Today ends the celebration of Easter time with the phenomenal Solemnity of Pentecost. On Christmas, we celebrated the birthday of Jesus Christ in his physical body. On Easter, we celebrated his resurrected body from the dead. At the Ascension Jesus, in his glorified body, takes his rightful place in heaven. Today, we celebrate the birthday of the Church, with Jesus sending us forth filled with the Holy Spirit of His love.

The first Christians prepared to go forth by spending time together in prayer. In prayer, they united themselves with Mary. The Christians were all of one mind, under the leadership of Peter. With the outpouring of the Spirit, the first Christians were empowered, and we are today to tell everyone the awesome works of God.

Where do we get the confidence to tell everyone about Jesus and the Kingdom of Heaven? First, the Holy Spirit moves our being to enter into prayer: to commune with the Risen Lord Jesus and the Father. Many times, we do not know what to say or do in prayer. If we just put ourselves in the presence of God, by quiet and focused thoughts on God, the Holy Spirit will move our being (though we may not feel or experience anything) to do the good works entrusted to us by Jesus Himself. In other words, if we ask the Holy Spirit to enlighten our mind and heart, we will be encouraged to fulfill our mission. Always know that if we trust the movement of the Holy Spirit to guide us, even if we are unclear if we are actually doing so, He will indeed guide us! This trust in the power of the Holy Spirit to move us to fulfill our mission can best be tested by the Spirit's fruit. In Galatians 5:22-23 Paul gives us the fruits of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Our prayer, under the influence of the Spirit, leads to action. Our actions should reflect the fruits. Sure, we can say that we do not need to pray to have some of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. We may have love or peace but it will not be

complete and it will lack the other fruits, especially joy and faith (which are infused virtues). When we are lacking then it is very easy to be led astray by the evil spirit. Remember there are two spirits: Evil and Holy. If we are not engaging in the movement of the Holy Spirit then we are allowing the evil spirits to take hold and move us away from Love itself: God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

In the end, prayer and action are the marks of a true Christian. The Holy Spirit, if we call upon Him (in prayer), will help us to achieve our mission, which is God in action within our lives.

Today, and every day, we need to pray to the Holy Spirit asking Him to open our minds and hearts to the wonder of Jesus. In doing so we too can fulfill the mission entrusted to us by God the Father. Please see page 5 for prayers to the Holy Spirit.

COVID-19 UPDATE - MAY 19, 2021

Parishioners and guests who are fully vaccinated, defined as two weeks after the last vaccination dose, are no longer required to wear a mask anywhere inside the church. 



In reality, being filled with the Holy Spirit means being filled with the fullness of God's life and in touch with the power and wonder of God's presence. It is the Holy Spirit that draws us together as a community of faith, inspires us with wisdom and right judgment, and turns us from the darkness of sin to the virtues that bring life. We live in a world where it is hard to discover truth. The Holy Spirit, through the ministry of the church, guides us to truth and shows us the way to be the graced human beings God made us to be. Come, Holy Spirit, and fill our hearts!

Greetings,

When I introduced myself in my first bulletin article, I shared that I have a particular love for *The Lord of the Rings* trilogy by J.R.R. Tolkien. As many of you have been introducing yourselves to me – which has been awesome by the way! – several of you have shared that you also love *The Lord of the Rings*. As a tribute to all my fellow LOTR nerds, I decided to write about two of my favorite themes from that trilogy this week.

Hobbits and Humility: Tolkien, the author of *The Lord of the Rings*, created his own species to be his main heroes: hobbits. Hobbits are like humans but they are shorter and simpler. While humans live in cities, build large buildings, wage wars, and expand their kingdoms; the hobbit people live in a very small out-of-the-way country where they farm, dwell in small, comfortable, hobbit-holes, and live quiet lives. The rest of the world pays zero attention to them because they are so extremely ordinary. But, contrary to all expectations, they end up saving the world. To make a long story short, there is a magic ring which contains the essence of the evil lord Sauron. To defeat him, the ring has to be thrown into the fires of Mt. Doom (a volcano), where it was forged. The problem is, the power of the ring is so great that, when anyone carries it, their minds are invariably corrupted, they claim the ring for themselves, and use its power for evil. Everyone, that is, *except hobbits*. Hobbits are so simple and ordinary that the power of the ring does not tempt them in the same way that it tempts others. I believe that this story captures something profound: we all look for greatness in the wrong places. Money, power, talent, knowledge, these aren't ultimately the worthwhile things. What is worthwhile is having a simple heart that is capable of simple love, and more often than not, having all that other stuff only gets in the way. It corrupts and leads to evil. That is why the most important heroes in Lord of the Rings are not the learned, the strong, or the brave, but the simple-hearted. What is true in *The Lord of the Rings* is ultimately, I believe, true in the real world as well: *only hobbits can resist evil and save the world*.

A Light for when All Other Lights Go Out: In the first book, Frodo, one of the hobbits, spends time with the elf-queen Galadriel, and as a parting gift she gives him a glass vial which has the light of a star trapped in it. When shaken, the vial emits a beautiful light. She says that it is “A light for when all other lights go out.” Later on in the story, Frodo gets trapped in a pitch-black tunnel and almost gets eaten by a giant spider. It is only this vial of light which allows him to fend off that hideous creature and escape. J.R.R. Tolkien always insisted that he deliberately avoided allegory in his stories – which means he never *deliberately* tried to make any character or event symbolize something else – but he also admitted that because of his strong Catholicism he couldn't help modeling Galadriel off of his image of Mary. With that in mind, I think it is very interesting that the “Mary” character gives Frodo “the light for when all other lights go out.” St. Mother Theresa used to say that in her darkest moments she always turned to Mary; and many, many Catholics have experienced Mary's intercession and motherly care during moments when nothing else seemed to work. For me, that moment in *The Lord of the Rings* when all other lights have gone out for Frodo and the gift of Galadriel is the only light that he can turn to, is a perfect image of what the Blessed Mother wants to do for us in our darkest moments.
