speak of the deceased's character and accomplishments can do so at a prayer service to be held in a home or funeral home or at the graveside following the rite of committal. **According to the Order of Christian Funerals, there is never to be a eulogy at a funeral Mass** (Order of Christian Funerals 27.)

The funeral liturgy is the central liturgical celebration of the Christian community for the deceased. When one of its members dies, the Church encourages the celebration of the funeral liturgy at a Mass. At the funeral liturgy, the Church gathers with the family and friends of the deceased to give praise and thanks to God for Christ's victory over sin and death, to commend the deceased to God's tender mercy and compassion, and to seek strength in the proclamation of the Paschal Mystery. The funeral liturgy, therefore, is an act of worship, and not merely an expression of grief.

"At the death of a Christian, whose life of faith was begun in the waters of Baptism and strengthened at the Eucharistic table, the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end, nor does it break the bonds forged in life. The Church also ministers to the sorrowing and consoles them in the funeral rites with the comforting Word of God and the Sacrament of the Eucharist." (Order of Christian Funerals, no. 4)

Updated Funeral Mass Directives at St. Paul

- **Eulogies are not allowed at funeral Masses here at St. Paul on the Lake Catholic Church.**
- **In-State gatherings are suspended at this time.**
- **Due to COVID-19 livestreaming is welcomed during a funeral Mass, *only if* the family provides any and all equipment and personnel.**
- **Cremated remains will be placed in our new ossuary (see photo). Framed photos, pictures, or memory boards are not allowed in the church proper during the funeral.**


