Saint Blaise Throat Blessing

Saint Blaise was the Bishop of Sebastea in modern Day Turkey and was a doctor. The earliest record of his life comes from the medical writings of Aetius Amadeus. St. Blaise is recorded as helping with patients suffering from objects stuck near their throat and many of his miracles St. Blaise performed during his life were recorded 400 years after his martyrdom in the "Acts of St. Blaise." At one point he moved into a cave, where he remained in prayer and people often turned to him for healing miracles. In 316, the now Bishop Blaise was arrested for being Christian by the Governor Cappadocia of Lesser Armenia, Agricola. On their way to jail, a woman sent her only son, who was choking to death on a fish bone, at the feet of St. Blaise. He cured the child, and though Agricola was amazed, still demanded the saint renounce his faith, which Blaise would not do. Therefore, Agricola beat Blaise with a stick at his flesh iron combs before beheading him.

In another tale, St. Blaise was being sent to in prison in Sebastea, and on his way came a poor old woman whose pig had been stolen by a wolf. He commanded the wolf to return the pig, which is-alive and injured –to the amazement of all. When St. Blaise reached Sebastea, the woman came to him and brought two fine wax candles in an attempt to dispel the gloom of the is darken cell. Clearly this is the custom of using two blessed candles tied together to bless throats came from. In the Middle Ages, the saint became quite popular and his reputation as a beast tamer spread. He was he referred as the "saint of wild beats." Many German churches are dedicated to Saint Blaise, sometimes called Saint Blasius.

There is a Saint Blaise Well in Kent, England and the water is believed to have medicinal properties. A Blessing of the Throat ceremony is held every February 3rd at Saint Etheldred's Church in London and Balve, Germany. There is a Catholic middle school named after Saint Blaise, in Bradford, West Yorkshire. The name was dedicated upon the link between Bradford and the woolen industry was connected to the way Saint Blaise was martyred with a wool comb. Saint Blaise is often depicted holding two crossed candles in is hand, or in a cave with wild animals. He is also shown with steel combs. The similarity of these steel combs are the wool combs made a large contribution to Saint Blaise 's role as the patron saint of wool combs and wool trade. God Bless!

Brothers and Sisters,

Strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts. But I shall show you more excellent way.

If you speak in human and angelic tongues, but do not have love, I am resounding gong or a clashing cymbal. And if have the gift of prophecy, and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge: If I have all faith so as to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing.

If I give away everything I own, and if I hand my body over so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, it is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interest, it is not quick tempered, it is not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrong doing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never fails. If there are prophecies, they will brought to nothing; if tongues, they will cease. If knowledge, it will be brought to nothing. For we know partially and we prophesy partially, but when the perfect comes, the partial will pass away. When I was a child, I used to talk as a child, think as a child, reason as a child, when I became a man, I put aside childish things. At present we see indistinctly, as in a mirror, but then face to face. At present I know partially, then I shall know fully, as I am fully known. So faith, hope, love remain, these three: but the greatest of these is love.

Jesus began speaking in the synagogue, saying, "Today this Scripture is fulfilled in your hearing." And all spoke highly of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They also asked, "Isn't this the son of Joseph?" he said to them, "Surely you will quote me this proverb, 'Physician, cure yourself; and say, 'Do here in your native place the things we had heard were done in Capernaum.' and he said, "Amen, I say to you, no prophet is accepted in his own native place. Indeed, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Elijah when the sky was closed for three and a half years and a severe famine spread over the land. It was none of these that Elijah was sent, but only to a widow in Zarephath in the land of Sidon. Profession of Faith–Nicene Creed

Winter Safety

Every season has its own safety challenges, but winter presents some that can have life changing consequences. Here are some timely reminders:

- 1) Inspect space heater cords before using and keep children and pets way from any units in use.
- 2) Make sure that furnaces, fireplaces and wood stoves are venting properly and install at least one carbon monoxide detector in your home.
- 3) Keep a winter emergency kit (blanket, flares, water, snack bars, bright colored material and shovel) in your car.
- 4) Shovel safely do not overexert, do a little a time. When using power equipment keep scarves, coat and winter clothing away from machinery.
- 5) If confined at home, do some simple indoor exercises each day to maintain mobility.

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive you into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally.
