

The Christmas lights and decorations have come down. The holiday season has ended. That may be a cause for sadness—or a sigh of relief. In

any event, Happy "Ordinary Time"!

Sometimes a season like Christmas can be a real emotional and spiritual high—or quite the opposite. Perhaps some people found the holidays this year to be less than they hoped for due to the COVID concerns that impacted the usual gathering with family or friends. Regardless, as the Christmas Season finishes, we can often feel really worn out. At that point, beginning what we call "the season of Ordinary Time" can seem instead like beginning the season of "Down-in-a-Rut Time".

But that's not the way it should be! Far from being depressing or dull, "ordinary" should refer to the exciting work of the Lord that we are all supposed to *ordinarily* be doing day-to-day. If we keep focused on what the LORD is asking us to do, rather than on what WE feel we must do or (worse yet) what OTHER PEOPLE tell us we should be doing, we can find ourselves feeling peaceful, even in the midst of chaos. We can find ourselves energized and refreshed.

The key to this wonderful experience however, is to take time to pray, especially to LISTEN to the Lord during prayer. Prayer is supposed to be a conversation with God. "Conversation" suggests that you're not supposed to be doing all the talking.

Last Wednesday at morning Mass we heard the

story of the call of the first prophet in the history of Israel, Samuel. When Samuel was just a young boy, he kept hearing the Lord calling to him in the night. Finally, he was told how to respond, and I think it's key: he responded, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is *listening*."

Last Wednesday in the Gospel reading, it was recounted how Jesus, after a busy, successful, but long day, early the next morning "went off to a lonely place in the desert; there he was absorbed in prayer." After his companions "managed to track him down," he told them to move on with him to the neighboring villages to proclaim the Good News there also, because that was what he was sent to do. What gave Jesus the energy and direction to keep going? *It was prayer.* He was *listening* to the Father and the Spirit. I think he was teaching his disciples (and us) by example how to keep going and keep doing the work of the Father.

"Ordinary time" is the right time for doing the ongoing work of disciples. But if we're going to succeed in hearing and heeding what the Lord wants us to do, we need to pay attention to when, where, and how much time we spend in prayer. Otherwise, we'll tend to get discouraged, or maybe even overwhelmed.

Part of the work of a disciple is to call others to the Christ. After developing a deeper relationship with Christ ourselves, we need to share the Lord with others. If you are trying to bring someone [back] to the Christ, without prayer, you could easily get discouraged. Instead, keep your efforts focused through prayer. Then you will be tuned into the Spirit when the time comes to specially witness to that person how Christ has made a difference in your life. Prayer leads us to action, action that will be effective because it will be empowered by the Spirit.

If your prayer-life seems to be lagging, one way to bolster it is to LEARN something! New insights can do wonders for adding enthusiasm to Mass, private prayer, and day-to-day living. There are high-quality books and electronic recordings that are available in the East Tower Entrance of the church. But wait, there's more! The Parish has purchased a tremendous <u>ONLINE</u> resource called *FORMED*, and it's FREE to all parishioners! Go to our website and scroll down the home page until you get to "FORMED". There are simple instructions to give you access to tons of online Catholic programs, movies, books and audiobooks. (Did I say, "Movies"? YES!)


Learning is a life-long process, and frankly, I am

amazed at the lack of religious education on the part of far too many of our adult Catholics. I'm also amazed that there are a lot of parishioners who don't even know that we *have* adult study groups. But if you go to our website (again on the home page) you will see a schedule for Bible Studies. (If it's not updated by the time you visit, it will be soon.)

Also, in that same area you can inquire about "Small Faith Groups". (We were promoting Small Faith Groups at Mass for a few weeks before Christmas.) People who have joined such groups in the past have witnessed to the huge benefit they have been to their faith-life. I hope that at some point virtually every parishioner will be involved with one or another of these groups. The "Sign-up Genius" is only to give us your contact information so that one of the leaders can get back to you, answer questions, and help you discern if there's a common-interest group that would work for you.

It's an exciting time to be a member of St. William Parish. Please keep praying, and listening. Together we will accomplish the Mission he has sent us to do.




Our next meeting will be on February 2<sup>nd</sup> at 6:30 pm in Lower Zepf Hall. We are looking forward to seeing you.






#### **Gospel Meditation**

God delights in you. How do you feel when you hear that? Delight usually comes with an exuberant flow of joy that seemingly arises from one's toes with the expression of great glee. Reflecting upon the deep measure of joy God has in us can be a source of joy for ourselves. Delight is infectious. A very young brother and sister were playing on the beach when the all too familiar ice cream truck made its daily rounds. The boy shook with excitement and delight as he took his sister's hand and exclaimed, "The ice cream man is here, isn't it great!" As they ran off toward the truck, one could hear the girl reply, "Yeah, I can't wait!" The experience of a child's delight in something so simple as ice cream, lifts our spirits from our burdens and transports us to the lighter, more innocent side of life.

Life is not meant to be a burden. Believe it or not, God actually wants us to be happy! In fact, the wedding feast at Cana shows us that God even puts His blessing on our happiness. It is okay to celebrate the wonder of ourselves and others. Life is good. It is always interesting to note that Jesus saves the good wine until last. You would think it would be the other way around. The superb quality of Jesus' wine points to the superior quality of life we find in Christ. It is not a life of burdens but a life of wonder and delight! In Christ, we are lifted from the superficial and mundane to a life of purpose, hope, and love.

God is with us through the long haul, through the challenges and sorrows as well as the successes and accomplishments. In spite of the fact that we often wander from the path, God's celebratory delight in us remains. As spouses are asked to remain faithful to each other through whatever life brings, God remains faithful too. This promise remains through this life and into the next. All we have to do is take the advice of Jesus' mother to heart when she says, "Listen to him." This wisdom saves us from



foolishly giving in to the illusion that we can make better wine than Jesus.


