# <u>Roe vs. Wade - 49th Anniversary Next Weekend!</u>

Next weekend, we will be commemorating "Sanctity of Life Weekend" and remembering the 49th Anniversary of Roe vs. Wade on January 22nd, the tragic and historic decision of the U.S. Supreme Court, which in practical terms, officially allowed abortions to take place under the guaranteed protection of the law.

I want to express a note of deep gratitude to all of you who publicly support the right to life: to our Knights of Columbus Council, to all who offer assistance through our parish Right to Life activities, and to all of you who promote a positive expression, within the law, for what remains, even in our time, a truly "life and death" issue.

Our Church holds to the belief and teaches that "every human life is sacred from the first moment of conception until the final moment of natural death." It is our Catholic belief that all human life has dignity and value and that each human life is truly a gift from God. So, we join together in prayer, especially this weekend, to celebrate the <u>Sanctity</u> of All Human Life.

Under the leadership and direction of our present Holy Father, Pope Francis, and in concert with our United States Catholic Bishops, we are asked to pray for and to do what we can to promote the Gospel of Life wherever that is possible.

Let us pray together that the "pre-born" as well as the "un-born" will be offered the same opportunity that our own parents lovingly provided for us—the truly God-given gift and the blessing of our own personal human life.

As the official document from the office of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops expressed it, "...During this Year of Faith, we are given a special opportunity to acknowledge the great tragedy of abortion and to make reparation for our part. We are invited to rededicate ourselves to transforming a culture of death into a culture of life, while always trusting in God's mercy. Let us enhance our mission of promoting life in all

of its stages during this Year of Faith by being radiant examples of Christ's welcoming and forgiving love in our world." "While we contemplate the great losses over these past forty-seven years, let us never forget God's great mercy and His promise of hope for the future."

May the Lord bless us all that we will have a deep respect for all human life; and by the grace of God, may we all know and one day enjoy the fullness of life in the Kingdom of Heaven.

I could find no more fitting quotation from Scripture as I conclude this reflection than the one found in the 30th chapter of the Old Testament Book of Deuteronomy: "Choose life then that you and your descendants may live." And in the Gospel, Jesus expressed His mission and ministry that is no less our own: "I came that you may have life and have it to the full."

# 2022 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity January 18 - 25th

This week, from Tuesday, January 18th - January 25th, we are invited to pray, during the octave, with every person who professes the Christian Faith, as we commemorate the annual Christian Unity Octave.

The theme for 2022: "We saw the star in the East and came to worship Him" (Mt 2:2). So, this week, let us pray each day as Jesus prayed: "...Father, may they all be one in us that they may believe it was You who sent me."

#### **Scriptural Reflections**

In my spiritual reading last week, I (cont'd on page 2)

(Pastoral Notes cont'd) found this reflection on the Sacred Scriptures that I thought might be helpful to you this week. (Is 62:1-5; 1 Cor 12:4-11; Jn 2:1-11)

The context of the First Reading today from the prophet Isaiah is the Israelites living once again in the land of Judah after having been in exile. Life is harsh, the economic situation is bad, and pagan rituals are very tempting. The leadership's task at hand was to re-build the once-great city, and the immensity of work and effort seemed daunting—near impossible. They were losing interest. They were losing hope. They were losing any motivation to enter back into right worship of God.

So Isaiah's words are really a rallying cry. The prophet Isaiah will not be silent. He will not be quiet. Why? Isaiah understands the importance of not only the city itself, but most importantly, the temple. For Jews, the temple was the pinnacle of right worship. It was the place where heaven met earth—the divine met humanity. God chose the Jewish people and he chose to dwell among them.

Everything we read in the Old Testament points us to Jesus Christ. In Jesus, the divine meets the human: *The Word became flesh and dwelt among us* (John 1:14). In the Son, God the Father communicates the depth and the abundance of his love for his chosen people—you and me.

In today's Gospel, we see Jesus as he performs his first miracle while at the wedding in Cana. This is important because it communicates to us the Father's intention. He intends, in a certain sense, to marry himself to his creation. He intends to bring us back into right relationship with him. As Isaiah prophesied, God would once again delight in his people, rejoicing in us as a bridegroom does his bride. Where once there was desolation, there would now be fruitfulness. From water would come the best wine.

Like the Jewish people who saw what seemed to be a hopeless situation, oftentimes we can see our circumstances from that same perspective. Our readings today, however, remind us that we have a God who delights in each one of us. We have a God who longs to marry us to himself so as to breathe his divine life into us to make us new and whole. Like Isaiah, let us never be silent. Rather, let us acknowledge God's effort and action in our lives and *proclaim his marvelous deeds to all nations*.



# **GOSPEL MEDITATIONS 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time**

God delights in you. How do you feel when you hear that? Delight usually comes with an exuberant flow of joy that seemingly arises from one's toes with the expression of great glee. Reflecting upon the deep measure of joy God has in us can be a source of joy for ourselves. Delight is infectious. A very young brother and sister were playing on the beach when the all too familiar ice cream truck made its daily rounds. The boy shook with excitement and delight as he took his sister's hand and exclaimed, "The ice cream man is here, isn't it great!" As they ran off toward the truck, one could hear the girl reply, "Yeah, I can't wait!" The experience of a child's delight in something so simple as ice cream, lifts our spirits from our burdens and transports us to the lighter, more innocent side of life.

Life is not meant to be a burden. Believe it or not, God actually wants us to be happy! In fact, the wedding feast at Cana shows us that God even puts His blessing on our happiness. It is okay to celebrate the wonder of ourselves and others. Life is good. It is always interesting to note that Jesus saves the good wine until last. You would think it would be the other way around. The superb quality of Jesus' wine points to the superior quality of life we find in Christ. It is not a life of burdens but a life of wonder and delight! In Christ, we are lifted from the superficial and mundane to a life of purpose, hope, and love.

God is with us through the long haul, through the challenges and sorrows as well as the successes and accomplishments. In spite of the fact that we often wander from the path, God's celebratory delight in us remains. As spouses are asked to remain faithful to each other through whatever life brings, God remains faithful too. This promise remains through this life and into the next. All we have to do is take the advice of Jesus' mother to heart when she says, "Listen to him." This wisdom saves us from foolishly giving in to the illusion that we can make better wine than Jesus.

#### It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers — do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.

January 17th, 2022

Each year on the third Monday of January we observe Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and reflect on the work that still needs to be done for racial equality. This January 17, make the holiday more than just a day off and take time to reflect and take action on civil rights issues across the globe.

Martin Luther King's unparalleled contributions to racial justice for Black Americans have been revolutionary. On Martin Luther King, Jr. Day or MLK Day, schools and offices are closed, but people fully participate in remembering and honoring everything King has accomplished. His values and historical place in American history are discussed and advocated to educate communities and coming generations on the importance of equality and King's influence. Movies and documentaries on his life are shown, and businesses and organizations run by and for the Black community are shown some support.



St. Sebastian January 20

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 - 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes.


#### Confession

The theme, taken from the second chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew, is the Epiphany. Each year in January, the Church recalls the visit of the Magi to Bethlehem, highlighting God's invitation to all of humanity to a new covenant in the Incarnation of Christ. In the Eastern Churches, Epiphany is joined to the mystery of the Baptism of Christ, a baptism all Christians hold in common as testimony to their faith in the Son of God.




