

Dastoral Notes

As we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany this weekend, our Gospel reminds us that Jesus, Emmanuel (God with Us), the Son of God, was introduced and revealed to the world, through the visible sign of a special star, to be the Redeemer of all of the people of the world for all time. If you look at the Infancy Narrative as presented by St. Matthew, there is no detail that gives names to the "Three Wise-Men". It merely states that three gifts were offered. It doesn't say three men. It only says that the three gifts offered were gold, myrrh and frankincense.

As we are now in the first week of the New Year of 2022, we realize that no one of us is expected by the Lord to offer gold, frankincense or myrrh to the Lord. However, we are expected to offer expressions of Christian Stewardship by giving our own time, talent and financial support for the Church through our St. Patrick Parish. God will not be outdone in generosity! Of that, we can be sure! We can ask ourselves: "...What return shall I offer to the Lord, who, in His great goodness has done so much for me?"

I found the following spiritual reflection in our Missalette from World Library Publications that I thought might help you to understand how today's Gospel of the account of the Epiphany of the Lord can have a contemporary message for us in our own time.

"Light. Without it we would not be able to see. It is no accident that in the beginning, the first thing God created was light. And it was good. One special property of light is that it is not diminished by the number of people using it. No matter how many people are already outside on a sunny day, there is no less sunlight for the next person on the scene. Whether the light is from the sun, from a star, from God, or from Christ, it is available to all and diminished by none. Isaiah speaks of the light shining forth from Jerusalem after the Chosen People returned from exile. It guided them back home, but it was also a beacon for people beyond the sea or across the desert. They were invited to witness the glory of God as well. Similarly, the star over Bethlehem was not only visible to the people of Judah. It led the Magi as they journeyed from their home in the east (probably Persia). Not everyone accepted the light (Herod), but it shone forth for all. The light of Christ continues to be revealed all over the world, just as it was during Paul's time. We are all members of the same body, equally illuminated by the light and promise of Christ. How can you be welcoming to all who are drawn to the light of Christ?"

A New Year's Resolution

Perhaps, as we are beginning this New Year of 2022, we might consider what our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has been speaking about recently. He is asking that all of us join with him in prayer to pray to the Lord, the Prince of Peace, that those of us who are "in the household of the faith" re-commit ourselves to live the Gospel of Peace each day and find a way to express that in our daily life in our relationship with one another. How about that suggestion as a New Year's resolution? May we all continue to follow the Star—the Light of Christ until we too, by the grace of God, will be living the fullness of our Heavenly Father's Kingdom—in His perfect light".

It is up to each one of us, in our personal life as a disciple of the Lord, to follow our personal star of hope, faith and love as God continues to lead us—guiding us to one day know "that perfect light". God of incense, we offer you our prayer: our spoken and unspeakable longings, our questioning of truth, our search for your mystery deep within.






In Christianity, the Epiphany refers to a realization that Christ is the Son of God. Western churches generally celebrate the Visit of the Magi as the revelation of the Incarnation of the infant Christ, and commemorate the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6.

Traditionally, Eastern churches, following the Julian rather than the Gregorian calendar, have celebrated Epiphany (or Theophany) in conjunction with Christ's baptism by John the Baptist and celebrated it on January 19; however, other Eastern churches have adopted the Western Calendar and celebrate it on January 6. Some Protestant churches often celebrate Epiphany as a season, extending from the last day of Christmas until either Ash Wednesday, or the Feast of the Presentation on February 2nd.

It will do great work, if I work.


It will make generous gifts to many causes, if I am a generous giver.

Prayer to bless the home:


With chalk write over the entrance door of the home:



St. Elizabeth Ann Seton January 4

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy busi-

nessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

January 2, 2022 The Epiphany of the Lord

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.





The Visit of the Magi

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet:

"And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah: since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.

Change Your Salty Ways

Let's try to kick off 2022 with adopting a new habit.

- * Transform your taste
- * Find (and enjoy) foods with more moderate levels of sodium
 - * Reduce bloating

Over the next three weeks, we will help you curb your salt habit. By choosing wisely, reading nutrition labels, watching your portions, you can start the New Year or even a new week with better eating habits. For example, learning to read and understand food labels can help you make healthier choices.

Look for the Heart-Check mark to find products that can help you make smarter choices about the foods you eat.

Salty Six

During week 1, your focus will be on bread and rolls, cold cuts and cured meats.

Look at the bread wrappers and it will tell you how much sodium is in one piece of bread, then one must multiply that with how much toast one has for breakfast, sandwich at lunch and bread or rolls at dinner.

Cold cuts and cured meats

One, two-ounce serving, or six thin slices, of deli meats can contain as much as half your daily recommended dietary sodium. Even among similar types of foods, the sodium content can vary a lot. Compare the nutrition labels of similar lunch meats and choose the one that is lowest in sodium.

The Light of the Moon

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.

Remember — the magi didn't chart their own course. They merely followed the star.


