Encourage Deeper

Understanding of Scripture

Jesus is the true and authentic cornerstone and shepherd. It is only in following the Risen One as the way, the truth, and the life that we can move from being well grounded ethical people to properly focused moral ones. Proper conduct, a true sense of justice, wisdom, virtue, moral principles, faith, hope, and love will be difficult to find unless we listen to the right Voice. It is when we learn to listen to the voice of God that we begin our journey on the road to salvation. It is only the Good Shepherd, the authentic and solid cornerstone, who can guide us through life's questions and challenges and bring us to the safe and proper pasture.

A person's life only has meaning when the cornerstone is properly selected and set. Understanding themselves only as random acts of creation, existing without intent or purpose, will color their choices and influence their decisions. The foundation of their lives will be simply a matter of preference and choice, leaving benchmarks of growth and higher ideals optional to pursue. Whereas people who believe that they are fashioned and loved into existence by a God who purposely made them, have this incredible unconditional relationship at their source which has tremendous significance.

Their allegiance is not to themselves but to their Creator. Life, then, is an adventure in search of this Creator God and a journey of self-discovery that seeks to unite their will to His. There is a cost. We have to give up our life in order to gain our life. As ironic as that sounds, it is true. It is only when we finally figure this out that the true cornerstone of our lives will be properly laid and we can, with God's help, get about the business of properly constructing a temple that endures.



Beatification of Father Michael McGivney

Our parish Knights of Columbus and Knights everywhere were blessed October 31, when our Father Michael McGivney, was beautified in an Mass at St. Joseph Cathedral Hartford, Connecticut. The Vatican reorganized a miracle trough Ft. McGivney's intercession for an unborn child in the United States who when in 2015 was healed in utero of a life-threatening condition. The parents had been the option of abortion or to await a still-born child.

Blessed Michael was Born August 12, 1852, in Waterbury, Connecticut. His parents. Patrick and Mary were Irish immigrants and he was the oldest of 13 children. Six died in infancy or childhood. His father worked a molder in a brass mill. Michael attended school in Waterbury, but left at 13 to join his father in the mill.

Michael's life became quite a journey of faith. In 1868, at the age of 16, he entered Seminaire de St. Hyacinth in St. Hyacinthe, Quebec. He went on to Niagara Falls, New York, to study at Our Lady of Angels Seminary and to St. Mary's College, Jesuit school in Montreal, Quebec. In June of 1873 he returned home to help with siblings after the death of his father. Michael returned to his studies at St. Mary Seminary in Baltimore and was ordained a priest on December 22, 1877, by Archbishop James Gibbons in Baltimore's Cathedral of the Assumption.

Blessed Michael witnessed the anti-Catholic bigotry on his day and also how many immigrants were struggling to assimilate into American life and economy. There were also devastating effects on families when a father, the primary wage earner in those days would die. On May 29, 1882, while an assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Connecticut, Michael founded the Knights of Columbus with a group of parishioners as a mutual aid society to provide financial assistance to widows and orphans. The organization developed as a fraternal society and also provided life insurance to members. Michael worked tirelessly for parishioners and throughout the New Haven area, caring for the needy, Catholic and non-Catholic.

Michael spent seven years at St. Mary's then in 1884 became pastor of St. Thomas Church in Thomaston, Connecticut. On August 14, 1890, the eve of the Feast of the Assumption, he died of pneumonia.

The Knights of Columbus is the world's largest Catholic fraternal organization, with more than two million members of councils in North and South America, Europe and Asia. The four degrees of membership-core values-are Charity, Unity, Fraternity and Patriotism. Members practice Catholic Faith and adhere to Church's social teachings. They also give hands-on assistance in various situations and the Order provides financial aid to numerous causes and relief efforts in the Catholic and secular world. In 2019, the Knights donated \$187 million and 77 million man-hours. Its insurance company is one of the world's largest.

The Roman Catholic Church

Humanly speaking the Catholic Church could not have survived against all the odds that were present at its beginning, and even at its duration throughout its history. Its Divine Founder, Jesus Christ, did not have a place where He could rest His head. He was poor. Lived a public life of only three years. He was contradicted and misunderstood so often that at one time He asked whether his disciples should leave Him (Saint John Chapter 6). Even his immediate followers, the twelve apostles, were with Him thinking that they will eventually be rulers in His earthly kingdom. At the Last Supper, He was appalled that one of His own could not understand that He and the Father are one. He was betrayed by one of His closest friends for just thirty pieces of silver. He was denied three times by the one He chose to be the leader, the rock, of His Church. Except for one of his apostles, John, He died abandoned by the rest of His apostles.

When He rose from the dead, as He had predicted, His apostles would not believe it. Ironically, his enemies, the very ones that accused Him and insisted that He should die crucified among thieves, knew that he would rise again, and had His tomb guarded by Roman soldiers. Against all human logic, He rose from the dead by His own power. Never in the history of the world had anyone been risen from the dead by their own power. The guards at His tomb were bribed and were told to say that Jesus' body was stolen while they were asleep, which means indirectly that there was an admittance to His resurrection. (Thomas, even though he was told that Jesus had been risen, would not believe it.) The conclusion is that the apostles could not have fabricated the story of Jesus' resurrection.

After Jesus' Ascension into heaven, the apostles locked themselves in a room. There they prayed. They were too afraid to go out to preach about what Jesus told them, when He said, "Go to the whole world..." How could they go out to the whole world when they were so scared as to even talk in public in front of their own people? Then the great miracle happened: these timid fishermen, without schooling and without resources, were filled with the Holy Spirit (on Pentecost) and fearlessly preached so effectively that the Acts of the Apostles tells us that Peter was converting people by the thousands. People from different countries were hearing the Apostles' words in their own languages. The apostles were so convinced of their teaching that they even suffered martyrdom for what they were saying. In other words, if they would have had doubts, they would not have put their own lives in jeopardy of being killed.

When all the apostles died, the infant church suffered major persecutions for about three hundred years, mainly by the Roman Emperors. Christians were being mercilessly killed because of their faith. If the Church of Jesus Christ were not divine, like her Master, it would have been obliterated from the face of the earth by then. The Roman Emperor was considered divine, and he wanted that all his subjects would worship him. The Christians could and would not do that, because they knew that adoration and worship belongs only to God. That same belief that those people had in those days is still shared by us to this very day. We see that when Jesus said, "I will be with you till the end of days", He literally meant it. No human force, though they had tried, can destroy the church from the face of the earth.

How to Go to Confession...

May the Passion of Lord Jesus Christ, the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the saints, whatever good you endure, heal your sins. Help you grow in holiness, and reward you with eternal life. Go in peace.
Rite of penance, no. 93

1.) Preparation: Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayers and reflect on your life since your last confession: How have you in your thoughts, words, and actions neglected to live Christ's commands to "love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind" and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 23:27, 39). As a help with the examination of the conscience you might review the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes (Ex 20:2-17; Dr 5:3-10; or Lk 6:20-26).

2.) Greeting: The priest will welcome you, he may say a short blessing or read Scripture passage.

3.) The Sign of the Cross: Together, you and the priest will make the Sign of the Cross. You may then begin your confession with these similar word: "Bless me Father, for I have sinned. It has been (give days, months or years) since my last confession."

4.) Confession: Confess all your sins to the priest. If you are unsure what to say, ask the priest for help. When you are finished, conclude with these or similar words: "I am sorry for these and my sins."

5.) Penance: The priests will propose an act of penance. The penance might be a prayer, a work of mercy or an act of charity. He might also counsel you on how to better live a Christian life.

6.) Act of Contrition: After the priest has conferred your penance, pray the Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and resolving to sin no more.

A suggested Act of Contrition is: My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart in choosing to do wrong and failing to do good. I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy.
Rite of Penance: no 45

7.) Absolution: The priest will extend his hands over your head and pronounce the words of absolution. You respond: Amen.

8.) Praise: The priest will usually praise the mercy of God and will invite you to do the same. For example, the priest may say: "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good". And your response would be "His mercy endures forever."

9.) Dismissal: The priest will conclude the sacrament often saying "Go in Peace".

If it has been a while since your last confession, remember, "Do not fear" (Is 41"10). The priest will help guide you. And feel free to take this "how to guide" with you. For more information visit: www.usccb.org/confession.

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
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
