Stewardship Ties

There is a lot of imagery around Christmas that has to do with adoption — or, more specifically, with a child being loved by another as if they belonged to that person and loved in such a profound way that in time, they do come to belong to that person.

We see this with Joseph and the infant Jesus. Joseph is not Jesus' biological father. But through a series of actions, and through his faithfulness in small, everyday matters, Joseph becomes the foster father of Jesus.

Perhaps we are parents who have adopted children, or we ourselves were adopted. We have also seen how, through a series of actions of love and sacrifice, someone can become the parent of a person who is not their "blood." A lot of times these families celebrate the day of the adoption. I've heard it called a "gotcha day," and it's marked joyously, like a birthday.

Most of us are not descended from the Israelites, God's Chosen People. But through a series of extraordinary actions of love and sacrifice, God has made Himself our parent, too. And through our own actions, and through faithfulness in small and everyday matters, we are His children.

But in this family, instead of blood ties, we have stewardship ties. It's not about who we look like, it's about how we treat one another. How we take care of one another.

So this Christmas, let's think about how we will celebrate our adoption. As much as it is Jesus' birthday, it's also our "gotcha day" - the day we received the gift of eternal family. — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS




Healing Prayer





Candy Canes

AGAPE Center

The Agape Center is your North Macomb resource center for those living within our boundaries who seek emergency food and financial assistance. We are located at 347 S. Main Street in Romeo. Our mission is to help the Church share our love and resources with our most vulnerable neighbors.

Helping us to achieve this mission are our many dedicated volunteers and partner churches: St. Clement of Rome (Romeo), St. Isidore (Macomb), SS. John and Paul (Washington), St. John Vianney (Shelby Twp.), St. Kieran (Shelby Twp.), St. Lawrence (Utica), St. Francis/St. Maximilian (Ray) and St. Therese of Lisieux (Shelby Twp.). We are also partnered with several St. Vincent de Paul conferences, private donors, Romeo Goodfellows, Romeo Lions Club, the Macomb Food Program, Forgotten Harvest, United States Postal Service – Romeo and other community groups.

Our eligible food pantry clients receive Easter and Thanksgiving assistance. In addition, our annual Sharing Tree program assists those who need help with providing gifts for their families at Christmas. Gift tags are distributed throughout the community and gifts are returned to the Agape Center for clients to pick up in time for Christmas.

Basic services offered at Agape Center are:

- Food Pantry Open Monday and Wednesday 9:30 a.m. 12:30 p.m. and Thursday 5:30 p.m. 7:00 p.m.
- Forgotten Harvest Rescues surplus food from stores and donates it to emergency food pantries. Each Tuesday afternoon eligible individuals/families are provided with food from the items delivered. Hours are 3:30 p.m. 5:00 p.m.
- **Financial assistance** Given to persons/families referred to the center by a supporting parish or St. Vincent DePaul conference.
- Community First Health Center WIC (Women, Infants and Children) Services Medical professionals give tips on shopping, cooking and eating well and connects moms with children 5 and under with other health and wellness services. The WIC clinic will be open Mondays from 9:30 a.m.- 12:30 p.m. in the pantry area. Please note: Due to COVID, the WIC Clinic is temporarily on hold. If you need their services, please call 586-749-5173, ext. 232.
- Community First Homeless Healthcare A representative will provide access to primary health care services, preventive and emergency dental care and health education and behavioral health services. The representative will be in the pantry area once a month on Mondays from 9:30 a.m. 12:30 p.m. Please note: Due to COVID, the Homeless Healthcare representative is temporarily unable to come. If you need their services, please call 586-552-8333.

The Agape Center depends upon the generosity of volunteers and donors to fulfill our mission of sharing our love and resources with those in need. We are a 501 (c) (3) organization, and all donations are tax deductible. Your donation can be made in memory of or in honor of a family member, friend or special person or group. For your convenience, donations can be made online. Please visit www.agapenorthmacomb.org and click on the "give" page. The Agape Center gladly accepts non-perishable food, personal hygiene items, cleaning supplies, paper products, etc. The Agape Center does not accept furniture, clothing or household items. All donations can be made anytime during pantry hours.

The Nativity of the Lord

"He so loved us that for our sake He was made man in time, through Whom all times were made; was in the world less in years than His servants, though older than the world itself in His eternity; was made man, Who made man; was created of a mother,

whom He created; was carried by hands which He formed; nursed at the breasts which He had filled; cried in the manger in wordless infancy, He the Word without Whom all human eloquence is mute (St. Augustine, Sermon 188)." The miracle of what happens at Christmas is truly an awesome mystery. Revealed in the silent ordinariness of life is God's intimate love for humanity and all that he made. The Word, existing for all time, comes and dwells among us. God kisses us. We can seek and soar with playful delight as a joy never known before fills our heart.

Joy is best expressed through dance. There is just something truly wonderful about the self-abandon a beautiful melodic dance reveals. If we are able to let go and really be free, it celebrates life in a way few other experiences really can. With the birth of Jesus Christ, God takes the Divine Dance to a deeper and more tangible level. We can now not only see what we believe but believe what we see! This most perfect dance is a call to beauty, innocence, truth, purpose, hope, faith, and love. 
