


"A person had a fig tree planted in his orchard: 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should I exhaust the soil?'

"The gardener replied, 'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future."

Luke 13: 1-9

Gospel Connection

The belief prevailed in Jesus' time that disasters and catastrophes were signs of God's anger against sinful individuals or people – those massacred in the temple by Pilate's soldiers during what the Romans perceived as a "revolt" and the workers who were killed when the tower they were building collapsed must have been horrible sinners. Nonsense, Jesus says in today's Gospel. In this



present age, neither good fortune nor calamity are indicators of one's favor or disfavor with God. In the age of come, God will judge the hearts of every soul, regardless of their situation in life.

The parable of the fig tree is a parable of crisis and compassion: the fig tree draws strength and sustenance from the soil but produces nothing in return. Its only value is as firewood. A similar fate awaits those who squander their lives in greedy, selfish pursuits. God is the ever-patient gardener who gives every "fig tree" all the time, care and attention it needs to harvest.

The parable of the fig tree has been called the "Gospel of the second chance." The vinedresser pleads for the tree, asking that it be given another year to bear fruit. We always live in the hope and mercy of God who keeps giving us "second chances" to rise from the ashes of sin to rebuild and reform our lives.

Gospel Reflection

We are called to be signs of hope and "cultivators" of promise for our world: to "plant" and nurture generosity and kindness in the simple offerings of our time, our abilities, our care for those "fig trees" struggling to realize their harvest.

Despite the sadness and tragedy that can cut down our lives in disappointment and despair, God continues to plant in our midst opportunities to start over, to try again, to rework things, to move beyond our hurt and pain to make things right.

Unless our faith takes root within us and becomes not just the rituals, we perform but the values that inspire them, we are like the barren fig tree in the vineyard: lifeless, giving nothing to others, good only for firewood.

The challenge of the Gospel is to take up the crosses of our lives — the crosses that are part of every human experience — and transform them into vehicles of resurrection, seeds for new life, the means for bringing light and hope into life's winters capes of darkness and despair.

Christ calls us to embrace the hope of the fig tree and the determination of the gardener, to remember

that God's endless grace enables us to experience the promise of resurrection in every "death" and Good Friday we experience.

The Seven Last Words of Jesus given during the Lent Season By Deacon Dennis


Lent is a time when we prayfully focus upon Christ's Passion and Death. Jesus spoke seven short expressions, after being nailed to the cross. These statements are now commonly refered to "The Seven Last Words" This Lenten season let us prepare our hearts by reflecting upon the words Christ spoken over 2,000 years ago.

THE THIRD LAST WORD OF CHRIST

"When Jesus therefore had seen his mother and the disciple standing whom he loved, he said to his mother: Woman, behold thy son. After that, he said to the disciple: Behold thy mother." (John 19: 26-27)

Yet again Jesus is continuously compassionate to those around him, making sure that his Mother is cared for after his death. Most scholars speculate that Mary was a widower at the time of the crucifixion. The good son Jesus, without brothers and sisters to provide for his Mother, looks to John to care for her. Just as Christ gave His mother to John, he gives Mother Mary to us.

It is also Lent and as we honor the Sacred Heart, let us also accompany Jesus on His last journey, as He makes His way to His crucifixion. The Stations of the Cross is one of the traditional ways we can pray and remember Christ's suffering during Lent. RE: COVID-19 Updates for Parishes and Schools

The Department of Communications shares the following updated COVID-19 guidelines from the Department of Human Resources, Liturgical Committee, and Department of Catholic Schools. We ask that these updated guidelines be shared with the necessary parish and school staff.



Parish Offices

As COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations continue to decline in the state, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) has updated its mask guidance to reflect that Michigan is entering a post-surge, recovery phase.

During this phase, MDHHS recommends that all individuals, regardless of vaccination status, continue to practice universal masking in high-risk congregate settings (including long-term care facilities, homeless shelters, correctional facilities, jails, and health care facilities). All individuals, regardless of vaccination status, should also wear a mask during isolation and quarantine periods to stop further community spread of COVID-19.

Employers remain under the guidance of OSHA/MIOSHA, who are deferring to CDC guidance. The current CDC mask guidance is based on COVID-19 community levels – low, medium, and high.

LOW: Individuals in areas with low community levels may wear a mask based on their personal preference. MEDIUM: Individuals who are immunocompromised or at high risk for severe illness are advised to consult with their healthcare provider.

HIGH: All individuals, regardless of vaccination status or individual risk, should wear masks in indoor public settings.

The Archdiocese of Detroit advises pastors to institute guidelines to fit the specific needs of their parish offices and employees, based on the above information from public health officials. Please check the CDC's COVID-19 by County tool for information on the risk level of your county.

HR will provide information regarding any new updates as soon as they are available.

Liturgies

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) has announced that Michigan is entering a post-surge, recovery phase of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because this development, as well as recently updated information from the CDC, the Archdiocese of Detroit is making some adjustments to its guidelines for liturgies.

We continue to see different levels of risk across the counties within the Archdiocese. Please check the CDC's COVID-19 by County tool for information on the risk level of your county.

In addition, here are some points to consider as you evaluate the best way to serve in your parish at this time:

- The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages Mass-goers, if they are at risk to wear face-coverings and to practice social distancing to reduce the potential of exposure to COVID-19
- The Archdiocese of Detroit recommends that each pastor/In Solidum team of priests should evaluate their location in the Archdiocese and implement the following protocols:
- Establish an area where social distancing may be observed, if needed
- Encourage masking and social distancing for those who are at risk
- Evaluate the need in your parish for those who distribute Holy Communion to wear face-coverings and use hand sanitizer
- Hang signage indicating masking and social distancing are encouraged for those who are at risk
- Ensure that hand sanitizer is available at church entrances

The faithful are reminded that particular dispensations from the obligation to participate in Holy Mass remain in effect for people who are ill or who find themselves in other specific circumstances. More information is available at aod.org/emergencyresponse.



Priest Vestments

Question:

Why do priests wear vestments? Do they have a special meaning?

Answer:

Vestments are clothes worn for a specific purpose. Priests will joke that they cover a thousand flaws. But our own manner of dress often corresponds to what we do. We dress up for special occasions, and for special guests. We wear certain clothes for golf, for outdoor activities, and years ago, we even had our "Sunday best" clothes we wore just for Church. Vestments are much the same, and each one has a meaning. The alb is a reminder of the baptismal garment. The stole is a symbol of ordained ministry and authority within the Church. The chasuble reminds us that we are on a pilgrimage of faith, passing through this life towards heaven.

Priests wear vestments for two basic reasons. First, they draw attention to the importance and solemnity of the act of worship. The color of the vestments indicates the season of the year or the feast being celebrated. Secondly, vestments draw attention to what the priest does, rather than who he is. In the celebration of the Mass, the focus is on what we do together, on our common unity, and on the mystery and person of Christ.




St Hubert's Knights of Columbus Comes Together with the Parish to Pray



LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

God clearly reveals his identity as "I am who am." God, who is really beyond all names, is the One who simply "is" as the ground of all being. This ever-existing, uncreated, and all-encompassing presence of unconditional God, who is Love, is very patient as he waits for us to grow and change. God is so near to us that it is easy to miss his presence. As true love requires, God seeks a devoted, intimate, free, and exclusive relationship with each of us. As we walk through the parched, desert experiences of our lives it is easily in our thirst for water and a respite from the heat that we reach for and construct idols that will bring us immediate relief and satisfaction. These false gods, made out of our comforts and earthly desires can quickly take the place of the One who really has first dibs on our hearts. Humans have often wandered far away from God as St. Paul reminds us. In helping each other cultivate and fertilize the ground upon which we walk, God gives us yet another chance to bear fruit and return.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

When St. Oscar Romero was appointed Archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, his country was in chaos. Many people in El Salvador were living in poverty, while a smaller elite group controlled all political and economic power. In 1980, El Salvador broke out in a 12-year civil war that left over 75,000 people dead. St. Oscar Romero set up pastoral programs to assist the victims of oppression. He also became an outspoken advocate for human rights, appealing to the Salvadoran military to stop killing their own citizens.

On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was murdered while celebrating Mass in El Salvador. A car pulled up outside, and a gunman fired a single shot straight into St. Oscar Romero's heart.

Calling him a "a martyr for the faith" nearly 40 years later, Pope Francis canonized him in 2018. For the occasion, Pope Francis chose to wear the same blood-stained belt that Romero was wearing at the altar when he died.




